Funeral of A. L. Burford

Funeral services for Arthur L. Burford, crushed to death Saturday at his farm home near Otterville, when a shed laden with snow collapsed, will be held at 2 o'clock this afternoon at the Baptist church in Otterville, the pastor, the Rev. George A. Craig, to officiate. Pall bearers will be friends of the family. Interment will be in the O. O. F. cemetery at Otterville.

Mr. Burford, familiarly known as "Dick", was the son the late Wil- son and Sarah Elizabeth Burford

and spent his entire life on the farm on which he passed away.

On October 18, 1892 he was married to Miss Sarah Frances Yarnell and from that union six children were born, twins, who died in infancy, a son, James, who passed away in 1928, leaving surviving Mrs. Loy E. Snyder, of Sedalia, Mrs. W. C. Edwards and Arthur Y. Burford, of Otterville. His widow and two brothers, J. H. Burford, New Frank- lin, A. T. Burford, Otterville, and nine grand-children also survive him.

Mrs. Blanche D. Monsees Dies

Mrs. Blanche Demand Monsees, aged 47, wife of Joe Monsees, who lived on a farm, 2½ miles south of Smithton, died yesterday morning at Bothwell hospital. She had been ill

since December, first with influenza, which was followed by pneumonia. She was brought to the hospital Saturday to undergo an operation for the removal of pus from the lungs.

Surviving are her husband, her mother, Mrs. Charles Monsees; one sister, Mrs. Stanley Kahrs, and a brother, Raymond Demand, of near Smithton, and a brother, Homer Demand of Boston, Mass.

The body is at the Neumeyer Funeral Home in Smithton.

No funeral arrangements will be made until the brother in Boston is heard from.
