

### Herbert Walker Stark

Herbert Walker Stark, 74, of 200 South Quincy, died at 1:14 a.m. Friday at the Bothwell Hospital, where he had been a patient since Sunday, when he suffered a cerebral hemorrhage at his home.

Mr. Stark, a retired engineer for the MKT railroad, was one of the best known railroad men in Sedalia and he had served on the Katy for a period of 40 years. He retired Oct. 11, 1943.

Born at Otterville Oct. 13, 1878, he spent his childhood there. He was a son of the late Samuel B. and Phoebe Spillers Stark. On Dec. 24, 1908, he married Miss Lulu Blatterman.

He was a member of the Trinity Lutheran Church and had been affiliated with numerous Masonic bodies, serving at various times in some of the offices of that fraternity, being a past deputy grand lecturer of the 36th district for the State of Missouri. He was also a past master of Granite Lodge, No. 272, AF & AM, Sedalia; Sedalia Chapter, No. 18, Royal Arch Masons; Sedalia Council, No. 42, R. and S.M.; St. Omer Commandery, No. 11, Knights Templar; Sedalia Chapter, No. 57, Order of the Eastern Star, and was a former member of Ararat Temple of Shriners.

Besides his wife, he is survived by: one daughter, Mrs. Fowler A. Young, Liberty; two grandchildren, Fowler Young II and Martha Ann Young; two brothers, J. W. Stark, 2101 South Washington, and William Allen Stark, Boonville.

Funeral services will be at 2:30 p.m. Saturday at the Gillespie Funeral Home, the Rev. David Funk, pastor of the Trinity Lutheran Church, to officiate.
