Cooper County Pioneer Moved To Home At New Lebanon Sixty Years Ago.

Mrs. Fannie Brubaker of New Lebanon, long a prominent resident of Cooper county, died at her home Monday afternoon at about 6 o'clock.

Funeral services were held Wednesday at the home, conducted by Lawrence Sapp, pastor at Ashland, and burial was in the New Lebanon cemetery.

Miss Frances E. Gander was born in 1844 in Palge county, Virginia, and was married to Daniel R. Brubaker of the same county in 1866. They moved in 1873 to the farm at New Lebanon where she has resided ever since. Mr. Brubaker preceded her in death seven years ago. Mrs. Brubaker was a member of the Primitive Baptist church.
