The Rev. Robert Crockett, a superannuated preacher of the Cumberland Presbyterian church, died at his home, near Blackwater, Wednesday, January 10th, and was buried at Salt Fork graveyard the following day, Rev. C. Q. Shouse conducting the funeral services. Rev. Crockett was nearly 80 years old.

Died, at the home of her parents, Mr. and Mrs. Elmer Marshall, on South Main street, Tuesday morning, January 16th, Myrtle May Marshall. The little one was just seven years of age—an only child and the idol of her parents. The funeral services were held at the residence and the remains were interred Wednesday afternoon in Walnut Grove cemetery.

## MRS. JAMES SHIPLEY.

James Shipley and wife drove in Saturday from their home near Crawford's bridge. While dismounting from the wagon, on Porter street, Mrs. Shipley fell to the street dead, having succumbed to a sudden attack of heart trouble. The remains were taken to her late home and interred in the cemetery near there. She belonged to a most respectable colored family, and leaves a husband and several children.

## MRS. JOHN HARRISON.

Died, at her residence on First street, in this city, on Friday, Jan. 12th, Elizabeth, wife of John Harrison. Deceased was aged about 69 years and had been complaining for some time, but was not supposed to be seriously ill. Her death was quite sudden and is attributed to heart disease. The funeral services were held at 2:30 o'clock Sunday afternoon, at the residence, Rev. Harris officiating, and the remains were interred in the city cemetery. She leaves a husband and three sons.

## DIED IN NEBRASKA.

Mrs. Mary Frances Harris, formerly of Cooper county, died at her home in Wyomere, Neb., January 7th. Her remains, accompanied by Mr. and Mrs. Ben Reynolds and Miss Ida Siskey, were received by relatives at Blackwater, Wednesday of last week, and buried at Old Lambos on Thursday, after funeral services by the Rev. J. S. Russell. Deceased was born in Yancyville, Louisa county, Virginia, on July 2, 1826; moved to Missouri in December, 1836; and in 1842 was married to G. W. Harris, who died several years ago.
