BARBER, CHAS.	Lamar Democrat, December 28, 1893 Chas. Barber, well known in this county, died at his home on the Vernon county line last week. His age was reported to us as 90 years. He leaves a family of 10 children. He lived at Sedalia many years and was at one time reputed wealthy, but his estate has been spent in the courts and he had but little left at the time of his death.

The little fellow was an only son and had been sick from the date of birth, but seemed as well as usual on Saturday morning when the parents brought him to the city. In the forenoon he grew much worse, and 2 physicians were summoned, but nothing could be done, and he died at 7 o'clock Saturday evening. Little Jay was taken back home and buried at Forest Grove Cemetery. Mr. and Mrs. Bateman feel deeply impressed by the kindness of their friends in the neighborhood of their home and also by the citizens in the west part of Lamar who came to do all they could as soon as the condition of the child was learned. <p>BENCH, EBENEZER</p>	<p>Lamar Democrat, April 20, 1893 Ebenezer Bench, who lived with his mother about 14 miles east of Lamar, was drowned in one foot of water last Tuesday while prostrated by an epileptic fit. He was about 45 years of age and had been subject to the attacks all his life.</p>
<p>BINGHAM, NANCY MRS.</p>	<p>Lamar Democrat, January 26, 1893 Died on Friday morning January 20th, 1893, Mrs. Nancy Bingham, mother of Parley Bingham, at the age of 85 years, 3 months, and 1 day. <p>BOLLINGER, HENRY</p>	<p>Lamar Democrat, July 13, 1893 Henry Bollinger, who died at Lamar, July 5th at his home, was born August 2nd, 1812 at Berengen, Canton Schaufhausen, Switzerland, from which place he emigrated to America in the year 1852. He first settled in Clark county, Indiana. When he sold his farm there, he moved to Barton county, Missouri and located 6 miles north of Lamar to live. He had 3 sons and 3 daughters, two of the sons are dead. John Bollinger, Mrs. Hoffman, Mrs. Wolfe, and Mrs. Lewis Cass survive him. Mr. Bollinger's first wife died 21 years ago at the age of 63. He married again and his widow survives him. He leaves forty grandchildren and 2 great grandchildren. He died of old age and passed away sleeping to awake no more on earth. He died as he had lived, with a living faith and hope to enter that eternal rest prepared for the people of God. The funeral services were conducted by Rev. Greenlees of the Congregational Church and Rev. Boving of the Presbyterian Church. These gentlemen visited him frequently during his illness. Just prior to his death, Mr. Bollinger donated \$50.00 to the new Methodist Church and \$50.00 to the Presbyterian Church in Doylesport township on the old home place. The telegram announcing his death was received by his daughter, Mrs. M. J. Barney, with whom he had lived for a considerable time. His death was old age and the weakness incident thereto. For the last eight years he passed most of his time with his daughters, Mrs. Barney and Mrs. Walker now deceased.

With her teacher and school-mates, very quiet, but loved by all who knew her. Her last hours with loved ones were sad indeed, it seemed their cup was too bitter for human nature to endure; for two little brothers were lying low, burning with the raging fever. No one but God knew but they too would be called away. But it has been God's will to spare them. Grieve not then, dear father, mother, sisters, and brothers, but strive to meet her in that bright land where there is no separation, and sorrow, is not known. You will miss Lute, oh so much.

He leaves a wife and 3 interesting little girls, May, Jennie, and Addie, aged respectively, 13, 10, and 8. For 5 months past the family has suffered from typhoid fever, each member suffering from the disease. All recovered till finally the head of the house was taken down about 5 weeks ago, He was highly respected, a consistent, active Christian gentleman and member of the Methodist Episcopal Church. BURNETT, MARY MRS.	<p>Lamar Democrat, November 2, 1893 Mrs. Mary Burnett, of Ohio, who was visiting relatives near Sheldon, died last Saturday night. Her remains were shipped to Middletown, Ohio on Sunday.</p>
CABLE, MARY	<p>Lamar Democrat, July 6, 1893 Mary Cable, 14 year old daughter of Jonathan Cable died last week. Mr. Cable had lately brought her from the blind asylum at St. Louis. She has been a great sufferer, but never complained.</p>

COLEMAN, EMMA MRS.	Lamar Democrat, August 10, 1893 Died at her home in St. Louis, Missouri Friday August 4 th , 1893 Mrs. Emma Coleman, wife of W. T. Coleman, aged 27 years, 11 months, and 7 days. This announcement was a shock to the many friends of the deceased as none of them had heard of the sickness. As Miss Emma Richards, a large number of people in the county knew her for years. She was engaged in business here and enjoyed the patronage of the majority of the ladies in this county. After her marriage to Mr. Coleman she left us and settled in St. Louis where her husband engaged in business. The news of her death was telegraphed to her relatives who came from Denver and other distant points to be present at the funeral. Mrs. Richards went to St. Louis but arrived too late to see her alive. The body arrived in Lamar on Sunday night and was buried in Lake Cemetery on Monday morning. The funeral services were held at the Presbyterian Church and they were very impressive indeed. The sermon by Rev. Boving being one of the ablest and most touching to which we ever listened. She leaves a little babe about 2 weeks old that is now in the care of Mrs. Richards, the grandmother of the child. Mrs. Coleman was the picture of life, of joy, of happiness. Only a few hours before her death she looked well and the color had not left her face.
COMSTOCK, FAMILY	Lamar Democrat, October 19, 1893 Jerico poisoning---Mr. and Mrs. Comstock, their 10 year old son and Mrs. Wallace, sister of Mrs. Comstock, were all poisoned and died from the effects. The poison was put in their food they had for supper.
CONES, MARTHA D. MRS.	Lamar Democrat, July 27, 1893 Died at her home in Lamar on Wednesday July 19 th , at 6:40 p.m., Mrs. Martha D. Cones, aged 63 years, 9 months, and 20 days. The funeral took place from her late residence on Friday morning at 10 o'clock and was largely attended. She was born in Kentucky and at an early age moved to Indiana and while attending the schools of that state met her husband, Sam Cones, who was her schoolmate. They were engaged while attending school. Mr. and Mrs. Cones have lived together as man and wife for 47 years. There have been born to them 8 children, only two of whom are now living---Mrs. Ella Watkins and Mrs. Callie Fast. The marriage took place at Clarksburg, Decatur county, Indiana. Mr. and Mrs. Cones moved to Illinois from Indiana, but remained only a year and a half, returning to

	<p>their old home. In 1857 they moved to north Missouri and have lived in this state ever since. Mrs. Cones, prior to her marriage joined the Christian Church and has ever since been a faithful member. HIXENBAUGH, ANNIE B. MRS.	<p>Lamar Democrat, February 2, 1893 Died at her home near Lamar, on Saturday January 28th, at 1 o'clock, p.m., Mrs. Annie B. Hixenbaugh, aged 36 years. Mrs. Hixenbaugh was a sister of Dr. J. K. Cole and John B. Cole, the lawyer. She was married in April 1878, to Chas. Hixenbaugh. The family moved first to Iowa and from there to Lamar in 1884, and have resided here since that date. She leaves a family of 4 children---2 boys and 2 girls. The oldest Ollie, is now 14 years, the youngest 4 years of age. Mrs. Hixenbaugh died of consumption and her sufferings of late have been very great. 	<p>Ingersoll had been run over by the cars and was fatally hurt. The account given to us by H. C. Lemon is as follows: Mr. Ingersoll was personally superintending the switching of coal cars to be loaded at the Kirkwood shaft. He was on a coal car and the train was backing in on the switch. A sudden stop caused him to fall between two cars in such a position as to have both legs across the rail, one doubled in such a manner as to be crushed by the car wheels, both above and below the knee. The first wheel of one truck had passed over him before the train stopped, but the second wheel of the truck was on his limb when the trainmen arrived. He was immediately removed and taken to his home and was fully conscious of everything, even asking if it was necessary to amputate both legs. The accident happened at 8 o'clock that night. A consultation of physicians was held and it was determined not to amputate as he could live only a few hours at most. He displayed wonderful fortitude and grit. Mr. Ingersoll came to Minden from Conoma, Kansas about 2 years ago and had charge of the store of Ingersoll and Company, through which firm the miners in Kirkwood shaft received their monthly wages. He was a thorough businessman, about thirty five years of age with no vices—temperate and strictly moral. He had sold the store and began work at the shaft as a superintendent. He was liked by all who knew him, as he was an honest straight man in all his dealings. He leaves a wife and one child. The body was taken to Conoma, Kansas on Monday for burial.</p>

His sickness was of short duration, only one week. He seemed to grow worse from the hour he was taken down. His disease was pronounced pneumonia, and this was complicated with heart trouble. He never appreciated fully, how sick he was, and was conscious to the end. It was a source of regret that Mrs. McCutchan was not present at the time of his death.
