# WANAMAKER MAN SHOT TO DEATH

WILL JOBE, KILLED ON FARM  
OF HIS BROTHER-IN-LAW,  
CHARLEY RENISON, SOUTH  
OF MARSHALL.

Will Jobe, a farmer living south of Marshall, was shot to death at 1:30 o'clock Sunday afternoon on the farm of his brother-in-law, Charley Renison, 3 1/2 miles east of Wanamaker. There were four present besides Jobe at the time he was killed. They were Mr. Renison, his son, Ruperd, Frank York and Monroe French.

According to evidence taken by Dr. B. C. Bradshaw, coroner, in a cursory examination that afternoon Jobe had a revolver and so did Ruperd Renison. Witnesses testified three shots were fired and young Renison said he fired two of them at Jobe. The examination did not bring out who fired the first shot.

Jobe was shot with a .38 calibre revolver, the bullet piercing the chest on the left side and going through the body, coming out the back.

Doctor Bradshaw and John Logsdon, sheriff, went to Wanamaker at noon Monday, where coroner began an inquest with a jury at 1:30 o'clock that afternoon. Before leaving Doctor Bradshaw made the statement that his investigation was only to show the manner in which Jobe met his death and the circumstances surrounding it. The question whether the shooting was justifiable is not one for the coroner's jury to decide, he declared.

The belief was expressed this morning among officials that if arrested young Renison's plea will be self-defense.
