## James M. Haley, 80, Buried At Pilot Grove

Life-Long Resident of Cooper County  
Died Suddenly, With Paralytic Stroke

James M. Haley, 80 years old, a life-long resident of Cooper county was buried today at Chapel cemetery at Pilot Grove. Mr. Haley died suddenly Monday afternoon at the home of his son and daughter-in-law, Mr. and Mrs. Leslie Haley three miles south of Pilot Grove, with whom he had been making his home, after a fatal stroke of paralysis.

Mr. Haley, who is well known in Cooper county as a substantial farmer, had just eaten a hearty meal after which he complained to his son of a pain in his right leg. He said he would lie down and rest awhile, and Mr. and Mrs. Haley, thinking nothing serious was wrong, went outside to work. Fifteen minutes later they came back and found him dead. Doctors said the paralytic stroke went to the temple, causing almost instant death.

James M. Haley was born in Howard county, March 12, 1848, and was 80 years old at the time of his death Monday. When a youngster his parents moved to Pilot Grove where he has since lived. His wife died April 3, 1919. For some time he had been making his home with his son and daughter-in-law, Mr. and Mrs. Leslie Haley, who had been farming his place with another son, Arthur, who owns an adjoining farm. The three farms were operated jointly.

He is survived by four sisters and one brother, two sons, Arthur and Leslie, of Pilot Grove, and four daughters, Mrs. Joe Schlotzhauer and Mrs. Peter Schlotzhauer, of Pilot Grove; Mrs. Ora Roberts of Prairie Lick, and Mrs. F. W. Babbitt, of Walsenburg, Colorado. Mrs. Babbitt arrived today for the funeral.
