WILLIS HURT, 78, DIES YESTERDAY

Pioneer Resident Of Cooper
 County Fails to Recover
 From Paralytic Stroke

FUNERAL IS TOMORROW
 Came to This Community With
 Parents In 1855; Lived 50
 Years On One Place

Andrew Willis Hurt 78 years old, a pioneer resident of Cooper County, died last night at 11:55 o'clock at his home at 807 Morgan Street following a stroke of paralysis which he suffered April 17. Mr. Hurt, because of his advanced age, was unable to recover from the stroke, growing gradually worse until his death last evening.

Mr. Hurt was a member of an early Cooper County family which came here from Virginia in the fifties. He retired from the farm two years ago and moved with his family to Boonville. He is survived by his wife and four children, two daughters, Mrs. Harry Kirchner, 5 miles southeast of Boonville, and Mrs. Frank Kalb Boonville, and two sons, Clarence Hurt, of Boonville and Alva W. Hurt of St. Louis. He is also survived by three brothers, Silas and Will of Boonville, Ben F. of Clinton, and one sister, Mrs. W. B. Copas of Jefferson City.

Willis Hurt was born Aug. 2 1850, in Page County, Virginia, the son of Acrey and Matilda Hurt. The family came to Cooper County in 1855 and settled 10 miles southeast of Boonville near Washington School. In 1876 he married Miss Emma S. Bear, of Nodaway County. The couple purchased a farm near Rankin's Mill and lived there 50 years before moving to Boonville three years ago.

Funeral services will be held at the Methodist church here, Saturday afternoon at 2:30 o'clock. Rev. H. J. Rand will be in charge of the services. Burial will follow in Walnut Grove Cemetery. Mr. Hurt had been a member of the Methodist church since youth and was an upright, honorable citizen.
