AN OLD CITIZEN DEAD.

John Nicholas Smith Passes Away in the 74th Year of his Age.

John Nicholas Smith was in Bayaria, Germany, November 2, 1837; in 1853, when about sixteen years of age he came to America with his parents, landing at Now Orleans. From there the family came by river to Boonville, here in Cooper county the subject of this sketch resided until death which occurred at his home on Sixth street in this city early Wednesday morning, July 5, at the advanced age of 73 years, 8 months, and 3 days. The funeral will held at the family residence Friday morning at 9:30 o'clock burial at Walnut Grove.

Mr. Smith was married to Miss Margaret Dornhauser Oct. 13, 1860. The wife survives. For a half century the husband and wife traveled down the pathway of life together sharing each other's joys and sorrows for a few months than fifty years. The surviving wife has the deep sympathy of all their friends in her bereavement

"Squire Smith," as he was familiarly called by many of his friends, was widely known as a pleasant as-Whatever else may sociate. said of him, he was of a jovial disposition among his friends. writer knew him and enjoyed his friendship.

Some time last winter Mr Smith began to get in poor health from that time he was not to leave the house but a few times. His life was despaired of for several weeks prior to his death. almost three score years he was a resident of Cooper county, and during this long period of time was recognized as an honest upright citizen. Died July 5, 1911, at one o'clock a. m., J. Nicholas Smith, who was born November 2, 1837, in the Kingdom of Bavaria, Germany, aged 73 years, 8 months and 3 days 116 came to America April 11 1853 on a sail ship, landing at New Or leans after a journey on the ocean lasting 50 days, thence by steam boat to St. Louis, almost without a cent of money. The first work he did in America was digging polatoes at 50 cents per day out for ground where the city of East St. Louis now, stands, there being ino houses there at the time. The following spring he came to Cooper county and worked by the month. He was unarried to the wife survive ing him, on the 13th day of October, 1860. He retired from farming in 1887, moving to Boonville and renting his farm to his son Chris who now owns the farm.

Besides the wife, deceased leaves two sons, Chris of Lone Elm, and W. I., of Wichita Falls, Texas and three daughters, Mrs. Wm! Johnmeyer of west Boonville. Mrs. August Brueckner and Miss Jose phine, both of Boonville, Also 17 grandchildren and six great grandchildren. He also leaves one brother, Leonard Smith of Clarks Fork township, and one sister, Mrs.Chas. Brandes of near Bunceton.
