Valda S. Stone Commits Suicide.

Despondency caused Valda S. Stone, one of the oldest conductors on the Missouri, Kansas & Texas railroad to commit suicide at 4:30 o'clock Sunday afternoon at his room in the Antlers hotel at Sedalia, Mo. He used a revolver.

A poem entitled "Disappointment" found lying on the table in his room served as the key to the motive for Stone's act. In the room on the dresser was a photograph of Valdy Schaff, a nephew of Stone's divorced wife, who died last summer at Lansing, Mich., and of whom Conductor Stone is said to have been very fond.

Stone's run was between St. Louis and Sedalia, on the Katy. He had been laying off for ten days. His divorced wife, who was in Rocheport, was notified by telephone. She and Stone were estranged more than a year ago and she secured a divorce from him about four months ago.

Deceased left a will which was made December 12, 1914.

His request was that all just debts be paid, funeral expenses and expenses of final illness.

To his brother Theodore H. Stone, Denver, Colorado, \$200 was bequeathed.

To Fannie A. Smith, of Sedalia, \$1,000.

To Dan B. Jones, colored porter on his run, \$300.

To Rubie Warren Merford, of La Harpe, Illinois, \$400. She was a cousin of the deceased.

To Alexander McLachlan, Sedalia, all his furniture and \$200 to be divided among his children.

Mrs. Hattie Campbell, \$400.

Alexander McLachlan was suggested as executor of will.

Deceased was 55 years old.
