

DEATH OF MRS. CHAS. JOHNSON.

Mrs. Chas. Johnson died Tuesday, March 3d, at her home on South Seventh street, after an illness of three years' duration. Her maiden name was Lena Metz, she having been born in Lowville, N. Y., September 13, 1861. When three years of age she came with her parents to Boonville, and on January 31, 1884, was married to Charles Johnson. The husband and three children survive.

Mrs. Johnson was a most estimable Christian woman, and held the respect and esteem of all who knew her. The bereaved family have the sympathy of a large circle of friends. The funeral services will be held at 2:30 o'clock this afternoon, from the family residence to Walnut Grove cemetery.

MRS. WILHELMINA BACK DEAD.

Mrs. Wilhelmina S. Back died at her home on West Morgan street on Monday. The previous week she sustained a fractured thigh and internal injuries by a fall. Her advanced age gave little hope of recovery, and her demise was not unexpected. Mrs. Back was born February 13, 1828, in Hoechst, Germany. Six children survive—Joe and Phil G. Back, of Billings, O. T., Tony and Will Back, Mrs. Dominick Burnett and Mrs. John Potter, of Boonville.

The funeral services were held at 9:30 o'clock Wednesday morning, at the Catholic church, and the remains were interred in Walnut Grove cemetery.
