Rites Will Be Held at
2 p.m. Wednesday at the

Theodore Thomas Short, 55, of
the Vers Addition, died at 12:10
a. m. Tuesday, May 15, at Fitzgib-
bon Hospital, where he had been
a patient for two days. He had
been in failing health for some
time and had been a patient at
Wadsworth Veterans Hospital re-
cently.

Funeral services will be held at
2 p. m. Wednesday, May 16, at
the Hershberger Funeral Home.
Burial will be at Ridge Park Cem-
etery. The body will be at the
funeral home until the hour of
the service.

Mr. Short was born July 18,
1895 at Nevada, Mo., the son of
J. T. and Theresa Alice Brown
Short. When he was just a boy
his parents came to this county
and he has been here most of his
life. Both parents preceded him in
death. Surviving are his wife,
Mrs. Bessie A. Short of the home,

Vers Addition; two grandsons;
three sisters: Mrs. Sam B. Case
and Mrs. James Rafferty of Mar-
shall, and Mrs. W. O. Jordan of

For many years Mr. Short op-
erated a truck in Marshall. He
was a veteran of World War I
and was a member of American
Legion Post No. 191.
