MRS. R. L. MUSE'S MOTHER DIES

Mrs. Clara Elizabeth Williams of Kansas City, a former Trenton resident, died Monday evening at the Osteopathic Hospital in Kansas City where she had been a patient for one day. She had been in failing health for about two months.
