Died, January 24, 1888, Mrs. Elizabeth Sapp. On New Year day, she would have been seventy-one years old. She was present as usual at services at Mt. Herman on last Saturday and Sunday. Seemed as well as usual on Monday morning and had been talking playfully with her little grandchild only a few moments before she expired.
