The altar was banked with palms, ferns, and tall vases filled with white chrysanthemums and lighted by white cathedral candles. The central isle was marked with white satin ribbon. Billy Twillman and Waldo Klekamp lined the isle for the bridal party to enter. Before the ceremony Miss Edna Twillman sang "My Happy Day."
