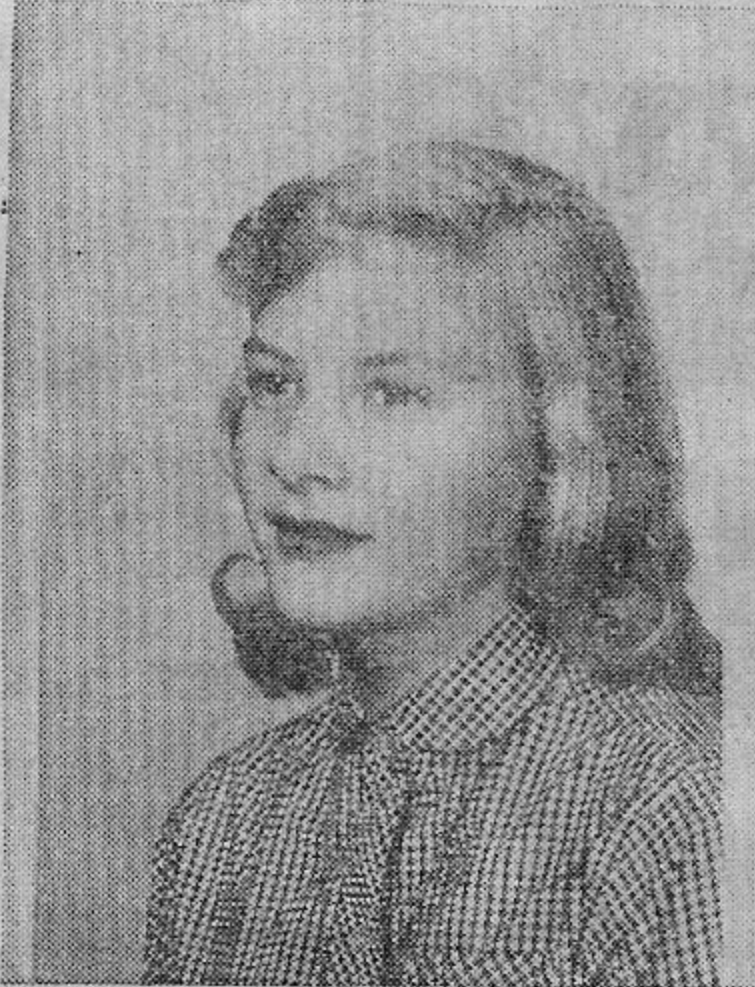

HUNDREDS AT FUNERAL OF WOOLDRIDGE BANKER

FARRIS HOPKINS, WHO KILLED SELF, BURIED SUNDAY

Ill Health Caused Rash Act.—One of Community's Most Useful Men

Hundreds of friends attended the funeral Sunday afternoon of Farris Hopkins, Wooldridge banker, who committed suicide Saturday morning by shooting himself in the head with a revolver while in the bank alone. The act was committed about 10:15 o'clock and the body was found a short time afterwards by E. L. Kingsbury, Wooldridge merchant, who had an appointment with Mr. Hopkins. At the inquest held by County Coroner Herman Schwitzky, Mr. Kingsbury stated that on going to the bank he found the door locked, and on looking through the window saw the body of Mr. Hopkins lying on the floor with the revolver at his side.

Mr. Kingsbury immediately summoned Hooper Wooldridge and they entered the bank building through a window. They found everything in order but the vault door had been opened by Mr. Hopkins when he secured the revolver with which he ended his life. The verdict of the jury was that Mr. Hopkins came to his death from a self-inflicted gunshot wound.

Mr. Hopkins had been in ill health for a number of years and following the closing of the Bank of Wooldridge, where he had been employed as assistant cashier, he brooded greatly over business conditions. No blame whatever was attached to him for the bank's suspending business but the acute financial conditions which have followed seemed to prey upon the unfortunate's man mind and caused him to commit the rash act.

The funeral was in charge of the I. O. O. F. Lodge, of Boonville, of which Mr. Hopkins was an honored member. Over eighty members were in line of march. Rev. C. W. Kent, pastor of the Baptist church at Prairie Home, preached the funeral sermon, and was followed by Dr. O. W. Cochran, a life-long friend and associate of Mr. Hopkins, who paid a touching tribute to the memory of his dead friend, telling how closely intermingled was the life of Wooldridge and the life of the dead man and how he had served the community as town clerk, school clerk, Sunday school superintendent and church treasurer.

Interment took place in the Wooldridge cemetery, A. L. Haun, of the Odd Fellows lodge, officiating at the grave. Active pallbearers were, Newton Good, Lon Freeman, Wilbur Freeman, Hogan Bruce, Grover Vaughan and Hugh Bruce, while the honorary pallbearers were, W. J. Good, Dr. O. W. Cochran, E. L. Kingsbury, John W. Bruce, H. McGee and R. D. Pealer.

Farris B. Hopkins was born on a farm near Wooldridge thirty-nine years ago and spent his entire life in that community. He was never married and is survived by his parents, Mr. and Mrs. H. H. Hopkins, and a sister, Miss Vergna Hopkins.

Mr. Hopkins had been a member of the Baptist Church for many years and lived an exemplary life. His tragic death brought much sorrow not only to his immediate family but to everyone in the Wooldridge community.

During his life time he owned three flour mills, located at Russellville, Big Lick, and Huntsdale. Although he operated these flour mills he never gave up his threshing career. At the early age

of 15 he helped as chore boy around a thresher, and at the age of 20 he had in his possession a machine which was operated by horse power.

As inventions grew more modern he equipped himself accordingly his next step was to buy a steam engine guided by horse, and later an all steam driven equipment. To date he being the oldest man in the community and the oldest thresherman having to his credit 66 years of laboring with such and 61 years in possession of a threshing rig.

At the time of the accident causing his death he was on a mission of getting new parts for his engine to begin work this harvest.

Mr. Renfrow was an enthusiastic church and civic worker, being a member of the Copps Chapel Cemetery Board, and one that will be greatly missed. In early childhood he joined the Methodist church and in later life transferred his membership to the Splice Creek Methodist church.

Beside his wife, Mrs. Linnie Renfrow and children who mourn his death are one brother, James Renfrow of Overton, two sisters, Mrs. Martha Windsor, Overton, Mrs. Alamanza Korsen of Prairie Home, and two half brothers, Jerry, of Wooldridge, and George, of Boonville.

Citizens of Prairie Home were saddened on Friday evening when the word came from Chillicothe that Frank McDonald, "Mr. Mac," as he was known to his friends, had passed away there at the home of his son, C. He had been in failing health for several years, but had been much worse for the past few weeks, and tho everything humanly possible was done for him he grew steadily weaker until last Wednesday morning when he sank into a coma from which he did not emerge. The accident occurred when the south end of the bridge fell about 18 feet, releasing overhead timbers that supported the cable of the suspension structure, which is about two hundred feet long. The men were working on the floor of the bridge and were crushed by the falling timbers.

The bridge was condemned about a month ago by Edgar T. Hale, of Boonville, county highway engineer, but traffic had continued over it. The men in the accident were replacing timbers

at the time of the tragedy. All were members of the work crew except Albert Stock, who had stopped and was looking on.

Anton Beck, Sr., had the contract and the other workers were employed by him. Mr. Beck is survived by his widow and six sons and five daughters.

He had been awarded the contract by the Cooper County court.

As the Petite Saline cannot be forded, travel now must go via the Rankin or Campbell bridge.

HUNDREDS AT FUNERAL OF WOOLDRIDGE BANKER

FARRIS HOPKINS, WHO KILLED
SELF, BURIED SUNDAY

Ill Health Caused Rash Act.—One
of Community's Most Useful
Men

Hundreds of friends attended the funeral Sunday afternoon of Farris Hopkins, Wooldridge banker, who committed suicide Saturday morning by shooting himself in the head with a revolver while in the bank alone. The act was committed about 10:15 o'clock and the body was found a short time afterwards by E. L. Kingsbury, Wooldridge merchant, who had an appointment with Mr. Hopkins. At the inquest held by County Coroner Herman Schwitzky, Mr. Kingsbury stated that on going to the bank he found the door locked, and on looking through the window saw the body of Mr. Hopkins lying on the floor with the revolver at his side.

Mr. Kingsbury immediately summoned Hooper Wooldridge and they entered the bank building through a window. They found everything in order but the vault door had been opened by Mr. Hopkins when he secured the revolver with which he ended his life. The verdict of the jury was that Mr. Hopkins came to his death from a self-inflicted gunshot wound.

Mr. Hopkins had been in ill health for a number of years and following the closing of the Bank of Wooldridge, where he had been employed as assistant cashier, he brooded greatly over business conditions. No blame whatever was attached to him for the bank's suspending business but the acute financial conditions which have followed seemed to prey upon the unfortunate's man mind and caused him to commit the rash act.

The funeral was in charge of the I. O. O. F. Lodge, of Boonville, of which Mr. Hopkins was an honored member. Over eighty members were in line of march. Rev. C. W. Kent, pastor of the Baptist church at Prairie Home, preached the funeral sermon, and was followed by Dr. O. W. Cochran, a life-long friend and associate of Mr. Hopkins, who paid a touching tribute to the memory of his dead friend, telling how closely intermingled was the life of Wooldridge and the life of the dead man and how he had served the com-

munity as town clerk, school clerk, Sunday school superintendent and church treasurer.

Interment took place in the Wooldridge cemetery, A. L. Haun, of the Odd Fellows lodge, officiating at the grave. Active pallbearers were, Newton Good, Lon Freeman, Wilbur Freeman, Hogan Bruce, Grover Vaughan and Hugh Bruce, while the honorary pallbearers were, W. J. Good, Dr. O. W. Cochran, E. L. Kingsbury, John W. Bruce, H. McGee and R. D. Pealer.

Farris B. Hopkins was born on a farm near Wooldridge thirty-nine years ago and spent his entire life in that community. He was never married and is survived by his parents, Mr. and Mrs. H. H. Hopkins, and a sister, Miss Vergna Hopkins.

Mr. Hopkins had been a member of the Baptist Church for many years and lived an exemplary life. His tragic death brought much sorrow not only to his immediate family but to everyone in the Wooldridge community.

Charles Britton Takes Own Life

Gun Shot Wound Fatal to World War I Veteran—Funeral this Afternoon

Surviving are three brothers and two sister, William and Miss Frances of the home, Mrs. Lula Moore of Latham, George of California and Clarence near the home. His father died April 4 and his mother June 22 of this year.

**Dies of Bullet Wound in Head—
Coroner, Says Case of
Suicide**

Mrs. Effie Bell Mills, 50, wife of Elzie L. Mills, was found dead in the basement at the home of her son and daughter-in-law, Mr. and Mrs. Lewis Mills, about 7:30 p. m. Monday, November 21, 1949. She died of a bullet wound in her head. A pistol lay beside her body. Dr. Kenyon S. Latham, coroner, viewed the body and pronounced it a case of suicide.

Mrs. Mills, who lived in what is known as the Jack Howard property near the south end of Taylor St., went to the home of her son on highway 50 opposite the City Park about 8 a. m. that day to do her laundry. It was her habit to do this work at the home of her son rather than in her home on account of better facilities there.

Her husband had gone to the Fred Clenin farm north of California to spend the day helping Herbert Clenin cut wood. Ernie Johnson was picking some ducks and a goose for Lewis Mills and Jack Ziehmer in the Lewis Mills home basement. Mrs. Mills waited upstairs for Ernie to finish before going down to do her laundry work.

About that time Mr. and Mrs. Lewis Mills and his brother, L. D., left to drive to St. Louis to see the showing of the new Pontiac automobile for which Lewis is local dealer.

Jack Ziehmer returned to the Mills home about nine o'clock to get his dressed fowls and probably was the last person to see Mrs. Mills alive.

Before she took her life, Mrs. Mills did her washing, poured out the wash water and cleaned up the basement. She secured the pistol, which belonged to Lewis, from a room on the main floor of the house and left a note on that floor saying she did not want to live any longer and that her body would be in the basement.

It is believed that she fired the shot about 12 o'clock, judging from the condition of the body when it was found.

When Elzie Mills returned from the Clenin farm about 6 o'clock in the evening and did not find his wife at home he contacted his son, J. T. Mills of this city, and neighbors, including Mr. and Mrs. Sam Sanders who live near the Lewis Mills home. None had seen Mrs. Mills since morning. Then they went to the Lewis Mills home where J. T. found his mother's body.

News of Mrs. Mills's death was relayed from here by Patrolman Harold Priess to a patrolman east of Jefferson City who contacted Mr. and Mrs. Lewis Mills and L. D. Mills at Linn about 8 o'clock that evening as they were on their way home. The patrolman told the Mills' there had been a death in their family but they did not know who it was until they reached home.

The body was taken to the Williams Funeral Home where it remained until the funeral services at the Methodist Church at 3 o'clock Wednesday afternoon, the Rev. Geo. Heslar officiating. Burial was in the City Cemetery.

Mrs. Mills, a daughter of the late Jobe Johnson and of Mrs. Nancy Kelly of Boonville, was born near Wooldridge on December 10, 1898. She was married to Mr. Mills on December 23, 1913. They moved here from Boonville last March when they purchased from Henry Meisel the property in which they lived.

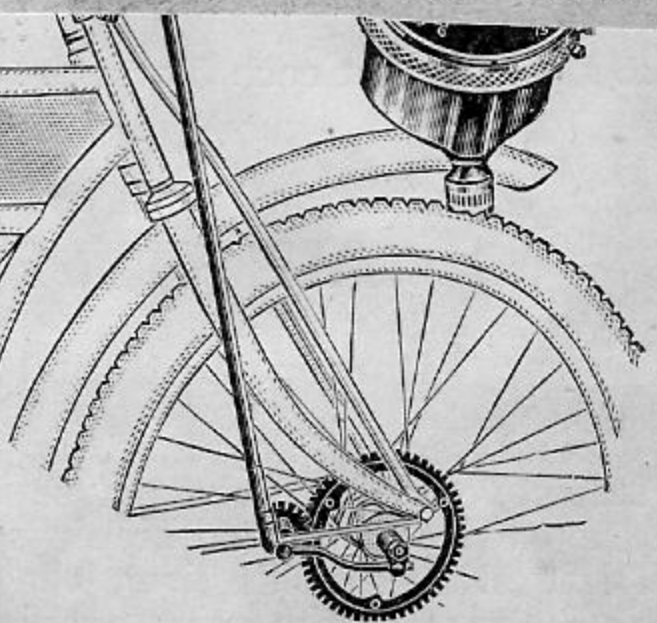

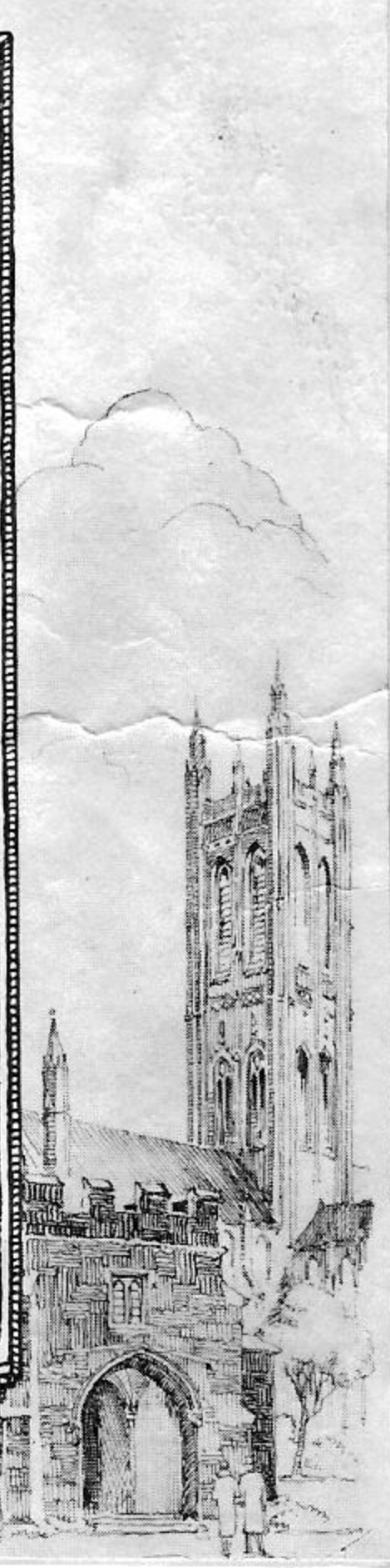

DIXIE

(Our Local Christmas Story)

Dixie. Her eyes reflect the glory of the star of Bethlehem. Her smile radiates the true spirit of Christmas. She is Boonville's living example of the Soul of the Yuletide season.

I had heard of Dixie's happy, courageous nature, unbroken by years as an invalid in bed, but I did not meet her until I went in search of a Christmas story this week. I called at the modest home of Dixie's mother, Mrs. Nellie Burton, 204 Vine street, on Wednesday evening and asked if I might talk to Dixie. Although I was a stranger, Mrs. Burton welcomed me into Dixie's room and led me to the side of Dixie's bed.

Dixie. It is a pretty name, isn't it? There she lay, propped up on her pillows, smiling a welcome to her visitor. Mrs. Burton asked me to be seated and Dixie's dark eyes shone with anticipation of making a new friend. The room was cozy and there were traces of Christmas preparations strewn about. Several bright red packages lay at the foot of the bed and the aroma of a fresh-cut cedar in another room permeated the air. Through the window the lights of Christmas twinkled over a landscape of clean, new snow.

The story of Dixie's life is drama. Exactly 17 years before the evening of my visit with her she was stricken with infantile paralysis. At that time she was only 3 days old. The attack left one side paralyzed but she fought off the disease and after a year or two she was able to romp about like other children. But Fate was unkind to Dixie. At the age of 4 the laughing, healthy child fell while playing with her sister, Mildred, and bruised her hip. The injury grew into tuberculosis of the bone and left her body broken. But Dixie's spirit was not broken like her body. After several years she was able to attend school part of each term and succeeded in reaching the sixth grade. But it seemed that Fate had more than a just share of bitter portion for Dixie. At the age of 14 she developed tuberculosis in the lungs and was forced to quit school. Since that time, for nearly four long years, Dixie has been confined to her bed.

The smile on Dixie's face faded for a moment as she told me how she and her sister, Mildred, were romping between the kitchen and the bedroom when she fell and bruised her hip which led to the racking disease.

"I fell right there," she said, and pointed with her eyes to the doorway near the head of her bed. The fall, the type of which most children have sustained many times, has become vivid in her memory.

No greater love, and courage, and devotion exists than that exemplified by Mrs. Burton and her 17-year old daughter, Dixie. Mrs. Burton was left a widow when her children were yet small. But she has struggled through the years, and, despite obstacles which would down most of us, she now has her own home and cares tenderly for her children. She works at the shoe factory to provide for the home. She toiled under the sorrow of Dixie's broken health but was spurred by the triumphant thought of her younger daughter, Mildred, in Boonville high school. But Fate, its bitterness still unspent, intervened again and Mildred became ill with tuberculosis. She was forced to quit high school and was sent to Mt. Vernon where today she is said to be on the road to recovery.

It would do your soul good to visit Dixie and her mother—you who know nothing but good health and plenty. It would make you ashamed to ever again use the word "depression" or to feel sorry for yourself. It would make your heart swell with a strange happiness to hear Dixie say that she doesn't mind to lie in bed year after year.

"I don't feel sick at all," Dixie says. "The doctor tells me I must stay in bed but I really feel like I can get up soon. I am sure I will be well and able to get out of bed by next year."

I marveled at such faith and cheerfulness. "But Dixie," I asked, "don't you get awfully tired and unhappy staying in bed all the time?"

"No, it is not so bad after getting used to it," the happy-hearted child answered. "You see my friends are kind to me. They visit me and I love to talk to them. I would like to go to the movies and to school but that is impossible. I like to read and work puzzles and listen to the radio. The time passes by fast."

Dixie has a canary, too, which sings to her. She also has quite a collection of china dogs (more than 100, in fact) on a shelf above her bed. I asked her what would happen if one should turn a cat loose in front of all those dogs and she laughed heartily. But the laugh was broken with a troublesome cough which seemed to break rudely into the midst of her natural cheerfulness.

Faith. If only all the world had the faith of Dixie. Heart of gold. If only all humanity possessed the happy heart of Dixie. Kindness. If only all civilization could be blessed with the purity and kindness of Dixie.

Dixie—a little, helpless girl bearing unto us the true Soul of the Yuletide. My Christmas shall be happier if I have made you acquainted with Dixie.

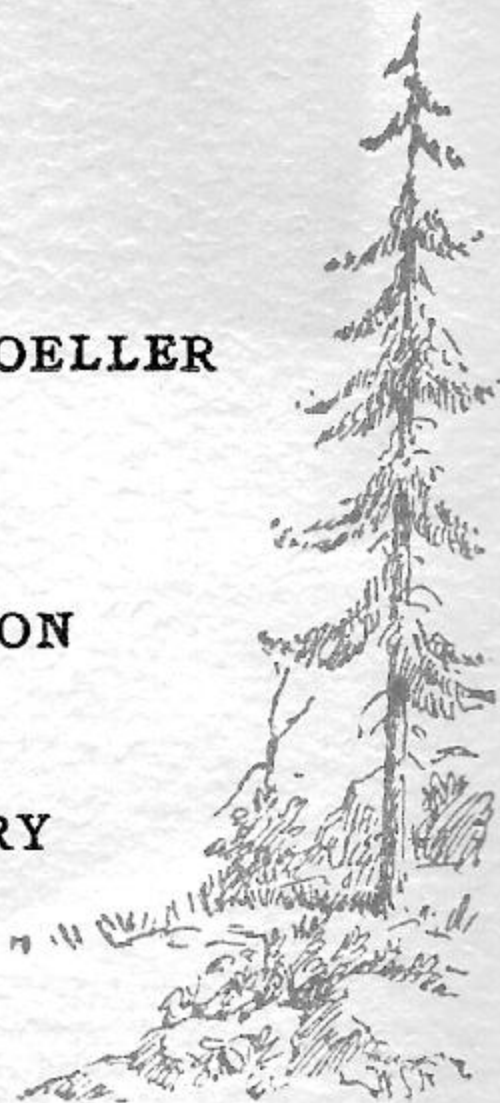

NF Marshal, Brother-in-Law Killed in High-Speed Chase

NEW FRANKLIN—Double funeral services will be held at 2:30 p.m. Tuesday at the New Franklin Christian Church for the town's marshal, J. Edgar Chipley, and his brother-in-law, Daniel Lee Wagner, Rt. 1, Franklin, who died over the weekend of injuries sustained in a high-speed chase Saturday night.

Wagner was killed out-

right when the Chipley patrol car went out of control at the south end of the MKT Highway 5 viaduct at the New Franklin city limits. Witnesses to the crash said a car turned left directly in front of the marshal's car, onto a road which runs beside the viaduct. Chipley died at 2:40 a.m. Sunday, four hours after the accident, from head injuries.

The Chipley vehicle swerved to the left to miss the turning vehicle, then swung back to the right to avoid an oncoming car. The car's red light was blinking at the time of the accident.

The marshal's car went out of control, skidded sideways into a ditch, and traveled 150 feet before striking a tree. Both the marshal and his brother-in-law

were thrown from the car. Wagner was pinned under the car, Chipley was thrown 50 feet from the point where the vehicle stopped. Chipley's 15-year-old son, Daniel Neil, was riding in the back seat of the car. He suffered lacerations and was hospitalized at St. Joseph hospital, then released this morning.

Both the speeding car and the car that turned, left the scene of the accident. The Highway Patrol and the Howard county sheriff's office are checking out leads as to the identity of both drivers, but Sheriff Delgar Wells said this morning that neither driver had yet been identified.

Highway Patrolman Gordon Hale, who investigated the accident, said Chipley's son could remember only that the three were conducting a speed check at the north end of the viaduct when a car came by exceeding the speed limit. The marshal gave chase and was coming down the south end of the viaduct when the car turned left in front of the vehicle. The son told Trooper Hale that was the last he remembered.

A witness to the accident, 13-year-old Carol Brink of Columbia, said she thought the car that turned was maroon and about a 1955 model. She was riding with Robert Wilborn, 21, of Franklin, and John Dodson of Boonville in a car about 100 yards behind the vehicle that turned. Wilborn, who was headed north, had to swerve to the shoulder of the road to avoid the marshal's car.

Chipley had been marshal at New Franklin for more than two years. He was first elected to that post April 3, 1957. He had also been an employee of the Missouri Training School for Boys in Boonville.

The city council is expected to appoint a new marshal to fill out Chipley's term after Tuesday.

Jessie Edgar Chipley was born Nov. 8, 1905, in Howard county, and lived there all of his life. He was the son of Orville N. and Myrtle Van Landingham Chipley. Both survive. He was married Dec. 26, 1927, to Elizabeth Wagner. Chipley was a member of the New Franklin Christian Church. He had farmed in Howard county for 21 years and had also been engaged in business in Boonsboro, Fayette, and New Franklin.

Survivors include his parents, wife and son, and two sisters, Mrs. Bernice Robertson and Mrs. Lomie Robertson, both of Rt. 2 Glasgow.

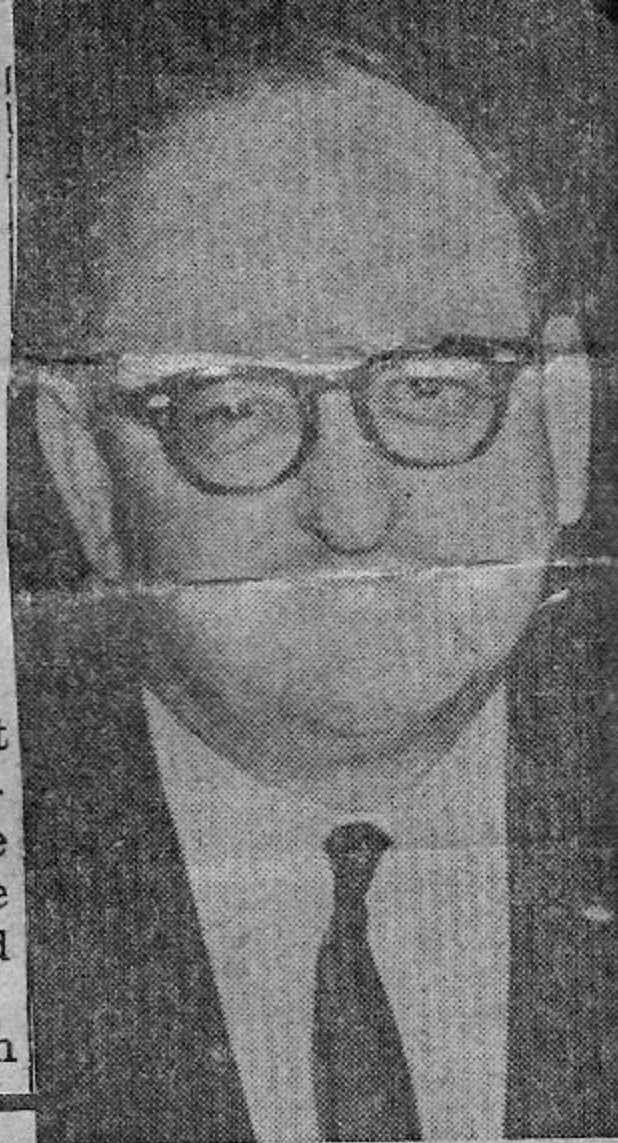

Scrivner reported that Fry had been depressed and recently had been under a doctor's care.

Statement On Spinal Meningitis Situation At Prairie Home By State Board Authority

Dr. E. K. Musson, epidemiologist in charge of contagious disease control of the Missouri State Board of Health, gave The Advertiser the following statement Wednesday in regard to the spinal meningitis outbreak at Prairie Home:

"The State Board of Health was notified of the first two cases of spinal meningitis at Prairie Home and I was sent here to investigate. Serum for treatment was made available from the state department. All the cases were seen by myself and Dr. A. L. Meredith and Dr. Warren Winn. Detailed histories of the cases and all contacts were obtained. The cases were isolated and all close contacts quarantined.

"Meningitis is one of the most difficult diseases to control. There is no specific preventative of proven value and no treatment that is as effective as in some other contagious diseases. The disease is very erratic in its contagiousness. For this reason certain control measures that can be applied to other diseases are not effective upon meningitis. The main control measures are early diagnosis, treatment with immune serum, careful histories and contacts, isolation of patients and of such contacts as may be thought advisable.

"The germ gains entrance to the body through the nose and throat. It is frequent in the throats of large numbers of people who do not contract the disease themselves and apparently do not often transfer it to others. The germ is present in perhaps 75 or 80 per cent of the entire population; fortunately, most people apparently have immunity to the disease. It is a disease of overcrowding, appearing frequently in military camps, barracks, etc. Beds should be placed far enough apart that the transmission of infection by coughing and sneezing is not probable. There is no proven preventative, but gargles are frequently used. A warm, salt-water gargle or some mild, non-irritating solution is best. The prevention of overcrowding, particularly during sleep, and the ordinary sensible routine in regard to habits, food, etc., should be practiced.

"I was notified by Dr. Meredith upon each new case. Detailed histories were obtained of patients and all contacts. All measures of known value have been instituted to control the disease. Dr. Meredith, Dr. Warren Winn, Dr. Charles Sandy, health officer, and Prairie Home city authorities have been cooperating. Schools and all public meetings have been closed. The question of quarantine of the town, and other useless measures, has been raised. Such measures would be very useless. They are sometimes even harmful toward effecting control. Dr. E. T. McGaugh, state health commissioner, advises that his department will keep in constant touch with the situation at Prairie Home and that every control measure is being taken. Local physicians are to be commended on the fact that cases were diagnosed early and given the advantage of all treatments considered effective. The disease is occurring in its most virulent form. Serum for treatment of patients and other resources of the state health department have been at the disposal of the community constantly since the first two cases were reported.

Four Victims Claimed By Meningitis

Six Cases at Prairie Home With Fatal Results To All But Two

PRECAUTIONS TAKEN TO PREVENT SPREAD

State Board of Health and Other Officials Use All Known Measures

Fear occasioned by the outbreak of spinal meningitis at Prairie Home is being allayed this week with the State Board of Health in charge and with every precaution which can be devised by medical science being mustered to care for the victims and bring the disease under control.

The disease claimed four lives from Wednesday of last week until Wednesday of this week. L. E. Schultz, 50, Henry H. Kuhn, 34, Mrs. L. L. Williamson, 33, and her daughter, Dolly Ann, 7 months old, died from the malady in virulent form.

Two other cases, bringing the total to six, are being treated. George Homer Wear, 18, became ill Sunday and Fred Sullins on Monday. They are in a critical condition. Thursday their conditions were reported unchanged with the outcome in grave doubt.

No additional cases had been reported at Wednesday noon and it was thought that the epidemic was under control with the State Board of Health, local authorities, and physicians doing everything possible to prevent spread of the disease.

All schools in the vicinity of Prairie Home, churches and public gatherings have been dismissed or postponed until the danger subsides. All the cases were quickly quarantined and isolated and all those who had come into contact with the cases were placed under surveillance of the State Board of Health.

Dr. E. K. Musson, in charge of contagious disease control of the Missouri State Board of Health, Dr. A. L. Meredith, Prairie Home physician, Dr. Warren Winn, Boonville physician, and Dr. Charles Sandy, county health officer, are cooperating to combat the disease. The facilities of the state board's laboratories, including all the serum necessary, have been made available to the community.

Dr. Musson and the physicians in charge urge all residents of that community to avoid any congregation but to go about their business in routine manner, simply taking the usual health precautions with no undue exposure.

L. E. SCHULTZ, 50 years old, died Wednesday, March 6. He was a son of Mr. and Mrs. W. H. Schultz of Lupus community. He was born and reared in Lupus and spent the greater part of his life in the Hickory Flat and Howard Creek localities. He passed away Wednesday afternoon and was buried Thursday morning, March 7, at Pisgah.

HENRY H. KUHN was born Nov. 29, 1901, the sixth child of H. G. and Anna Margaret Kuhn. He died Friday, March 8, after being ill five days. Burial was held Friday afternoon at Pisgah. On January 7, 1928, he was married to Martha Wood at the Methodist parsonage by Rev. J. W. Long. He is survived by his wife, mother, and father, and five brothers, Herman F. Kuhn of Ocheltree, Kans.; Theodore R. Kuhn of Chicago; and McKinley, Emil, and Less Kuhn of the home. One sister, Viola May, died July 29, 1895. Pallbearers were Roy Edwards, William Morris, T. W. Another Case of Spinal Meningitis

A second outbreak of spinal meningitis came to Prairie Home this weekend when Gale Green, four-year-old son of Virgil Green, was taken ill with the disease, according to Dr. A. L. Meredith of Prairie Home.

Dr. Meredith said Monday he was called to the Green home Sunday where he diagnosed the case as spinal meningitis and administered the serum. He was told the boy had complained of a headache late Saturday, but that headaches are very common among the members of that family so little was thought of it at the time. A headache is one of the first symptoms of an attack of the disease.

Schools were again dismissed Monday morning for one week. Classes will meet again next week for final examinations.

The first outbreak of the disease came on Tuesday, March 5, which four persons—L. E. Schultz, 50; Henry Kuhn, 35; Mrs. L. L. Williamson, and Mrs. Williamson's baby daughter—died. George Homer Wear, 19, a fifth victim of the disease, has recovered.

Farm Women's Club Sponsors Celebration for Dr. Arnold L. Meredith Who Has Attended the Births of 2,000 Babies.

Prairie Home, Mo.—In this farming community a Labor day celebration was held Monday with a big parade and speeches. Center of all the fanfare was the man who for nearly three decades has been the only physician within a radius of fourteen miles of here. To nearly

Every man, woman and child in these environs Dr. Arnold L. Meredith, the day's honoree, has been not only a guardian of health, but a friend. Sponsoring the celebration was the Ellis Extension Home Economics club, the president of which is Mrs. Morton Tuttle.

"It isn't simply that Dr. Meredith is our physician that we are honoring him," Mrs. Tuttle insisted, "but he is at the head of everything worthwhile in this vicinity."

And so it would appear that he is. He serves on the Prairie Home town and school boards, he is a deacon and treasurer of the Prairie Home Baptist church, a member of the chamber of commerce at Boonville, for twelve years he has served as moderator of the Concord Baptist association; he is also a member of the executive board of the Missouri Baptist association and is one of the local road commissioners. He is affiliated with state and national medical associations.

STAYS BY HIS OFFICE.

Since the day he opened an office here in the early spring of 1912, Dr. Meredith has recorded but few absences. The longest was during the first World war when he was at-

tached to the medical service of Camp Taylor, near Louisville, Ky. When medical groups hold conferences within a reasonable distance, he attends.

A single item in the long list of services rendered by this country doctor is a record of approximately 2,000 babies born in this vicinity within the last twenty-eight years whose births Dr. Meredith attended. In the caravan which rolled about the town's business center Monday were scores of "Dr. Meredith babies." Little folks up to 6 years old, walked with their mothers. Then came groups of 7, 8 and 9-year-olds, and these in their maturity, all wearing white paper hoods, made by local J. H. club girls.

The doctor's float carried a huge stork's nest in which cuddled three tiny babies.

FIRST CALLS ON A MULE.

He made his first calls riding a mule and has accepted as fees everything from corn to cash. One winter a patient delivered seventy gallons of molasses in payment of a fee long overdue.

"That was fine molasses," said Dr. Meredith, "and my son Arnold Louis, jr., sold it gallon by gallon at Fayette, where he was attending college."

Dr. Meredith occasionally pinch hits for a dentist when a tooth needs pulling and there is no one else to do it.

He has no foolish notions of ultra-philanthropy about accepting fees from patients who are able to pay them. He believes in people taking care of their just obligations. On the other hand he has yet his first time to demand assurance of fee payment from a patient.

A NATIVE MISSOURIAN.

This is not the only community which has been served by Dr. Meredith. Following his graduation from a St. Louis medical university in 1891, three days before his twenty-second birthday, he started his professional practice at Lupus. Subsequently he practiced at Wooldrige, Carrollton and Jamestown. It was in a log cabin, on a farm near Lupus, that the doctor was born sixty-one years ago.

In Monday's parade there was a float from every organization with which he is identified, with the country doctor's beflowered car leading the train. Seated beside him was Mrs. Meredith.

Mrs. Meredith was the daughter of the late Dr. S. M. Teel of Prairie Home, whose practice her husband succeeded. Besides giving people first aid treatment while her husband is out on calls, Mrs. Meredith does extensive flower gardening. The latter task is shared by their young daughter, Virginia, who also raises saddle horses. Another son, George Homer Wear, is a student in the University of Missouri medical school. F. S.

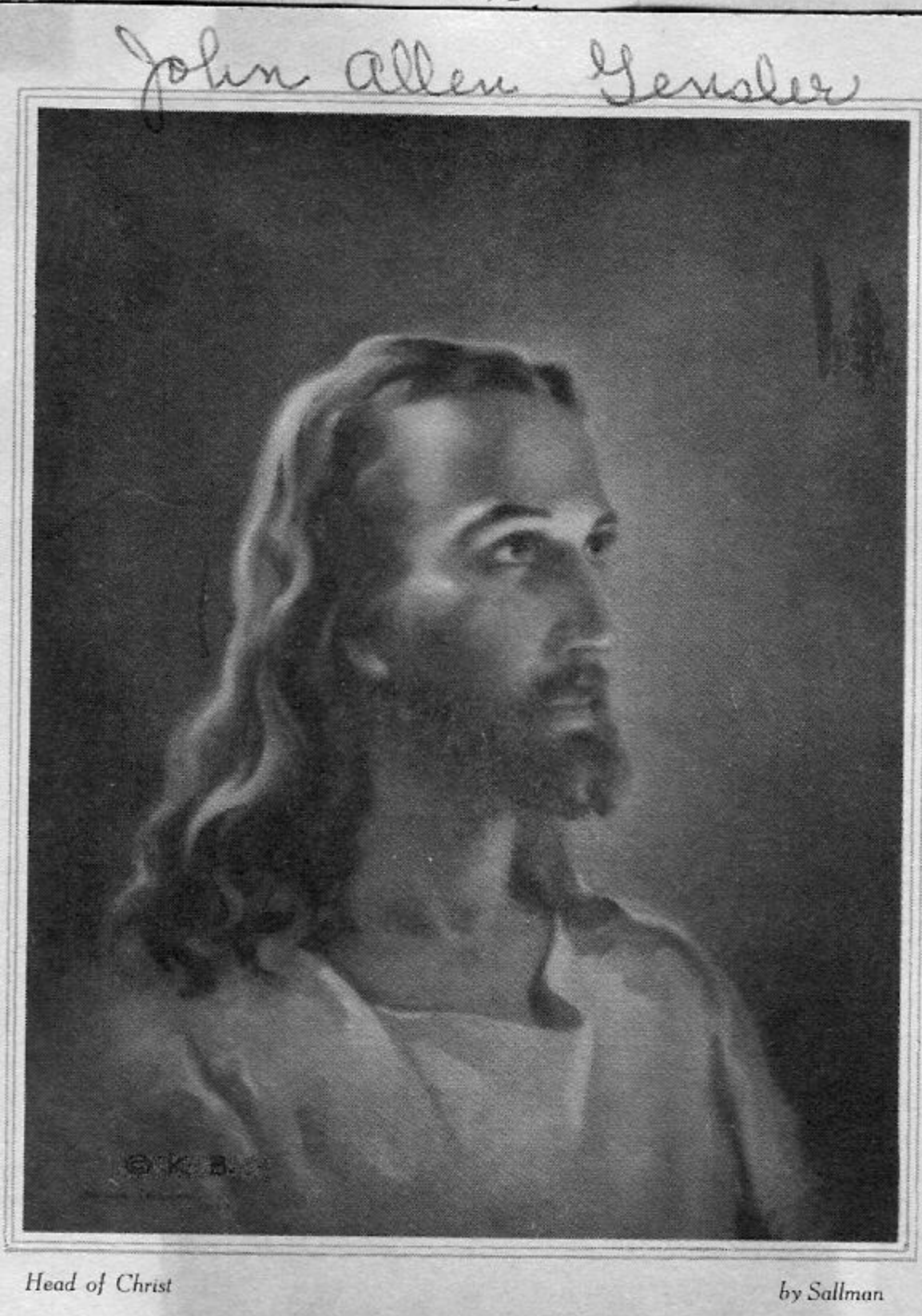

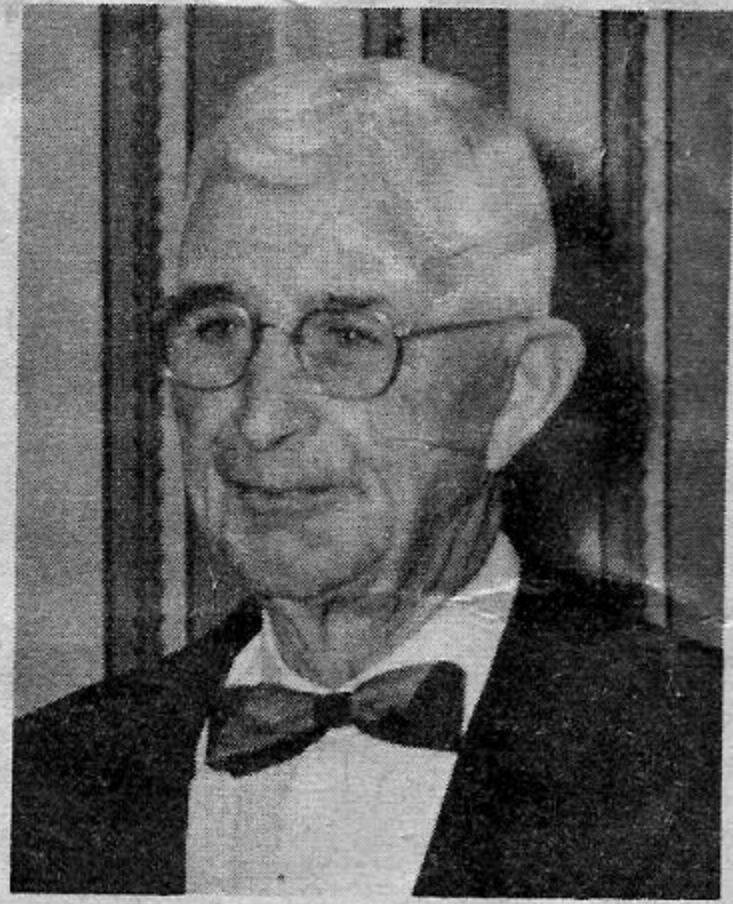

Remembrances Of Things Past

Editor's Note: These articles are being prepared for The Advertiser by the author with the hope of stimulating Boonville's interest in her rich historical past. Mr. van Ravenswaay is interested in assembling all the existing information concerning the history of Central Missouri. If you have any old books, letters, songs, documents, photographs, or remembrances of things past would you write him about them? However valueless they may appear to you they may supply some long-sought bit of information.

Stories of the Wooldridge Neighborhood

One of the first prominent families to come to Wooldridge neighborhood, was headed by Mr. Hiram Brown Hopkins, who came from Kentucky with his family and entire plantation organization and equipment, about 1854. He was interested in large scale tobacco production and found the rich bottom lands along the river well suited for his purpose. He built a fine mansion high on the bluff above his land and attempted, with considerable success, to reproduce in Missouri the manorial type of life which he had been used to in Virginia and Kentucky.

After the slaves were freed, he attempted to help them solve their social and economic problems by giving the head of each family a cabin and from three to five acres of ground. Through this arrangement he hoped that their introduction to the problems of American citizenship would not be too sudden or too difficult.

Mr. Hopkins negro body servant was named Jordan, but he was generally known as "Uncle Jerd." Each afternoon during the summer Mr. Hopkins took a short nap on his side veranda and it was "Uncle Jerd's" duty to fan him with a large feather fan and keep the flies from bothering him. One warm afternoon during the napping period some Angora goats, bought at a fancy price a short time before, began making such a noise that Mr. Hopkins was unable to sleep.

"Jerden!" he called, languidly, opening one eye.

"Yes suh!"

"Jerden I wish you'd take a gun and go down and shoot those confounded goats."

"Yes suh . . . yes suh ah'll do it," Jerden responded. The eye closed. Mr. Hopkins promptly went to sleep. A few minutes later his slumber was completely disrupted by the loud, rapid firing of a gun. He sat up, looked over the railing

of the veranda and saw "Uncle Jerd" busily at work, slaughtering the rare goats.

* * * *

After the Civil War, "Uncle Jerd" was given a little patch of ground with the other darkies. He made brooms and sold "rosberries" to eke out his slender income. One day he came to the Hopkins home with some of his produce.

"My goodness Uncle Jerd," Mrs. Hopkins said, "I am so glad to get these brooms. I just can't use brooms from the store after using yours."

"Thank yo. Thank yo mum," Uncle Jerd said with great dignity, bowing very low. "Thank yo mum, foah yo compencipity."

"Uncle Jerd" had a sister who was Mrs. Belle Winterbower's maid. She fiercely objected to her brother calling her mistress "Mizz Belly."

* * * *

When General Lyons came up the river towards Boonville with his troops on June 16, 1867, Hercules Wooldridge watched, from his home on the bluffs, the boats loaded with men steam up the river. He was young and for some time past had been practising with the neighbor boys at drilling. The sight of the soldiers filled him with enthusiasm and a vast sense of his own military worth. Hercules hastily gathered his would-be heroes and prepared to march to Boonville where the group hoped to enlist in Lyons army, never dreaming that Lyons was planning to engage in battle there. As they trudged along the road toward Boonville, they kept in the most precise military formation, calling out "Left, right, Left, right" briskly, and trying to appear very fierce. Nearing the Adams farm, east of Boonville, they began to hear a noise which sounded strangely like that of a battle. They went a little farther. It was a battle and there was a lot of shooting going on. The orderly file began to waver—the steps were no longer high or spirited. The sudden blast of a cannon stopped the "soldiers" completely. Hercules jumped in front of his companions, waved his arm, and shouted, "Scatter boys - scatter! They're shooting at us!" And scatter they did, with much speed and no order. That night they crept through the cornfields and entered their homes by way of the back doors.

In Overton Landing at the close of the last century, one of the more exciting diversions was listening to an old talking machine which a Mr. Bailey possessed. The talking machine seems to have been Mr. Bailey's single distinction for he lived in a one room cabin with a lean-to kitchen and spent most of his time down on the wharf, watching the ferry boat make its regular trips across the river. The children of the neighborhood found the mu-

sic of the talking machine very exciting indeed, and their favorite pastime was trying to get up a program so Mr. Bailey would play for them. Mr. Bailey, it seems, was stingy with his needles and would not play his machine unless the children got a sizeable audience composed of people who would be willing to perform in some manner. The children could always be sure of two grown-ups for the programs, Mr. Doane who sang a song, and Mr. John Boles who had been in the Civil War and would, as his share of the entertainment, tell of some of his experiences. It mattered not at all if everyone knew by heart the song of Mr. Doane and the stories of Mr. Boles, and had heard the Christmas speech of one of the little girls in the audience, in season and out of season, ever since Mr. Bailey began giving his entertainments. The group would crowd into the little cabin, find places on the bed, the woodbox, or the floor, and hold their breaths as the precious talking machine was brought from its resting place, wound with much gusto and the wax rolls gently set into place. After several selections Mr. Bailey would, in spite of all protest, put his machine away and insist that the audience perform. The little girl would recite her Christmas speech as fast as she could—for speed in recitations was the true test of quality in delivery in those days. Mr. Doane would follow the little girl with his song, an old English ballad that had been handed down from generation to generation for hundreds of years, called "Fair Eleanor and the Brown Girl." Mr. Doane had been reared in the Kentucky mountains and had learned the song from his mother. It concerned the killing of Lord Lovell's Lady by the "Brown Girl," and how Lord Lovell

"He cut off her head with a carving knife

And threw it against the wall."

It was a dramatic scene and the children scarcely breathed as the climax was being reached, and shivered delightfully at the word pictures. And then Mr. Boles would tell his blood and thunder tales of the Civil War. The program never varied and each was as exciting to the audience as the previous one had been.

* * * *

Mr. Doane had been on the river for many years. "I recollect one time," he was fond of telling, "that we was agoin' down the river to New Orleans, aloded wil ile. We was asailin' along as purty ez yer pleez whin all of a sudden somethin' got ablaze and Phooey!! (with appropriate gestures) the danged thing was ablaze. The officers and the passengers what was up steers, got afrighted and ran around like chickens with they hails lopped off, fitin' laik cats. Some uv em jumped in the water

and got biled laik turnips, the other jest clawed theyselves ter pieces. I was adown in the engine room asorter lookin after things and it got hotter 'n hotter. Finally it got too hot for me so I jist opened a winner, clum throo it, and walked dry shod to the bank. The fire had been so hot that it had dried up the river bed. Jist ez as I was settin my foot on the bank the fire burned down and the river came arollin' back in a tin foot wave. I shore was lucky to uv missed it.

* * * *

John Boles, the Civil War veteran who supplemented the programs with his stories, had a wife named Julie. John was as indolent as Julie was overworked. In John's wharf conversations "my Julie" was the Queen of the earth whom no one could surpass, or even equal, in anything. On the wharf one afternoon, John met a friend from Rocheport who happened to mention that his wife had had five teeth pulled—a remarkable achievement in those days of "torture" dentists. John straightened up, and after spitting carefully, scornfully remarked, "Pshaw, why that ain't nuthin'. Why my Julie had forty pulled at one settin!"

* * * *

The early families seems to have had a definite night in October for beginning their "night work," which consisted of carding, spinning and weaving. An additional source of light was needed for those "work nights" to supplement the smoky lard lamps, and the more expensive candles, and huge piles of bark were gathered to burn in the fireplace. Does anyone know what that date was?

* * * *

Has anyone ever danced to the old song of "The old brass wagon?" One of the verses goes
"Lead her up and down
The old brass wagon
One wheel off, the axle dragging
You're the one, my darling."
And does anyone know the other verses?

Somewhere, across the river from Overton Landing, on the Boon's Lick trail to Franklin, a tavern was being built one day, many years ago. A waif appeared and began whimpering and begging for food, annoying the workmen. Their patience was at last exhausted by his persistence, and in a moment of anger, killed the child with their trowels. In searching for some place to hide the body, they decided to plaster it up in the wall they were building. Some weeks later the building was completed, opened as a Tavern, and the first person who attempted to sleep in the room in whose wall the body of the child had been placed, fled the place after an hour or so, saying the be-

Beloved Man Succumbs To Heart Attack

**Judge of Probate Court, 77,
Passes Away Sunday Night
After Brief Illness**

**HUGE CROWD AT
FUNERAL TUESDAY**

**Stores Close and Many Gather
In Memory of Noted
Citizen Whose Death
Ends Great Career**

Dr. O. W. Cochran, Cooper county's beloved country doctor and judge, died unexpectedly at his home here Sunday night at 9 o'clock.

A heart attack, aggravated by a stomach ailment, caused his death. He was 77 years old.

Dr. Cochran, who was known by thousands in Central Missouri, had been ailing for the past several days but his condition was not considered alarming. He continued his duties as probate judge, transacting business at the office as late as last Saturday. He became seriously ill Sunday, but seemed to improve later in the day. Then, shortly before 9 o'clock a heart attack seized him and he died after a short interval of suffering. His son, Sam Victor Cochran, and granddaughter, Miss Virginia Bornhauser, were at his bedside.

Funeral services were held at the Baptist church here at 2 p. m. Tuesday, conducted by the Rev. W. C. Brodersen. Interment then followed at the Walnut Grove Cemetery where his wife and oldest son are buried. A huge crowd overflowed the church and attended the rites at the cemetery. The floral offerings were beautiful. The courthouse and many business houses closed during the services.

Pallbearers were public officeholders whose offices are in the court house where Dr. Cochran held court for the last ten years. They were Clay Groom, Clay Morris, S. L. Jewett, A. A. Hoff, Hillard Selck, and Hampton Tisdale.

Owen Winn Cochran was born March 5, 1860, south of Columbia. He was a son of Samuel David and Amanda Boggs Cochran. His great-grandfather was a native of Ireland and his grandfather of Kentucky. His mother was a member of the Boggs family of Kentucky. His father was born on the family homestead in Boone county. He went to the Boone county public schools and to the University of

Missouri for four years. He completed his professional education at Louisville Medical College from which he graduated in 1885.

Used Horse and Buggy

He returned to Boone county, a college graduate but in ill health. He took to "the open road," driving a horse and buggy through the wild, sparsely settled Ozarks in the region where the lake is now located. He sold a medical book to doctors and pharmacists on his long trek through the wooded hills. His health restored, he returned to Boone county and took up the practice of medicine. He used the ferry at Overton, extending his practice into Cooper county. On March 5, 1887, he left the Rocheport vicinity and established his residence at Big Lick, now known as Gooch's Mill. He became widely known there as a doctor, pharmacist and farmer. On Nov. 17, 1887, he was married to Miss Octavia Quarles, a school teacher of Big Lick community, who had been reared in Virginia.

Dr. and Mrs. Cochran had four children, three of whom are living. William Owen Cochran died July 9, 1916. The three living children are Sam Victor Cochran, Boonville city councilman, Mrs. Frank H. Bornhauser and Mrs. E. C. Oerly of Boonville. He is also survived by one sister, Mrs. George Williamson, of Columbia. His wife died Nov. 14, 1930, bringing great sadness to Dr. Cochran's life as he was of nature deeply affected by the loss and sorrow of relatives and friends.

For 40 years Dr. Cochran practiced medicine in eastern Cooper county, visiting and administering to the sick in all kinds of weather over hot and dusty, rutted and muddy, frozen and snow-drifted roads. He fought epidemics and saved lives, delivered babies and funeral orations the same day, extended sympathy to bereaved friends and worked tirelessly in service to his community. As a

"country doctor of the old school" he endeared himself in the hearts of thousands.

Always the staunchest of Democrats, Dr. Cochran entered politics in the fall of 1923. He was elected probate judge by an overwhelming vote, attesting to his wide acquaintance and popularity. He was re-elected in 1930 and again in 1936 by heavy majorities. He was in the midst of his third term, having served as probate judge 10 years, at the time of his death. That he performed the duties of his office with great understanding, born of experience in serving thousands of people in happiness, in sickness

and in death, is traditional in this community.

CROWDS PAY TRIBUTE TO MEMORY OF DR. COCHRAN



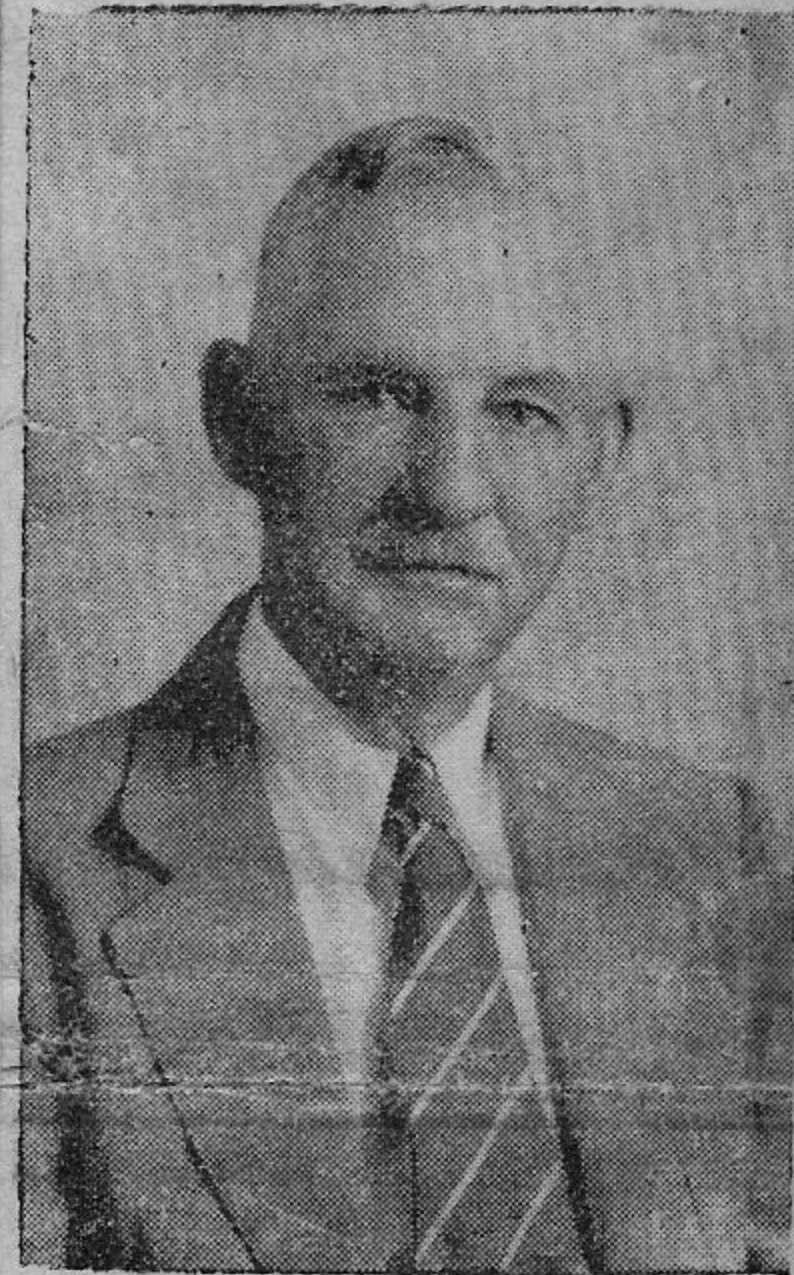

Was Devout Baptist

Dr. Cochran was a devout, life-long Baptist. His religious teachings have affected the lives of many, as a teacher of Sunday school classes and from the pulpit of his church. He was a pillar of the old Big Lick Baptist church and when he moved to Boonville he extended his influence and helping hand to the church here. He was a member of the Board of Deacons.

Dr. Cochran was a member of the Masonic lodge, with membership in the Prairie Home chapter, and of the Odd Fellows lodge in Boonville. He was formerly a member of the Boonville Kiwanis Club, giving up this membership with regret when he felt unable physically to attend the luncheons. Before these organizations, and before political gatherings, picnics, churches, funerals, memorial day and holiday crowds he delivered fine orations, his ability being widely recognized in this field. He campaigned wholeheartedly for Franklin D. Roosevelt and stood staunchly behind the policies, "of this great humanitarian," as he termed Roosevelt, until his death. Dr. Cochran was strong in his convictions and never wavered, once his mind was made up. His work as a probate judge won state-wide recognition; he was immediate past-president of the Missouri Association of Probate Judges.

He possessed a happy, understanding heart and was a most human individual. He was an avid movie fan, and seldom missed a new picture at the theatre. His favorite actress was Jean Harlow but he had room in his great breadth of sentimentality for many of the others.

Community To Honor Retired Blacksmith

Carl Otto Scheibner, who has operated a blacksmith shop at Wooldridge for more than 38 years, is retiring from business, and will be honored by the community with a covered dish supper at the Wooldridge school house Friday, Feb. 26.

Mr. Scheibner will be 79 years old Oct. 1. He was born in Frankfort, Germany, son of Moritz and Mary Marie Scheibner, and came to America with his parents when he was two years old. The crossing required six weeks, and baby Carl arrived with only one shoe, having kicked the other off into the Atlantic Ocean, one day when near the boat railing.

The family first settled in Miller County where they lived two years, next moving to California, Mo., and from there to Boonville in 1883.

When Carl was 9 years old the Scheibners lived west of Boonville about five miles, near a coal mine, and also near the McDonald Blacksmith shop. The shop attracted the boy, and it was there he picked up knowledge of, and a liking for, the trade which later became his life work.

There were two girls and two boys in the home. The brother was named Carl Alfred. The mother died when Carl Otto was about seven, and later his father remarried and had a daughter, Minnie, and a son, who was also named Carl, making three Carl Scheibners, all sons of Moritz Scheibner. The three Carls are living.

In 1903 Carl Otto moved to Wooldridge, and two years later, on Dec. 24, 1905 he was married to Miss Sophie Mills daughter of Mr. and Mrs. John Mills of the community.

Young Carl after farming about Wooldridge for several years, opened his blacksmith shop in the village in October of 1915. Though the smith was not "a mighty man," lacking six inches of being five feet tall, he was efficient, and his shop soon became the kind of

community center that a smithy did, in the days when horses were used for farm work, and for means of traveling.

His strong, square hands shod horses — as many as 12 in a day sometimes — beat plow shares into shape, made wagons and buggies, fitted tire rims, and kept the forge fires burning. As a sideline he did wood work, making cabinets, tables, chests, and other such furniture. But the horse drawn threshing machines, which he first knew, gave way to power threshers, and buggies were replaced by automobiles, and horses on the farms by tractors. In the last few years he has had few calls for shoeing horses, though he has made a number of wagon beds.

Recently Mr. Scheibner decided to retire. His wife died six years ago, and a son, Arnold Carl, died in infancy. He has two daughters, Miss Marguerite Scheibner of the home, and Mrs. Ewing (Josephine) Coffman of near Wooldridge.

The blacksmith, aided by his daughters, built a three room house, with bath this winter, on his son-in-law's place, and he and Miss Marguerite moved in. He plans to erect a small shop where he can continue his carpenter work and do some blacksmithing.

The Coffmans, who have two sons, Thomas and Gene, live a short distance away.

Mr. Scheibner's round face crinkles readily into smiles, and his blue eyes, behind their goldrimmed glasses, peer out, from under heavy eyebrows, warm and friendly. His hair and mustache are gray. He inspires instant liking and confidence.

His popularity is attested by the community wide plans to honor him next week. When one of the women helping to plan the observance was asked who was chairman of the project, and who thought of it first, she said: "There isn't any chairman. We just all decided to do it and everyone is helping." Which seems a tribute in itself!

C. O. Scheibner Dies Suddenly

WOOLDRIDGE — Carl Otto Scheibner, 79, who lived about two miles south of Wooldridge, died suddenly at his home early Friday morning.

He was a blacksmith, having conducted a shop at Wooldridge for more than 38 years before his retirement from active work recently.

He was born in Frankfort, Germany, Oct. 1, 1875, the son of Moritz and Mary Marie Scheibner, and came to America with his parents when he was two years old. The crossing required six weeks.

The family first settled in Miller County, next moving to California, Mo., and from there to Boonville in 1883.

When Carl was nine years old the family lived west of Boonville near the McDonald Blacksmith Shop, and it was there the boy first became interested in the trade that was to become his life work.

In 1903 he moved to Wooldridge, and on Dec. 24, 1905 he was married to Miss Sophie Mills of this community.

He opened his blacksmith shop in Wooldridge in 1915, and conducted it until last year when he built a home on the farm of his son-in-law and moved there to reside.

He is survived by two daughters, Miss Marguerite Scheibner of the home, and Mrs. Ewing (Josephine) Coffman on whose farm his home is located. He also leaves two grandsons, Thomas and Gene Coffman. His wife died about six years ago, and a son, Arnold Carl, died in infancy.

Mr. Scheibner was honored with a community-wide covered dish supper and program at the Wooldridge school house last Feb. 26, shortly after his retirement as the village blacksmith.

Mr. Scheibner operated a farm near Wooldridge from 1903 until 1915.

He was a lifelong member of the Evangelical Church.

Funeral services were held at the Goodman and Boller Chapel Bonville, Sunday afternoon at 2 p. m., with the Rev. John Niensted of Jamestown officiating. Burial was in the Walnut Grove Cemetery, Boonville.
