Emma Grider Robertson was born Nov. 7, 1857, at Lisbon, Howard County and died April 17, at her home in Kansas City. She was married at an early age to John B. Robertson, who preceded her in death by several years. To this union eight children were born, two of whom died in infancy, and one, Mrs. J. W. Elder, died several years ago in Slater. The children who survive are Misses Beulah and Mae Robertson and Jack Robertson, of Virginia, Will Robertson of Mexico, Mo., and Mrs. George Gibbons of Chicago. Besides her children she leaves two sisters, nine grandchildren, and two great-grandchildren.
