BAUGH, JOHN	Lamar Democrat, May 23, 1889 John Baugh who lived about 2 miles east of Irwin died last Thursday night under very distressing circumstances. He leaves a wife and 6 children.
BEAMER, EMMA E. MRS.	Lamar Democrat, September 12, 1889 Died on Wednesday evening, September 4 th , 1889, at her home in Lamar, Mrs. Emma E. Beamer, wife of David Beamer, 23 years, 3 months, and 14 days. Mrs. Beamer's death was caused by diphtheria. As Miss Emma Stewart, she was a highly prized teacher. While engaged as a teacher she was married to D. A. Beamer. They have one little boy about eight months old. On Friday last Mrs. Beamer was laid to rest at Lake Cemetery.
BELL, JAMES	Lamar Democrat, February 21, 1889 Golden City Herald--- James, son of Benjamin Bell is dead.
BELL, PRICE	Lamar Democrat, November 14, 1889 Golden City Herald---It is with feeling of regret that we announce the death of Mr. Price Bell, a highly esteemed young man, well and favorably known in this city, a son of Jack Bell, a respectable farmer living on Coon creek about 6 miles west of Golden City. Deceased was night operator at the Gulf Depot here for nearly 3 years. He removed to Denver, Colorado, some time since, where he was engaged in the same profession. He was taken sick with mountain fever and the first his friends knew of it here was the announcement of his death. His remains were sent home and the funeral took place at the Mt. Carmel Church where Rev. Stephenson gave the funeral oration.
BEVELLE, PAUL H.	Lamar Democrat, August 1, 1889 Died in Lamar on Tuesday morning, Paul H., son of Maj. Bevelle of Lamar.

BIRD, JOHN	<p>Lamar Democrat, September 19, 1889</p> <p>The oldest man in Sevier county died at his residence in the 3rd district, on the 3rd of July 1889. He was born October 11th, 1795. He was buried in Fox's Cemetery on July 4th. Father John was of a Dutch family but this writer cannot give the place of birth. He was one of the heroes of 1812. He was elected Justice of the Peace in the 3rd district in 1830 and served near a half century and was postmaster of Fox when he died. He died quietly in his right mind. He was married to Miss Elizabeth Shrader and they had 11 children all of whom but one grew to adulthood. A boy died in his infancy. Mrs. Bird was called away a few years ago and followed by three of the girls and two of the boys. Father John and his wife belonged to the Lutheran Church but in later years attached themselves to the Methodist Episcopal Church. Bradley, deceased, who lived with his mother 4 miles east of Duroc. On April 3rd, the boy got angry because he was made to do some errand and procured an old pistol and holding it to his head commenced pulling the trigger. His little sister told him not to do so and he answered he "might as well die now as any time. He pointed it at her and she ran from the house and he put the gun back to his head and pulled the trigger, the hammer falling on the only loaded chamber and the shot produced instant date. BRUMMETT, CHILD	Lamar Democrat, November 7, 1889 The little 2 year old child of Mr. and Mrs. James Brummett died on Monday night.
BURR, MYRANDA L.	Lamar Democrat, May 9, 1889 Died at his residence in Lamar on Saturday, May 4 th , 1889, Myranda L. Burr, aged 75 years, 3 months, and 24 days. The funeral services were held at the grave. He was an old settler in Barton county and was highly respected. His family are well known here as influential businessmen. L. Z. Burr and R. W. Burr at Kansas City were notified by telegraph. His death was very sudden and unexpected.
BURTON, DAUGHTER	Lamar Democrat, September 26, 1889 A little daughter of W. Burton, a stranger, died this week and was buried here. They were befriended by Steve Stultz. We learn that the mother is very ill. We hope some of our good people will aid her.
CAHALL, MRS.	Lamar Democrat, October 10, 1889 Mrs. Cahall, mother of Jack Cahall, died October 4 th , at 80 years, at the home of her son.
CAMERON, ALFRED	Lamar Democrat, July 11, 1889 Alfred Cameron, who left here for Eureka Springs on account of a cancer, died at the Springs on the 1 st of July and was buried on the 2 nd . The cancer had eaten his head and face to such an extent that there was but little left of either. We thank Mr. McCully for the information regarding the sad ending of Mr. Cameron.
CAMPBELL, ELIZABETH MRS.	Lamar Democrat, January 24, 1889 Mrs. Elizabeth Campbell, aged eighty four years, died at the residence of her son-in-law, Jas. Stephens, near Kenoma Tuesday morning of dropsy.

CARROLL, MARY	Lamar Democrat, December 19, 1889 Died on December 13 th , Mary Carroll, aged 10 months of croup.
CLARK, MINNIE	Lamar Democrat, June 20, 1889 Died at the residence of her parents in Lamar, at 8 o'clock a.m., Monday, June 17 th , Minnie Clark, daughter of D. P. and B. A. Clark, aged 18 years, 1 month, and 11 days. She was buried on Wednesday at 2 o'clock p.m.
CLEMENTS CHILD	Lamar Democrat, August 1, 1889 A little boy of Richard Clements living 4 and one half miles south of Lamar died on the 26 th inst.
CLINE, MARY MRS.	Lamar Democrat, November 7, 1889 Mrs. Mary Cline, grandmother of Mrs. Ed Ward, died at the home of her daughter in St. Louis, October 30 th at the age of 102 years. The grandmother of Ed Ward died at age 104 years.
CLINKENBEARD, BLAINE	Lamar Democrat, July 4, 1889 Died on Wednesday afternoon, June 26 th , 1889, Blaine, son of Mr. and Mrs. Joe Clinkenbeard, aged 5 months and 28 days. The funeral took place on Thursday and was largely attended.
COE, G. W.	Lamar Democrat, February 7, 1889 We regret to learn of the death of G. W. Coe living near Lamar. He was 70 years of age.
COLEMAN, J. E.	Lamar Democrat, May 9, 1889 Died at the asylum in Nevada, on Sunday, May 5 th , 1889, J. E. Coleman, aged 34 years, 6 months, and 10 days. Mr. Coleman was born in New Albany, Indiana and has been engaged for a number of years as a clerk in the leading dry goods houses in Boonville, St. Louis and Lamar. Owing to ill health his mind became deranged and he was taken to the asylum at Fulton. After 7 months he was turned out cured and came back and went to work. Last December his malady reappeared and he was taken to Nevada, where he died. He leaves a wife and 2 little girls. The A. O. U. W. of this city presided over the funeral and have helped care for his family. In the course of 30 days the order will pay to the widow the sum of \$2000.00.
COMBS, MILLIE	Lamar Democrat, December 19, 1889 Miss Millie Combs, sister of Mrs. J. O. Work died at her home in Charlestown, Indiana on the 12 th inst. Miss Millie spent two years here with Mr. and Mrs. Burton and while here was a picture of health.

<p>COMSTOCK, ISAAC A.</p>	<p>Lamar Democrat, June 27, 1889 Judge I. A. Comstock died. His children and relatives were telegraphed for. All were present at the funeral last Thursday.</p> <p>Lamar Democrat, July 4, 1889 Isaac A. Comstock died on the 19th of June 1889, and was buried at the Connor graveyard in Leroy township near his home. He was born in Scioto county, Ohio in 1818. His parents Daniel and Elizabeth Comstock were natives of New York. He was the oldest of seven children, the family consisting of four brothers and three sisters. He was reared on the frontier of Ohio and Indiana. In 1840 he was married to Rebecca A., daughter of Goodwin and Jane Taylor, who were married in North Carolina and removed to Indiana when Rebecca was only four years old. Mr. and Mrs. Taylor moved to Muscatine, Iowa, thence to Cedar county, Iowa, then to Kansas. The parents of Mrs. Comstock are dead. To Mr. and Mrs. Comstock were born 10 children, 8 of whom are now living, A. J. Comstock, Mary J., wife of G. W. Fall, of Iowa, Albert Comstock, Lewis C. Comstock, Laura, wife of G. W. Harbour, Josephine, wife of Joseph Rader, Stephen and Lawrence Comstock. In 1871 Mr. Comstock and family moved from Cedar county, Iowa to Barton county, Missouri and here he purchased the finely improved farm of three hundred acres, where he died. In 1849, I. A. Comstock crossed the plains to California, but remained only 1 year, returning by way of Cuba and landing at New York City. While Mr. Comstock was in Iowa he engaged in the mercantile business with his father-in-law. At the age of 22 he was elected justice of the peace which he held for many years. In 1840 he was elected assessor of Cedar county Iowa and served two years. In 1882 he was elected to the position of county judge of Barton county, Missouri. Politically he was a staunch democrat and cast his first vote for Franklin Pierce. He was a member of the Good Templars organization. He was sick for 2 weeks prior to his death, the doctor, Dr. Merrill having stated that he could not recover, the children and the relatives were telegraphed for and were present when he died. The funeral was largely attended, with Rev. McFarland preaching the sermon. He will be missed, not only by the members of the family, but by the community in which he lived and by the county, for which he proved a faithful servant.</p>
<p>CONNELLY, DAUGHTER</p>	<p>Lamar Democrat, September 26, 1889 The four year old daughter of Riley Connelly, of Nevada, died last week from eating night shade berries.</p>
<p>COX, WILLIAM.</p>	<p>Lamar Democrat, July 11, 1889 Died on Saturday afternoon, at 4 o'clock William Cox, aged 77 years, 4 months, 16 days. The funeral took place from the family residence on Sunday afternoon, under the charge of Lamar Lodge, No. 292 A F and A M. It was largely attended and the body was laid to rest in Lake Cemetery. Mr. Cox was born on the 20th of February 1812, in Highland county, Ohio and lived there until 1867, when he came to Barton county, Missouri. The family now consists of the widow and five children, 3 boys</p>

	and 2 girls, all married. Mr. Cox was raised a Quaker, but when he began to investigate for himself, became a Universalist and died firmly in that belief. For 36 years he has been a Mason, he affiliated with the Lamar Lodge in 1870.
CRAIG, SAM	Lamar Democrat, February 7, 1889 We learn that Sam Craig, son of Wm. Craig died on Tuesday night of consumption.
CROWEL, CHILD	Lamar Democrat, January 17, 1889 A young child of F. Crowel, living near Iantha died on the 9 th inst.
DALE, CHARLES A.	Lamar Democrat, April 4, 1889 Died on Monday, April 1, 1889, Charles A., the 15 month old son of Judge Marion Dale and wife. He had been sick for about 10 days with measles and whooping cough combined. The little fellow was buried at the Waters Cemetery in Northfork, township.
DAUBIN, LUCINDA	Lamar Democrat, January 17, 1889 Mrs. Lucinda Daubin mother of C. C. Daubin of this city died at her home in Godfrey, Kansas Monday of paralysis of the brain. She was 56 years of age and a 20 year resident of Godfrey.
DAVIS, A. L. MRS.	Lamar Democrat, September 19, 1889 Arthur Davis's mother died last Wednesday night at her home in Golden City. Lamar Democrat, September 26, 1889 Died in Golden City, Missouri, September 11 th , 1889, Mrs. A. L. Davis, aged 41 years and 6 months. Mrs. Davis was known for her upright Christian character by all who knew her, the writer included. Her only son Arthur has worked for the Democrat for 3 years. Mr. and Mrs. Davis had adopted a little girl at Bentonville, Arkansas, and she always found room in her heart for this little girl. Her last illness lasted nine weeks and no complaint ever passed her lips.
DELL, ISAAC	Lamar Democrat. February 21, 1889 Died at his home in Lamar on Friday evening, the 15 th of February 1889, Isaac Dell, aged 63 years, 9 months, and 19 days. Mr. Dell was born in Coshocton county, Ohio where he lived until grown. He moved to Indiana and remained one year before coming to Missouri and settled in this county. He came here in 1855 before Barton was cut off from Jasper county and remained here ever since. He was one of the early settlers and a true pioneer. His death was caused by diphtheria sore throat. He was buried at Forest Grove, on Sunday, the funeral being largely attended.
DRAKE, DICK	Lamar Democrat, May 2, 1889 Died in Lamar, Missouri, April 27 th , 1889, little Dick Drake aged 2 years, 1 month, and 1 day.

DRAKE, NELLIE	Lamar Democrat, April 11, 1889 Died on Tuesday April 9 th , Nellie Drake, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Drake, aged 5 years, 10 months, and 25 days. Her death was caused by membranous croup. The funeral takes place today (Wednesday) from the Congregational Church.
DRAKE, WILLIAM MARION	Lamar Democrat, February 28, 1889 Died in Lamar, Missouri, Thursday, February 21, 1889, William Marion Drake, aged four years, five months, and seven days. Charles B. Drake , brother of Dr. Drake came in from Jefferson city on Friday morning at 2 o'clock a.m. to attend the funeral of his brother's little son.
DRESSLER, CHILD	Lamar Democrat, October 10, 1889 A little child of J. Dressler, living near Milford, died October 3 rd .
DUNCAN, JAS. T.	Lamar Democrat, January 3, 1889 We learn with regret the death of Jas. T. Duncan of Sheldon, who died on the 21 st of December, aged 34 years. He leaves a wife and two children, both girls, age 7 and 5 years. Prior to his death he bade his family goodby and to his father of Northfork township he said "I am a young man and don't like to go on that account", no other complaints during illness of two weeks. His father, mother, two sisters and one brother live in this county and one brother in Clay county. Rev. Isabell preached a touching funeral sermon and he was buried in Warwick Cemetery.
DYE, WILLIAM	Lamar Democrat, November 21, 1889 Judge Dye informed us last week of a telegram informing him of the death of his father. The judge had visited Indiana a few months ago due to the serious illness of his father. His death was not wholly unexpected. Wm. Dye, the father of Judge Dye and J. M. Dye, was 82 years old and resided in Pulaski county, Indiana. He was one of the first settlers of that county.
EDDLEMAN, JOSEPH	Lamar Democrat, December 19, 1889 Joseph Eddleman, age 78 years 6 months, died on the 11 th . Mr. Eddleman died on Wednesday last at his home in Verdella. He died of old age. He was the father of Jake and Columbus Eddleman, both well known citizens of Barton county.
ELDER, MARY MRS.	Lamar Democrat, March 7, 1889 Died in Lamar, on Monday, March 4 th , 1889, Mrs. Mary Elder, wife of J. V. Elder, aged 42 years, 4 months, and 23 days. Her funeral took place on Tuesday, March 5 th . Mrs. Elder has been an invalid for some years past, although her death was directly caused by pneumonia.
ENGLE CHILD	Lamar Democrat, August 18 1889 A little child of Mr. and Mrs. Geo. Engle, aged 14 months followed Mrs. Engle to

	the barnyard when she went out to do the milking. The child either fell down or was knocked down and the cow stepped on the little child and killed it. The funeral took place on Saturday last.
EPPERLY, CHILD	Lamar Democrat, September 12, 1889 From Mr. Humphrey we learn of the death of a little child of Mr. Epperly, near Kenoma.
ESSEX, HAYES	Lamar Democrat. December 19, 1889 Died in Lamar, at 9:30 p.m. Wednesday, December 11 th , 1889, Hayes Essex aged three years, 11 months, and 11 days. The funeral took place from the family residence on Friday. He had the croup first and having recovered from this was stricken with paralysis from which he never recovered.
FAST, ALICE B. MRS.	Lamar Democrat, April 18, 1889 Died on Saturday last, at 3 p.m., Mrs. Alice B. Fast, wife of Marlin J. Fast, aged thirty-three years, 11 months, and 13 days. She leaves 6 children for her husband to look after 3 boys and 3 girls.
FIELD, MR.	Lamar Democrat, November 28, 1889 Died on the 22 nd of November, at the home of Judge Morrow. Mr. Field aged 80 years. Mr. Field was not well known in Lamar. His remains were taken to St. Charles for burial.
FINK, GERTRUDE MRS.	Lamar Democrat, January 3, 1889 Alf Anderson, the proprietor of the Lamar Marble Works has completed a beautiful monument for Mrs. Gertrude Fink who died on the 7 th day of December. The marble is known as a dark blue Rutland marble.
FISHPOOL, DAUGHTER	Lamar Democrat, January 24, 1889 A little girl, the daughter of Mr. Fishpool of Lamar, who had been boarding at Frank Ladds, attending school, died last Tuesday morning. The disease was something like membranous croup. Dr. Ackason and Dr. Dye performed a surgical operation on her throat, Monday, to give relief, without success. Golden City Herald
FLEENER, ROBERT	Lamar Democrat, March 7, 1889 Died on the 1 st of March, 1889, at their home in Garland, Kansas, Robert the only son of Lee and Lettie Fleener. Robert was a sweet baby only three months old.
FOGLESONG, MARTHA	Lamar Democrat, September 5, 1889 We are pained to learn of the death of little Martha Foglesong, the baby of Mr. and Mrs. J. W. Foglesong, of Richland. She died on Sunday and was buried in Lake Cemetery on Tuesday.

FRYE INFANT	Lamar Democrat, July 25, 1889 The little baby of Mr. and Mrs. Frank Frye died of measles on the 19 th .
GAMMON, CORNELIA D.	Lamar Democrat, March 21, 2000 Died on the 14 th inst., at her home in Lamar, Mrs. Cornelia D. Gammon, wife of J. E. Gammon aged 60 years. Mrs. Gammon was born in Jay, Maine and married there to J. E. Gammon, well known to our citizens. After marriage they went to Earlsville, Illinois, and from there to Lamar. Her death was caused by cancer and she had been a sufferer for a year. She leaves 2 daughters, Mrs. E. Buler of Lamar and an elder sister who lives near Earlsville and one son Guy Gammon, now night agent at the Missouri Pacific railway at this point. GRAFF INFANT	Lamar Democrat, July 18, 1889 Iantha---The Angel of Death has visited out little village and the families of Messers. Graf, Pierce, and Jeffers each mourn the loss of a member. All were little children and cholera infantum was the same in each case.
GRAHAM, NANCY J.	Lamar Democrat, December 12, 1889 Died December 1 st , 1889 at her home, surrounded by her family and friends, Mrs. Nancy J. Graham. For eight months she had suffered from an incurable disease and the pain and suffering endured by her will never be known. Mrs. Graham was born in Frederickburg, Ohio, in January 1837, and married Christopher Graham, in 1857. Mrs. Graham joined the Methodist Church when she was a child and has ever been a faithful and consistent member. She leaves behind to mourn her a husband and eight children, one brother and one sister. The funeral was conducted by Rev. C. V. Criss and largely attended. Pelan Graham of Jackson, Ohio was in town for his mother's funeral.
GRIGSBY, H. R. MRS.	Lamar Democrat, January 24, 1889 Mrs. H. R. Grigsby, wife of G. W. Grigsby died at her residence in this city on Friday January 18 th of consumption. The funeral services were held on Saturday and the remains were taken to Dewitt, Missouri for interment. She leaves two boys of tender age and her husband to mourn her loss.
GROOM, P. W.	Lamar Democrat, November 7, 1889 P. W. Groom, brother-in-law of Jos. Kennedy died suddenly at his home in Terra Haute last Saturday. Mr. and Mrs. Kennedy left to attend the funeral at St. Louis. Mrs. Groom who is known to a number of ladies here is left a widow with 3 children.

<p>HAMILTON, JESSE</p>	<p>Lamar Democrat, August 1, 1889 Willie Hamilton, son of John Hamilton of Union township shot and killed his little brother Jesse, seven years of age, under the following circumstances. They were visiting their grandmother, Mrs. Starke, at the residence of Mrs. Caldwell. While Mrs. Starke was out doing washing in the back yard the boys were playing horse thief in the house using sticks for guns. Finally Willie saw the gun in the corner. He had never held a gun before and upon trying to cock the hammer his thumb slipped and the load of buckshot hit Jesse. One shot went beneath the eye and the other 2 in his neck killing him instantly. On Saturday morning little Jesse was buried at the Bates Cemetery, the funeral being preached by Rev. Burr. Mr. and Mrs. Hamilton have lived in this county for five years and had a family of 8 children. They never let the children handle guns. The gun that shot Jesse had been borrowed by the sons of Mrs. Caldwell to do some hunting. Parents can draw their own conclusions from this.</p>
<p>HARKLESS, HAZEL</p>	<p>Lamar Democrat, August 1, 1889 Died in Lamar on Sunday morning August 4th, at 10:30 o'clock, Hazel Harkless, infant daughter of Mr. and Mrs. T. W. Harkless, age one year and 12 days. The funeral took place on Monday morning at 10 o'clock and was largely attended. Rev. C. C. Young made a few remarks that were very appropriate. Messrs. Cole, Avery, Clarkson, and Boulton sang at the grave "Nearer to Thee" in such a manner to affect everyone present.</p>
<p>HARLOW, J. M.</p>	<p>Lamar Democrat, March 21, 1889 The news of the sudden death of J. M. Harlow, at Peru, Kansas was a shock to this community. Sunday he took the train at Kenoma to Peru on business. On Monday afternoon at 4 o'clock he died. The Odd Fellows of Lamar attended the funeral at Golden City.</p>
<p>HARRISON DAUGHER</p>	<p>Lamar Democrat, August 1, 1889 Dr. Mark Harrison's little daughter died at their home in Nevada last week.</p>
<p>HASSELTON, ALLIE</p>	<p>Lamar Democrat, February 14, 1889 Died at the residence of her father, on Sunday, February 10, 1889, Allie Hasselton, age 27 years, 6 months, and 12 days. Her funeral took place on Tuesday and was largely attended.</p>

HAZLETT, J. M.	<p>Lamar Democrat, April 11, 1889 We regret to announce the death of J. M. Hazlett on Tuesday last. He was buried on Wednesday.</p> <p>Lamar Democrat, April 18, 1889. J. I. Hazlett was 75 years of age at the time of his death. He was born in New Jersey, spent a number of years in Nebraska and settled in Barton county in 1875. He has been a member of the church for over 30 years. He left 4 children, all grown, all were present in his dying hour. His wife died a number of years ago and he raised the family without her guidance. His illness was of short duration. On Friday before his death he was in good health in Lamar and on the way home he was taken with a chill that was speedily followed by pneumonia and he died on Tuesday. (This time his name was J. I. HAZLETT, LEVI	<p>Lamar Democrat, September 5, 1889 Levi Hazlett well known in this county was killed near Tallequah, Indian Territory on Friday last under the following circumstances: He was hauling lumber from Fort Gibson to a colored college, 5 miles north of Tallequah. Going down a steep hill he was thrown from the wagon under the mule team. This caused them to kick and run. A Mr. Hazelwood, who was a short distance ahead came back to his aid. When he got to him Hazlett was still alive and trying to get up, but could not. He lived for about a half hour. An examination of his body showed that he had been kicked in the back of the head, the corks on the mule's shoes making ugly marks, and breaking his skull. His back was broken and 2 ribs were torn loose from the spinal column. His brother Joseph Hazlett started for the scene on Saturday afternoon, arriving at Tallequah on Sunday morning in time for the funeral. The deceased was the son of Joseph M. Hazlett of this county. There were 7 sons, Levi being the fourth, about 27 years.</p>
HELMS, MARY MRS.	<p>Lamar Democrat, July 18, 1889 Mrs. Mary Helms, daughter of Wm. Onstott, Esrom, died on the 14th of July. She has been suffering with consumption, but she felt well enough today to go out to the well to get a drink of water. She died before she could return to the house. She was about 33 year of age.</p>
HERLOCKER, REED	<p>Lamar Democrat, November 14, 1889 We regret to announce the death of little Reed Herlocker, aged 4 years, son of J. M. Herlocker of Milford. He has been a sufferer of some spinal disease.</p>

Mr. Petty on business at 11:00 found him in the field lying down, excusing himself that he had been to lodge the night before and had a headache and pain in his side. About 2 o'clock Mr. Petty again went to the field and seeing the horses idle called to Mr. Lake who opened his mouth to speak but could not. He took Mr. Lake home, medical assistance was summoned but could do nothing for him and at eight o'clock Friday morning he was dead. He was buried on Sunday, the Masons having full charge of the funeral, in the cemetery about one and one half miles north of Iantha. The funeral procession was the largest we have ever seen in this county. Rev. R. M. Cole officiated. He had insured himself for his family for \$5000.00.
LEDBETTER, M. H.	Lamar Democrat, November 28, 1889 M. H. Ledbetter came to Lamar last May and brought with him a young wife. She became dissatisfied and they sold their property here and moved to Florida. She became dissatisfied there and they went back to Kansas, at Pittsburg, but there they didn't even unpack their goods, but moved again back to Jewell county, Kansas where they formerly lived. Mr. Ledbetter finding his means all gone, his substance all gone from moving from place to place quietly took his own life. It is not necessary to point out the moral here.
LIGHTNER, LEN	Lamar Democrat, July 11, 1889 Little Len Lightner, son of Mr. and Mrs. E. H. Lightner, of Kansas City died in that city at 5 o'clock Saturday morning, aged 4 months and 18 days.

A doctor was summoned but before his arrival Mr. Wolverton was dead. We learn that the cause of this fearful act was domestic infelicity.
