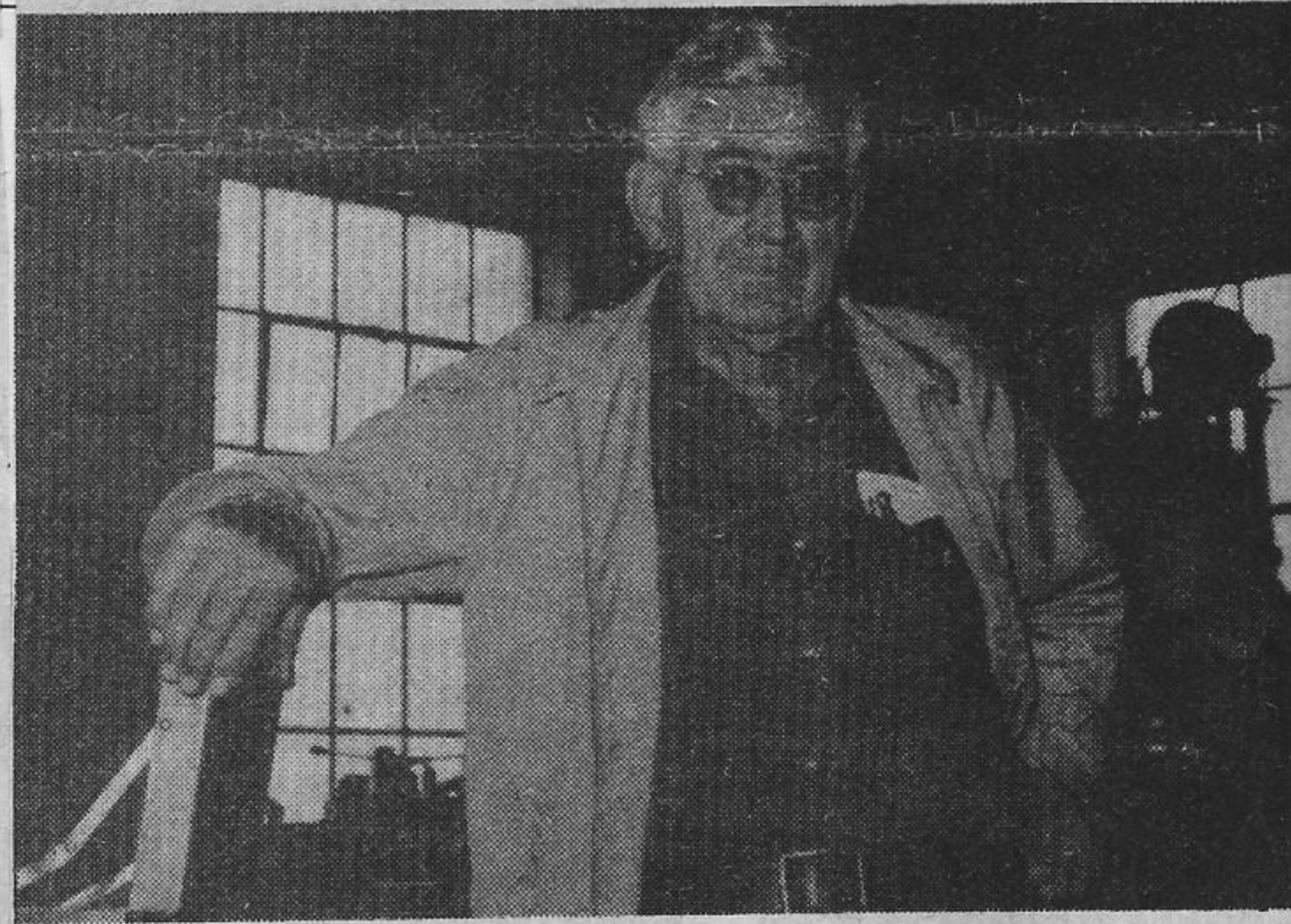

# A Tribute to Lewis Mills

The students and faculty of CHS were saddened and stunned by the sudden death of the Auto Mechanics teacher, Lewis O. Mills.

According to his wife, Mr. Mills was born and reared in the Cooper County area. In the early 1930's he came to California and worked at the Ford Garage for a number of years. During this time, he was working nights at the Woolen Mill.

In 1940 he took over the MFA Station on Railroad Avenue and for approximately four years, he operated that station and did mechanical work.

In 1944 he bought a vacant lot on Highway 50 and built his own garage. In 1948, he started the Pontiac Agency at his garage. He included the GMC line of trucks in 1950 and did sales and service on both plus providing a wrecker service for the community. In 1964 he returned to mechanical work and also bought mill equipment and worked with metal.

Lewis Mills had done many things in his life. He had a life-time membership with the American Rifle Association, was an AAA representative for MFA, was fire chief of the rural fire department for 15 years, and in 1967 became the president of the Chamber of Commerce. After retiring in 1970 from his garage work, he became the CHS Auto Mechanics teacher.

To keep updated on the changes in mechanics, he attended two weeks of classes every summer at a GMC training school in Mission, KS.

Many students have passed through the doors at Auto Mechanics and some had these comments to make.

"Mr. Mills was a good teacher and I'm sure everyone liked him a lot. He was my favorite teacher and they will never find a teacher as good as he was," stated Russell Liebi.

"Lewis taught us all very much. We were all close to him and when we needed help on something he would do his best to help us. We will all miss him," said Roger Kramel.

Mark Flippin explained, "Louie was a very good teacher and he taught us a different but better way. He was a good friend to all of us and we will all miss him very much." Another student, Steve Glenn, stated his feelings like this, "He was a very good teacher in his own way. He was a good friend to all the students. I was just glad to have known him. He will be missed by all of us."

Charles Matheny, CHS counselor, said, "The boys respected him. He could communicate with them and keep their attention. He enjoyed working with them and had a tremendous impact on them. Some people have a knack for working with kids who are more mechanically inclined than academically inclined, and Mr. Mills had that kind of knack."

There are many students at CHS who have been grateful for a class like Auto Mechanics, but moreover they express the feeling that they were grateful to have had such a good friend as their teacher, Lewis Mills.

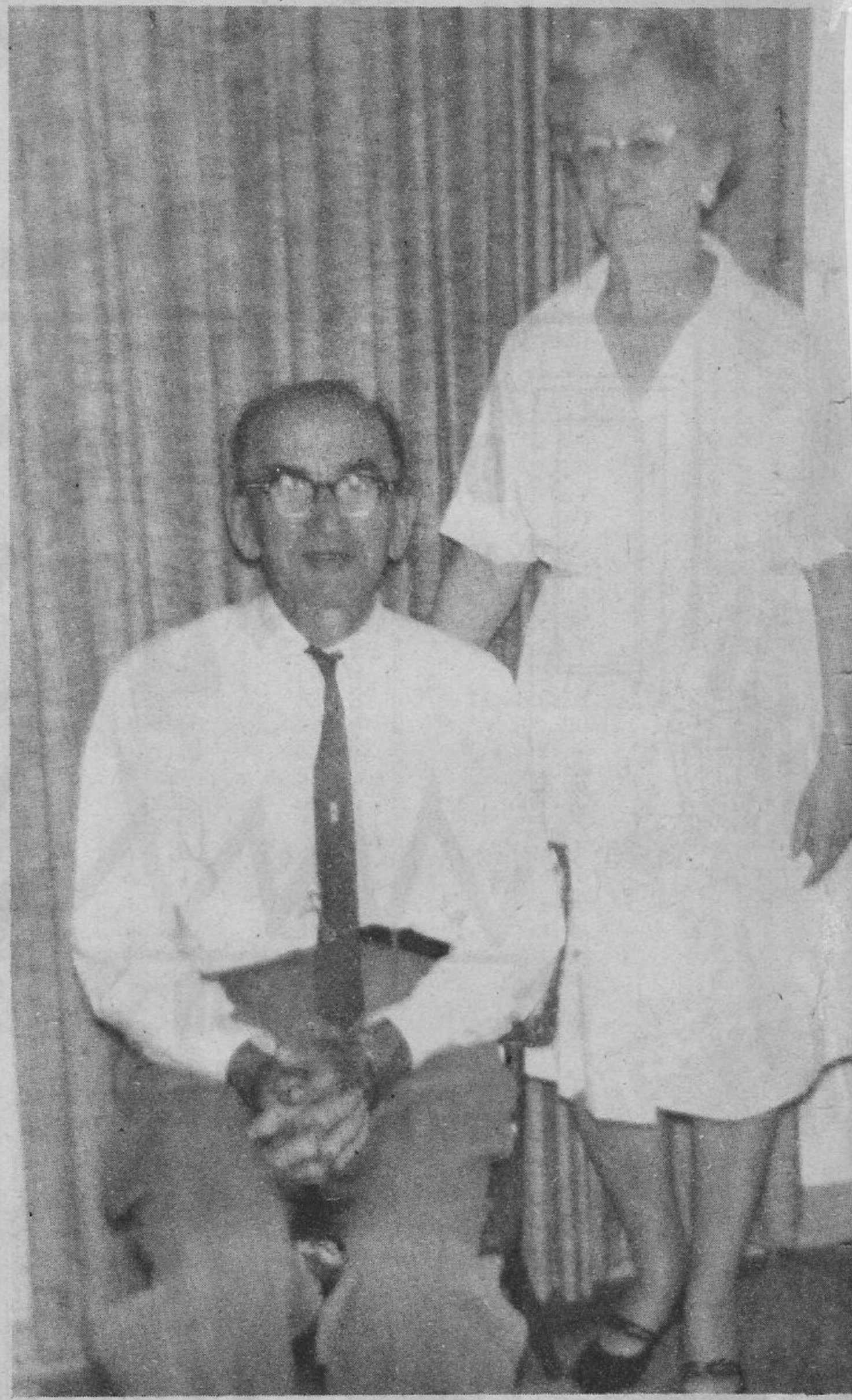

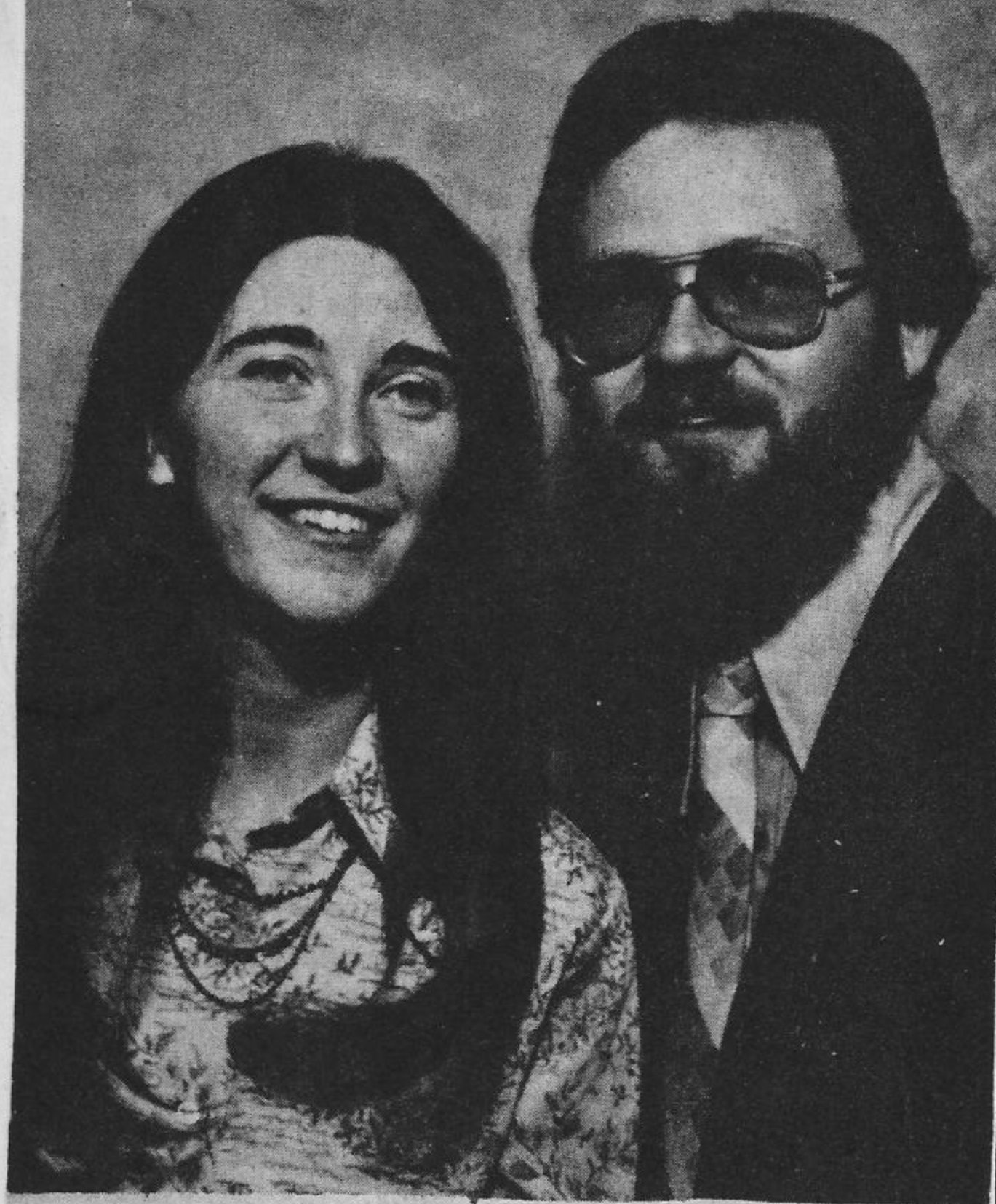

# To Kirschman's wheel Spins old memories

In the 1800's, Tony Kirschman's father was making spinning wheels for use by housewives in spinning thread. Today at 79, Tony Kirschman is helping to keep this part of history alive by making the spinning wheels as a hobby.

Kirschman, who lives on a farm north of Prairie Home, finished his third spinning wheel this summer. Besides making spinning wheels, Kirschman has also restored several old wheels for friends.

The wheel completed this summer is smaller in size than the commonly known spinning wheel. Kirschman explains, "This wheel is made to spin flax; the larger wheels are for spinning wool." But the wheel can also spin wool and even mohair. When Kirschman displayed his wheel at the Steam Engine Show in Boonville this fall, Kathy Hutchins of Columbia demonstrated how the wheel worked with mohair. Kirschman says that she prefers the goat hair because the strands are longer and it is easier to work with.

"I can't spin," Kirschman states. "I've tried it but I can't; it's quite an art", he adds. Kirschman became interested in spinning wheels after his niece learned to spin. He began making the wheels three to four years ago and has averaged approximately one wheel a year.

Although he moves with stiffness because of arthritis in his hands and legs, Kirschman has done almost all the work on the wheels by himself and claims that it is good exercise and therapy. "I can still do as good a work as I used to; it just takes me longer now," he comments.

The wheels are made of native walnut from the Kirschman farm. "Part of this wood came from an old log house that was on the farm long before I came here", Kirschman says. The only exception from the walnut wood is the flyer which is made of catalpa wood. Kirschman explains that he saw many flyers made of walnut wood that had split but catalpa will not split.

The wheel is composed of three curved sections joined together. These sections are cut on a lathe and smoothed with an electric sander. The lathe is also used for cutting intricate grooves in the legs.

The wheel is mounted on a stand and attached to a foot pedal which moves the wheel. Two bands or small belts connect the wheel to the U-shaped flyer with the bobbin or spindle in the middle. A distaff carries the material to be spun and is drawn off the distaff by hand. The material passes through an eye in the spindle, comes out another hole and catches on one of the hooks on the spool.

Kirschman says that the person operating the wheel, or the spinster, must twist and pull the thread and this will determine how thick or thin the thread is. The spool and the flyer have separate pulleys of different diameters so that the flyer turns faster than the spool and wraps the thread around the spool.

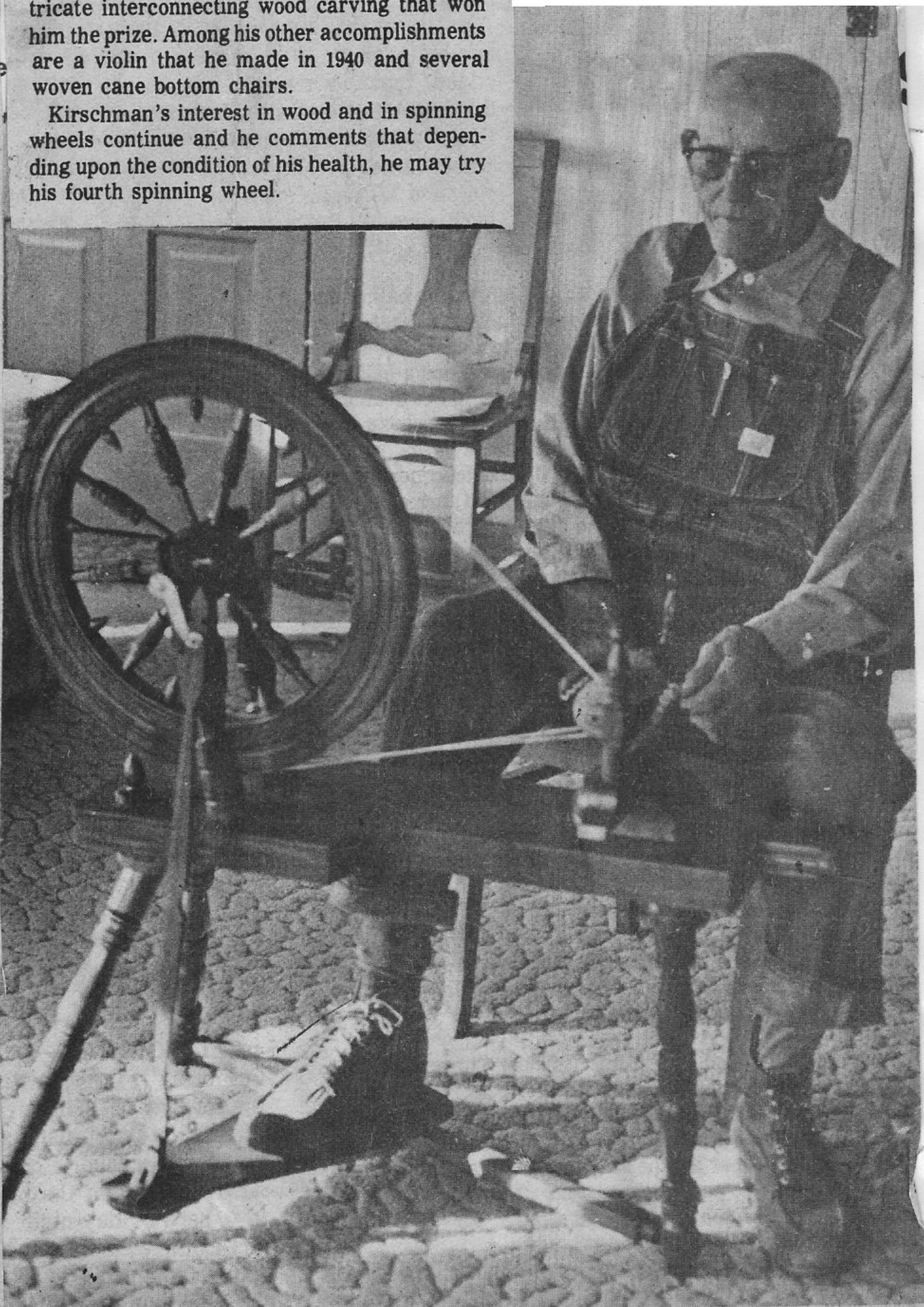
For the wheel to run smoothly, everything must be perfectly balanced and this along with much of the intricate decoration work, takes a lot of time. "Sometimes I will sit and think about

how to do something for hours; I never get in a hurry", Kirschman remarks.

Kirschman has given away the first two wheels he made but says he plans to keep this one. It is proudly displayed in his front room. He set no price for his wheels and says he has never considered selling them.

Although Kirschman has just been making spinning wheels for three or four years, his interest in wood carving began early in life. In 1931, he won first place in the National Sportsman's whittling contest and still has the intricate interconnecting wood carving that won him the prize. Among his other accomplishments are a violin that he made in 1940 and several woven cane bottom chairs.

Kirschman's interest in wood and in spinning wheels continue and he comments that depending upon the condition of his health, he may try his fourth spinning wheel.

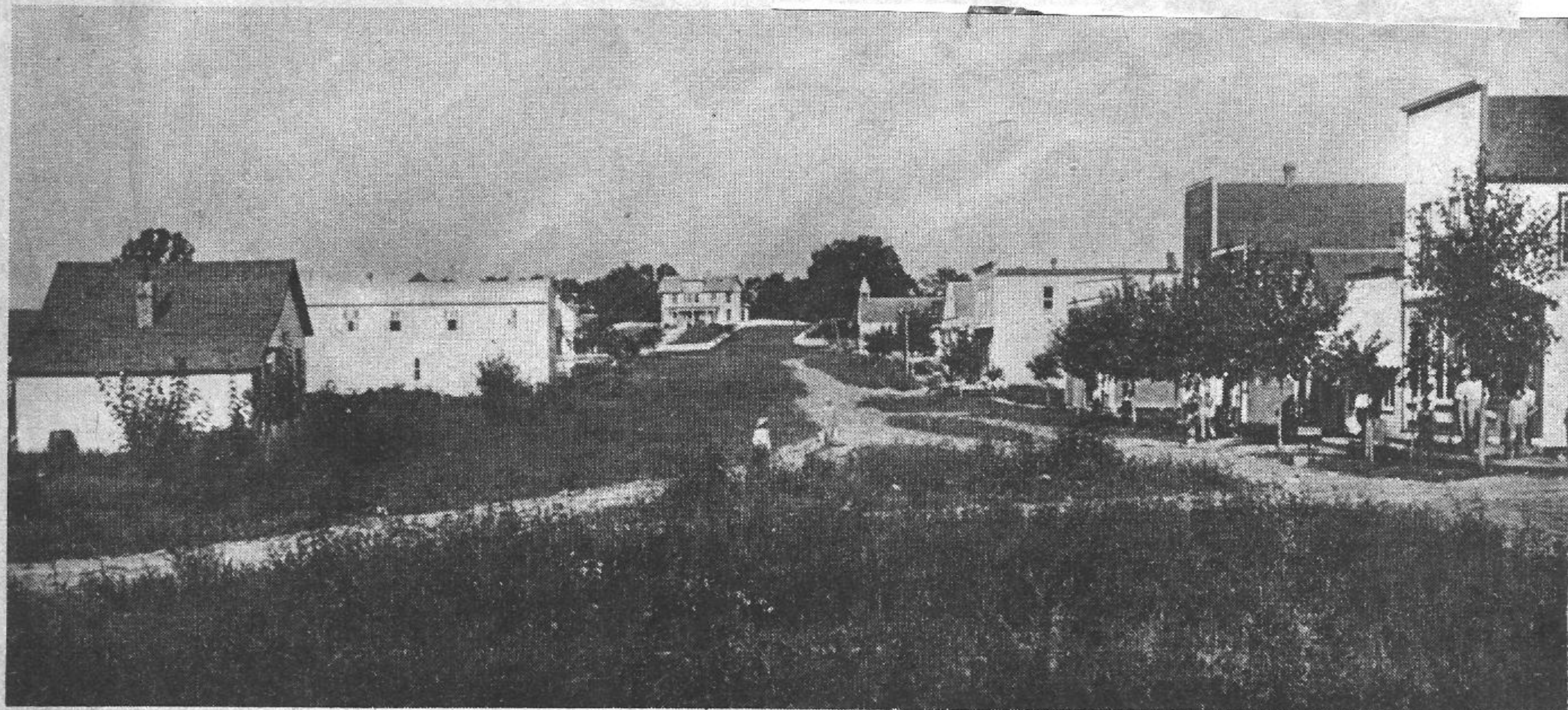

WOOLDRIDGE — There have been days this summer when the sun flared so fiercely it made a person's ambition melt like a Popsicle left in the street.

It was the kind of weather that made breathing a bother. It caused a usually rational friend of mine to look up at the sun and say pleadingly, without a trace of jest: "Okay, that's enough. I get the point."

But the sun, like a plastic smile, just hung on and on, and everybody seemed to suffer through. Everybody, that is, except Fletcher and Ida Nixon. They just sit here amid the buzz-saw sound of locusts and the chirp of birds and, yes, amid breezes unmatched since the last hurricane hit the East Coast.

There are breezes to beat all breezes at their home here. It is an oasis of coolness amid oppressing heat. And Fletcher and Ida Nixon, wise in their age, know just how far to carry a good thing: as far as they can.

So they sit on their front porch, gently massaged by the light winds. Hour after hour, day after day, they sit, watching the rest of us sweat. Come winter, memories of the coolness will warm their hearts. "It's part of the pleasure of getting old," Mrs. Nixon says.

It also is a pleasure as old as her husband. Nixon was born in the house on the hill. His grandfather founded Wooldridge in 1901 when the Missouri Pacific Railroad came through. The house was built in 1907; Nixon was born in 1907; and the maple tree that shades the front porch and yard was planted in 1907.

Sevens are lucky, and Nixon is not about to bail out on a good thing. So he sits on the porch seven days a week. Most any time a passerby can spot him on his chair, and his wife on the swing.

The summer breeze is only a part of Fletcher Nixon's daily joy, though. He also has a big coffee mug perched on the railing. And the locusts keep him company. "Sometimes they get so thick you can't hear it thunder," he says. And he smokes. Nixon smokes as much as the breezes blow.

His brand is Camel; no filters. Nixon smokes them so much that his fingers are stained a chocolate brown from the nicotine. In an age when health zealots have a stranglehold on sensory pleasure, Fletcher Nixon puffs away with defiant gusto. He is like the man who thumbs his nose at the preacher in church: You applaud because of the sheer naughtiness of it.

Along his way to a bad case of emphysema, Nixon has had only two weak moments. Once, he tried a filtered brand. They were so weak, he says, that he kept reaching for another cigarette to light up while one was still between his lips. Another time, Nixon succumbed to some fretfulness about his good health. "I quit for

19 days when I was in the hospital, and it liked to kill me," he says.

But these were minor pauses in an otherwise steady march toward the grave. These days, Nixon is of more sound judgment and habit. His front lawn bears the evidence. It is thick with burned match stubs and cigarette butts, tossed there from his chair on the porch. "There's several dollars laying out there," he says of the accumulated litter.

Nixon's wife says he has one other bad habit; he's got a sleeping schedule that would confound a robin. He's in bed by 6 or 7 p.m. and gets up between 2 and 4 a.m. "I haven't slept past four o'clock, I don't guess, in 25 years," he says. "That's the only thing I never liked about him," Mrs. Nixon replies.

The first thing Nixon does when he gets up is eat a breakfast of two poached eggs—another enjoyment proscribed by his doctor. "These doctors just got to have something to tell you," he says. But Nixon stubbornly persists in evil ways. And after his outlaw breakfast he heads for the porch to watch the dawn and the traffic come and go. All the while, his coffee mug is at hand, and he smokes.

For Fletcher Nixon, a porch isn't heaven. But it's at least up on the hill where the breezes always blow.

## Only his fiddlin' isn't an understatement

impression that the old boy went spooning between waltzes.

Hickam can't make his music sound any less good than it is, however, and his playing is well known in an area of Central Missouri that he calls the "fiddlingest" part of the state—Boone, Cooper and Howard counties.

He plays what he calls ragtime music, the kind that gets people clapping and stomping. And he plays old waltzes like "Over the Waves" and "Stars and Stripes," and his fiddle sounds wistful and a bit sad.

He still has the fiddle he learned on. He traded about 15 bushels of corn for it when he was a youngster. He also has three others, including one from his father and his favorite, a Stradivarius, that he bought several years ago.

Hickam keeps rattlesnake tails in each

of the fiddles so that they bounce around and keep the dust and cobwebs from building up. By way of explanation he simply says, "You fill that thing full of dust, I betcha' it wouldn't sound good at all."

He learned fiddling because he wanted something to do when he was young. "Back then, there wasn't no cars and no place to go," he says. "I just stayed home and practiced or rode the mules."

He learned by ear, plus what he could pick up from his father. "If you learn by ear, it's gotta be in you, wouldn't you say? It's a gift. But if you can whistle a tune and hum a tune, and your fingers follow your mind, you can get to play a tune."

Hickam used to play a lot at weddings and parties, but in his old age he can't

take the butterflies in his stomach anymore. "Maybe you all aren't that way," he says, "but sometimes you get up before a crowd and you're just not relaxed. You should be relaxed to do anything, wouldn't you say?"

Despite his years, Hickam doesn't look 84. He has a crop of hair that is as reddish-blond as it is gray, and when he lifts his chin to tuck a fiddle underneath it, many of the wrinkles disappear from his neck.

The secret to good health in old age, he says, is to refrain from dissipation in youth.

"I never did drink, I never did use tobacco, and I never did run with any gay women," he says.

But when he tells that story, he says not to push him too much on the particulars.

JAMESTOWN — Words are just so many rubber bands to William Hickam, and he stretches a lot of meaning out of them.

He says, for instance, that he's been playing the fiddle "a little while." Hickam's little while is going on 73 years. "I'm soon to be 85, and I learned when I was about 12," he says.

Similarly, Hickam describes his health as "fair," then drops it on you that he goes fox hunting regularly.

In fact, Hickam's understatement compels listeners to fill in the gaps. He and his wife had their 50th wedding anniversary 14 years ago. And when Hickam grins broadly and describes the shindig as fair, one immediately gets the

Hattie Mae Boles, 80, the daughter of former slaves, is not only a pea fowl raiser, chicken dresser, organ and piano player and the secretary and auditor of the Central District School of Mission, she's also an expert on Gooch's Mill, where she lives.

For those unfamiliar with the place called Gooch's Mill, you can reach it from Boonville by driving east to the Wooldridge exit, taking Highway 179 south to Route V and following Route V until you go across the bumpy Gooch's Mill bridge. You're then in the middle of what used to be a thriving little town.

"There used to be a blacksmith shop here, a wagon shop, three general stores and an undertaker," Mrs. Boles remembers. The post office was at first in Overton, then in Wooldridge and now in Prairie Home.

Mrs. Boles was born in 1896 near Gooch's Mill competing for attention from her parents with 11 other children. "Only two are left now, Elsie M. Craddock of Omaha, Neb. and me," Mrs. Boles says.

Her grandparents were slaves all their lives and her parents were slaves before she was born. Mrs. Boles' mother was a slave in Howard County while her father was a slave in Cooper County. Her parents are now buried at Ragland Cemetery near Gooch's Mill.

The cemetery is now owned by Arthur Schnuck. Mrs. Boles says she was concerned the land would be sold, but she says

Schnuck always has told her, "No Hattie, I won't, you know you're still part of the Schnuck family."

The closeness to the Schnuck family is due to the fact that the first job Mrs. Boles had was with the Schnucks. Before going to work there for \$1.50 a week, she helped her father on the farm driving mules, harrowing, breaking ground. "I loved to work in the fields," she says.

At the Schnuck's she did threshing work, garden work, cooking, baking German light bread, and household jobs. When she was working there in 1917, a tornado came through the area.

"I was working on the Schnuck's front porch doing dishes. I heard this loud noise and I asked Mr. Schnuck what it was. He said, 'Lord child, get in here,' jerking me inside. That tornado took everything off the porch," she says.

The aftermath of the tornado left her parents' house with only loose shingles. At another house, however, a woman's skull was split open by the tornado, according to Mrs. Boles. "Another little girl didn't make it to the cellar. Her hair got caught in a door. She was found dead looking like she was beaten to death," Mrs. Boles says.

Another disaster befell the Gooch's Mill area the next year. While working at a Paul Eager's farm, the swine flu epidemic hit the area and nation.

"Mr. Eager's wife and I would go for sleigh rides in the snow. Everybody warned us we would be taken down by the flu, but we didn't

listen. Then I took it," she says.

According to Mrs. Boles the flu "settled in her eyes and she has been wearing glasses ever since." Several area persons died in the epidemic.

After working at a number of other farms, she moved to St. Paul, Minn. When returning to visit her parents who were sick, she married Richard Walker Brown from Howard County, the son of a watermelon raiser. An earlier son of Brown is Richard Leonard Brown, current city councilman for Boonville.

Mrs. Boles must have had a fond place in her heart for Walker Brown, because after she divorced him she married him again. The second marriage to Brown, however, followed two other marriages. The second marriage to Brown ended after only four months with a second divorce, but now she helps care for Brown, who is in ill health.

This penchant for marrying is evident in her family, because her sister recently married an 84-year old man. Her sister is 75 years old.

While many Boonville residents today are praising the merits of the historic mansion Rivercene, Mrs. Boles had the honor of working there. She worked for Mrs. Maggie Ravensell, Cora Hert and Alice Kinney, all daughters of Captain Joseph Kinney, who ran the first steamboat on the Missouri River, according to Mrs. Boles.

"I loved to work in that Kinney home. I learned to do canning there. All three of the sisters were so nice," Mrs. Boles says.

Mrs. Boles says she is happiest now at home. "What I enjoy most is right out here," she says of her modest house fronting the extension of Route V. She speaks fondly of her three dogs, seven cats, 35 young chickens (which she dresses), and pea fowl. "The peacock came from the woods a number of years ago. I bought a hen for him and raised two more," she says.

"Whiskers" is her favorite dog. He can boast such noted accomplishments as praying along with Oral Roberts on television and singing along with Mrs. Boles at the piano.

Mrs. Boles plays the organ and piano and often plays for the church. She has been a member of the New Salem Baptist Church in Gooch's Mill since 1910.

A plaque on Mrs. Boles living room wall attests to the fact that she attended Central District school of mission and received accreditation in 1971. She currently serves as secretary of the school of mission and auditor of the Central District.

Mrs. Boles, who seems spry and healthy around all her animals, says this of her already long life. "I think it's an honor that God has let me stay this long." The long lives of her parents may be an indication of things to come. Mrs. Boles father lived to be 96 years old and her mother lived to be a respectable 105 years old.

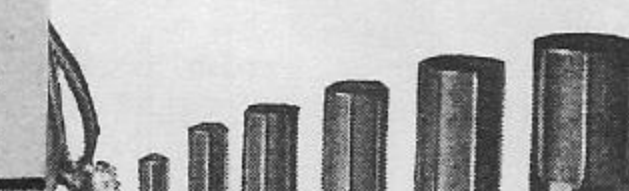

One daughter, Mrs. Irving (Mary) Heller, Metairie, La. preceded him in death May 24, 1976.

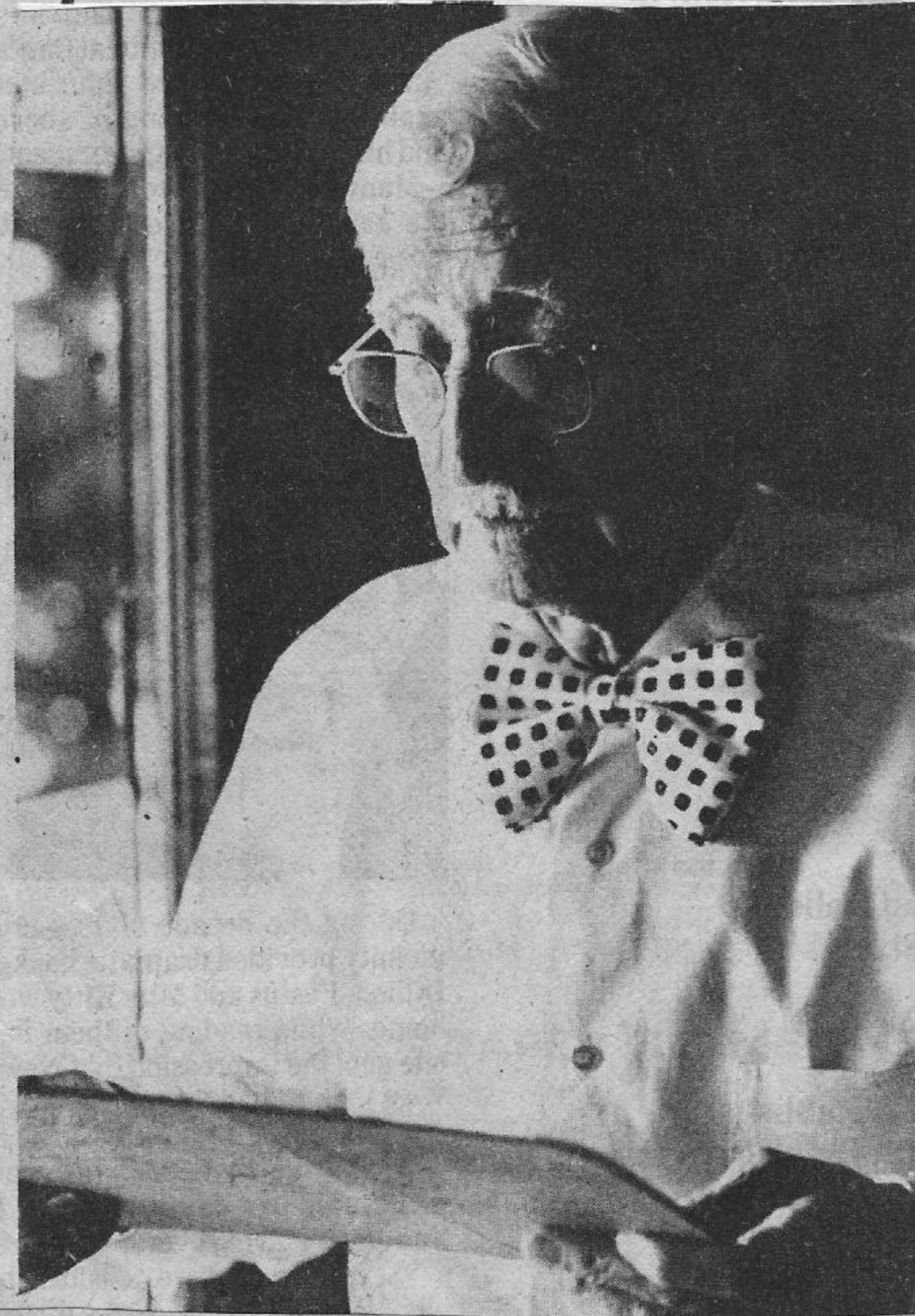

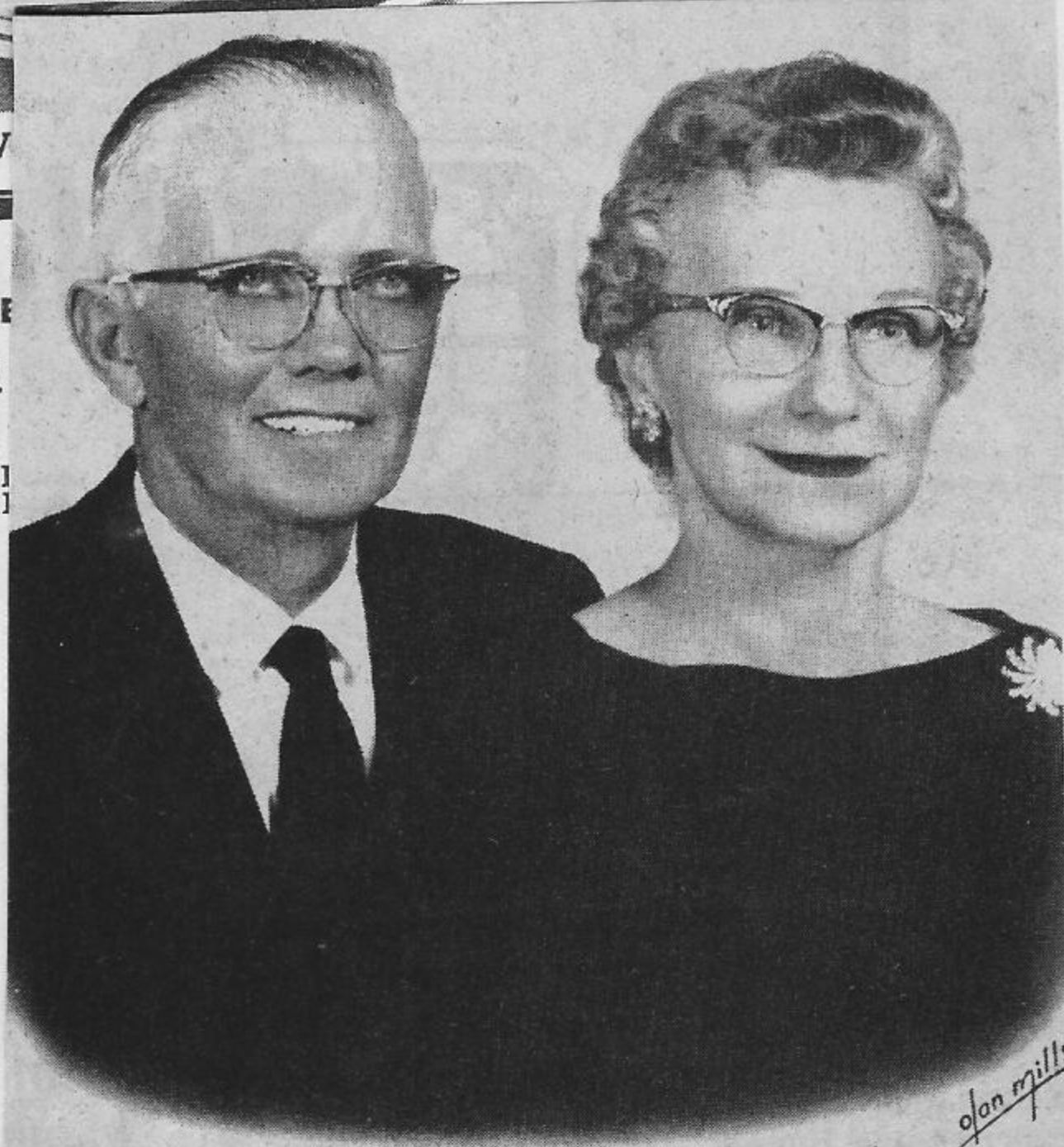

## Chewing gum is his trademark

Jim Farris has a trademark—a symbol by which he is known. It reflects his generosity.

For about 50 years, Jim Farris has been known as the "gum man."

Many Boonville residents tell different stories about Farris. But the common thread in every story is how he made sure everyone had chewing gum.

Farris, who will be 98-years-old Monday, says he can't remember exactly how long he has been handing out gum to people, "but I would guess about 50 years.

"I wanted to give something to children and older people and I thought gum wouldn't hurt them. But I never gave candy. That's too hard on them," he says.

Farris says some of the children take the time to thank him, but they usually just smile when he hands them the treat. Those smiles are enough, Farris says. He just enjoys making people smile and happy.

Farris presently resides at the Ashley Manor Convalescent Center. Becky Farris, an employee at the center, says he buys the gum out of the candy machine and when the candy man comes out to the center.

Farris says he has no idea of what his habit of giving away gum has cost him through the years, but he has enjoyed ever minute of it, even though he rarely chews gum himself.

Farris and his wife, Mary, have shared 65 years of marriage. He says she also handed out gum, "but not like I did."

Farris says he and Mary continue to spend a lot of time together. Becky Farris said they both entered the manor on Nov. 11, 1974, and shared a room together.

"She's the best woman I know," Farris says proudly about his wife. "I wouldn't give her up for any of them because I know I couldn't find a better one."

Farris says he and his wife moved to Boonville many years ago after living in Gooch's Mill and Wooldridge where he operated several stores. While in Boonville, he worked as an appraiser of homes and city property. He also was in the real estate business.

Farris said he and his wife moved out-of-state for a time, but decided to move back to Boonville simply because they like it here.

Becky Farris says Farris is sincerely interested about the community. "Everyday he asks how everything is in Boonville."

He says he also was active in the Baptist church. "I've been everything there is to be in

the church. I've even officiated at more than 50 funerals. And I'm not a preacher," he proclaims.

Farris has been listed in "Who's Who in the Middle West" and "World Who's Who in Industry and Commerce."

Farris also was active in various civic and commercial activities in his younger days. "I've always tried to help out other people," he says.

Farris, who declares he will live to 100 years-old, says he would make some changes if he had to live it all over again. "No one lives a perfect life. I've made mistakes, but everybody does."

He says when he makes it to the century mark, he's going to celebrate—even more than he does now. "I don't know how yet, but I'm going to celebrate."

Farris says he is proud he is going to be 98 next week, but added that he feels like he is 75.

Her first surgery was when she was three years old and corrected her legs so she could walk but with difficulty. "I use to walk on my toes," Windsor remembers.

"As she grew, her tendons did not; they drew up" Windsor's mother, Mrs. Emma Lou Stover, says.

Surgery this summer, however, changed that. Orthopedic doctors at the Columbia Regional Hospital stretched her heel cord in the right leg letting the foot be flat on the floor.

The process was not an easy one. Following surgery, Windsor's leg was in a cast for six weeks; next followed eight weeks of therapy while she learned, literally, to walk again.

"It was so frustrating after surgery; it made me mad. I thought I would never walk again," Windsor says.

First, Windsor had to adjust walking on a flat foot. "When you've walked one way for 18 years, the habit is hard to break. I had to fight to keep it straight," she says.

After the cast was removed, a brace was placed on her leg to help keep the foot flat. She was scheduled to return to the doctor today to see if the brace could be removed.

Another adjustment to be made was her posture. She explains that because she walked on her toes, she tended to bend her back and lean forward to keep her balance. With her foot now flat on the floor, she has had to adjust to standing straight.

The posture adjustment was part of her therapy. Using a walker, she says the therapist encouraged her to stand up straight. "I was scared to try to stand up," she remembers. But she did and she learned to walk again.

Her work is not all over, however. She still must exercise and work with her foot to improve her walking.

Her mother said she doubts if there will be any more surgery for her daughter. She explains that her daughter first went through a program to see if surgery would help her. The doctors decided to wait until this summer until Windsor had stopped growing and also so it would not interfere with her school work.

Windsor was graduated in May from Boonville High School. She says her difficulty in walking did present some problems but that most of her classmates were understanding.

"Sometimes it was hard but I just kept thinking that I was just as normal as they were but maybe a little slower," she says. One of the symptoms of cerebral palsy is a slowness in coordination and motivation.

She says some of her classmates had difficulty talking to her "but I love talking to people so I just kept on talking."

Windsor said her classmates fascinated her. "They included me in most everything. But if they knew I couldn't do it, they didn't push me."

Her mother credits part of her easy adjustment to her family. "She had a lot of sisters and they never excluded her, they always included her," Mrs. Stover said.

However, school did present some difficulties. "I didn't like gym class because I couldn't do anything. I just had to sit and watch," she says.

Now that high school and her surgery is over, she is looking toward the future. Windsor is participating in a vocational rehabilitation program at the Kirksville Osteopathic Hospital.

The program is designed to help her find out what types of work she can do and then help her find a job. She will return Tuesday to Kirksville to complete the program.

She said she has considered college but says it may be too much of a strain. "I know my limitations, what I can

and can't do."

Windsor says she has thought about going into therapy. "I've been through it and I know the frustration" she says. Another possibility is working as a florist.

One of her ambitions is to learn to drive. "I would love to drive; I'm tired of people hauling me around."

Her immediate plans include a possible trip to Hawaii or Florida this spring with her grandmother.

After spending the summer in the hospital, in a cast, and then in therapy, Windsor deserves a vacation. But she says the problems of the summer were worth it.

When she did learn to walk again she says "it was the best day of my life."

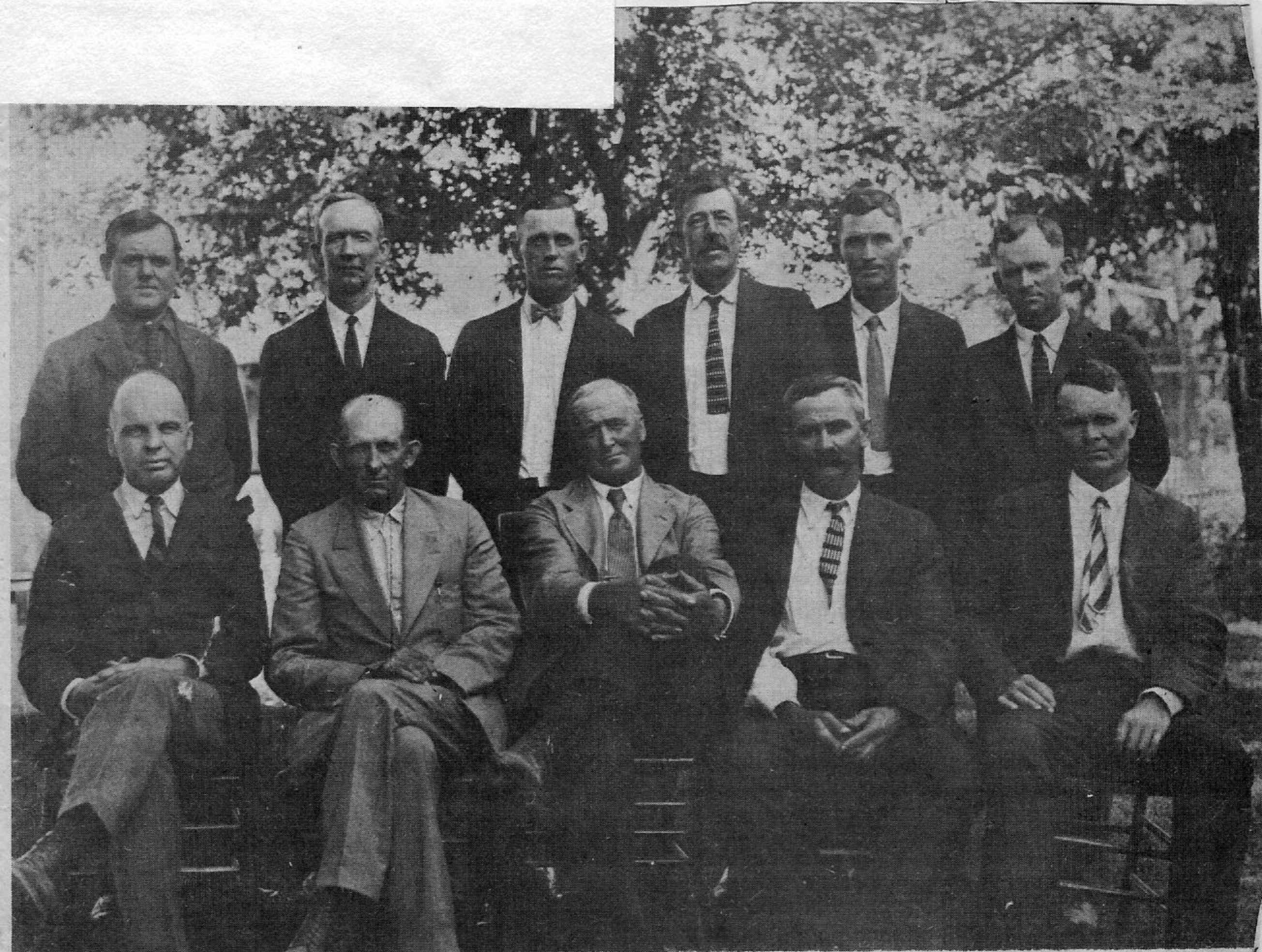

FOR SALE: "SkyCrapper" an above ground aerobic and solar assisted composting toilet."

Or, put more simply, a somewhat updated version of the outhouse, a fixture now found more frequently in the jokes of humorists than on the family farm. The butt of a thousand jokes.

This, however, may change. One of the country's largest industries, the federal government, has given "SkyCrapper's inventor Doug Elley of Lupus, Mo., its blessing--and its money--to develop his project.

But the federal agency which rewarded Elley, the Department of Energy, has drawn the wrath of Wisconsin Sen. William Proxmire in doing so.

Proxmire, a feared name in the federal bureaucracy, last week gave his monthly "Golden Fleece" award to the DOE for giving Elley \$1,200 to build "SkyCrapper."

The Kansas City DOE office early this fall gave Elley the \$1,200 as part of a contest to encourage the development of small scale energy saving projects.

And Elley devised a solar-heated outhouse. One which he said in his application: "provides pleasing and aesthetic moments of meditative con-

templation in a small sunlit room perched 6-8 feet above a backyard or garden view."

An outhouse elevated off the ground? Yes, to allow sunlight to dry human waste to nothing. It would save water, Elley said.

"It was chosen because it was appropriate for that specific area," Kansas City DOE energy project coordinator Jane Miller said.

Miller was not, however, referring to an anatomical area but to a geographical one--rural Missouri. And this is what drew Proxmire's wrath.

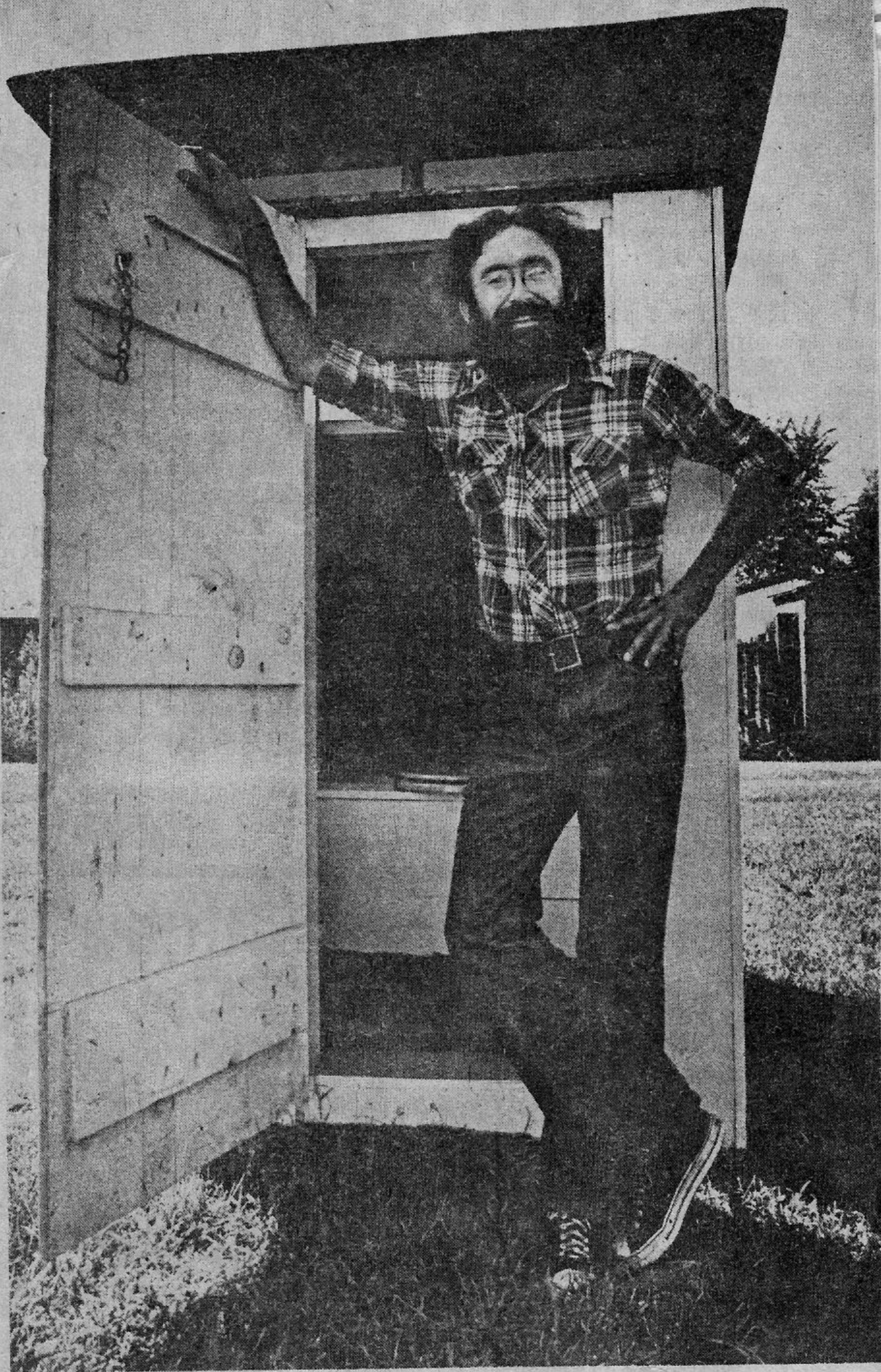
"One wonders how practical the invention would be under conditions of two-feet of snow, 15 degree weather, 2 a.m. in the morning, and 10 yards behind the house," Proxmire added.

Elley, 33, is taking his notoriety with a grain of salt.

"I am more flattered than embarrassed," the University of Missouri graduate said. "But I'm a little disappointed Proxmire hasn't shown more insight."

"I probably wouldn't have won the money if I didn't name it 'SkyCrapper,'" Elley conceded. "Instead of being ranked 20th (on DOE's list of meritorious projects) it probably would have been ranked one-hundredth."

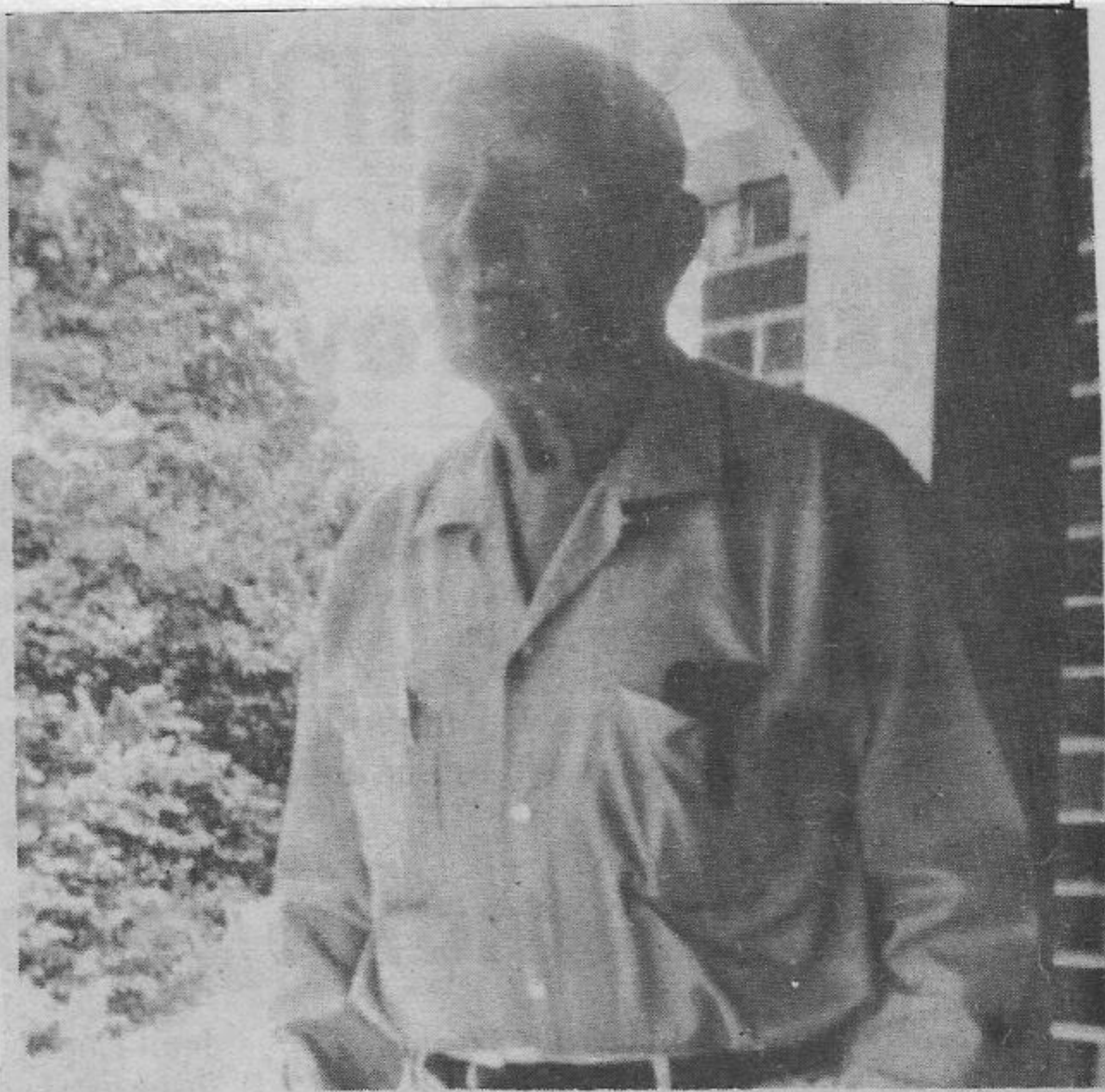

## Best V.P.

Dear Editor:

When picking a choice for the 1980 election one should only consider the Vice-Presidential candidates. The reason for that decision is an 1811 Indian curse which has already killed seven (7) American Presidents and is destined to kill whoever is elected in 1980.

The curse dates back to Indiana in 1811. As of that date the only major Indian tribe left in the Indiana Territory was the Shawnee. They were led by two brothers; the infamous Chief Tecumseh, whom many historians say was the best Indian "war general", and Chief Tenskwatawa, called "The Prophet". The reason that Tenskwatawa was called "The Prophet" was that he had many revelations from the "Master of Life". One of these prophecies was that the Indiana Territory was the "chosen" land for the Shawnee.

The Shawnee were beginning a build-up in "their" territory near the meeting of the Tippicnoe and Wabash Rivers during the early Fall of 1811. This build-up of Indians worried the territorial Governor, William Henry Harrison, and he organized the State Militia to keep an eye on the Indians.

On, or around, November 1, 1811 Harrison and his troops arrived at the Tippicanoe River just a few miles from the Indian Camp. Chief Tecumseh was sure that the soldiers would not attack so he left for

some southern states to organize the Indians there for an eventual war he was planning. Tecumseh gave strict orders to his brother that they were not to bother the soldiers.

On November 7, 1811 "The Prophet" disobeyed his brother's orders and attacked Harrison's troops. The battle lasted about 24 hours. When the battle was over the Shawnee had been badly defeated. This was to be the last battle with the Indians in Indiana.

"The Prophet" knew that he could not face his brother again, so he fled to Canada. Before leaving Indiana he called upon the "Master of Life" to place a curse on the General who had defeated them so soundly.

The exact wording of the curse is not known. However, the general idea was that something good would happen to General William Henry Harrison in a year ending with a zero. While he was doing that good thing, he would die. After that all persons who had the same good thing happen to them, in a year ending with a zero, would also die while doing that good thing.

In 1840 William Henry Harrison was elected President of the United States. He became President on March 4, 1841 and died "while in office" on April 4, 1841. The shortest term of any President. Officially President Harrison's death was by pneumonia.

The next election in a year ending with a zero was 1860. As almost every American knows, Abraham

Lincoln was elected President. Lincoln survived his first term in office. However, on April 14, 1865, a little over one month into his second term of office, he was assassinated by John Wilkes Booth.

James A. Garfield was elected President in 1880. On July 2, 1881 he was shot by Charles J. Guiteau and he died of the wounds on September 19, 1881.

In the election of 1900 the winner (?) was William McKinley. On September 6, 1901 he was shot by Leon Czolgosz and he died on September 14, 1901.

The next election ending in a zero was in 1920 when Warren G. Harding became President. He died on August 2, 1923. The exact cause of his death is not known. It is known that in the last two weeks before his death he had a mild case of food poisoning and had a minor case of pneumonia.

Franklin Delano Roosevelt was elected President in 1940. President Roosevelt died on April 12, 1945, in his fourth term as President, of a cerebral hemorrhage brought on by the infantile paralysis he had been suffering from for years.

In the last Presidential election in a year ending with a zero, John F. Kennedy was elected President (1960). On November 22, 1963 he was assassinated by Lee Harvey Oswald.

The curse simply stated that the person would die sometime while doing the good thing. Therefore, when voting for President on November 4, 1980 be sure to consider which party has the best choice for BOTH President and Vice-President.

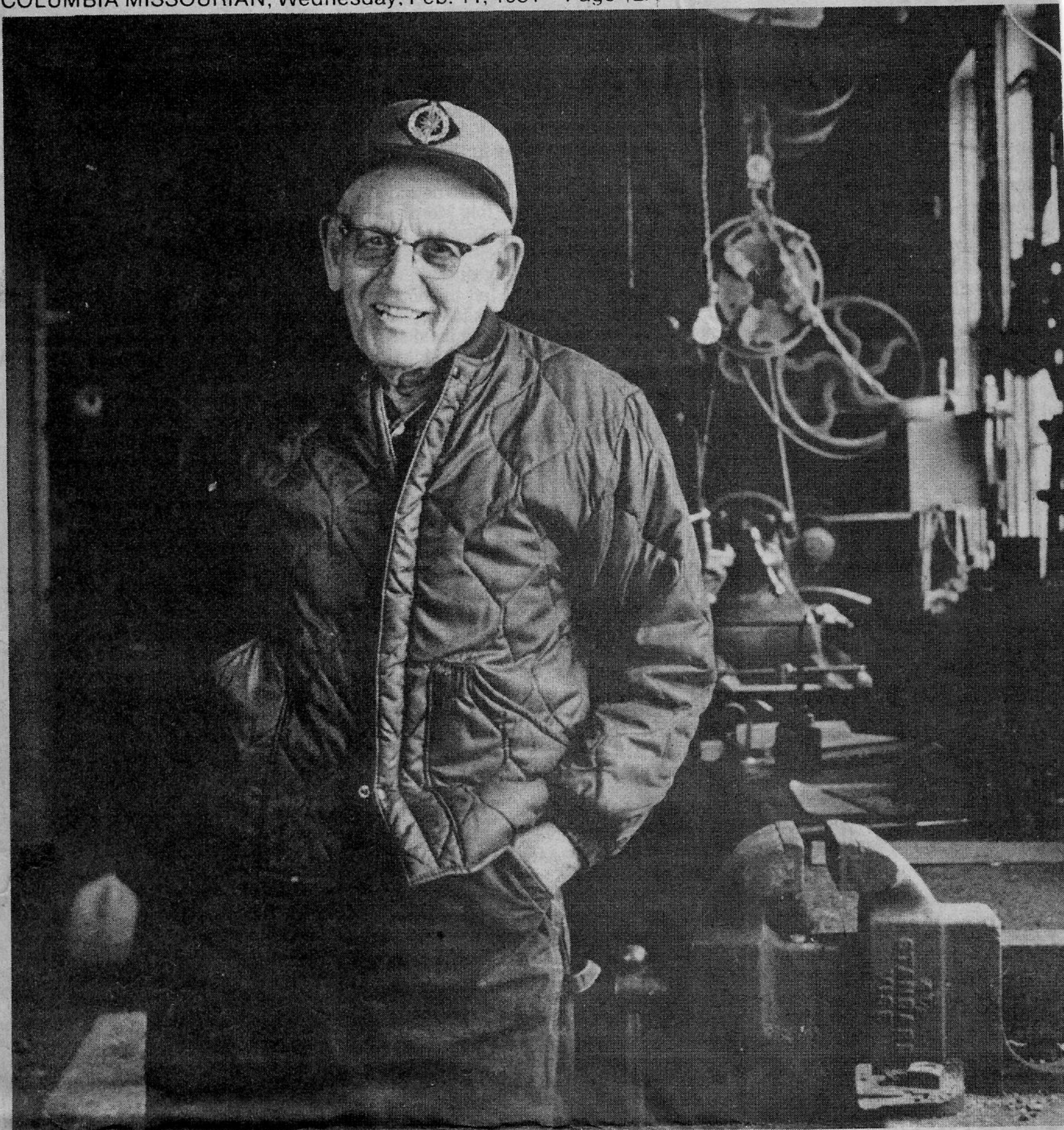

# Craftsman's art shows talent intact at age 83

PRAIRIE HOME, Mo. — Examples of Tony Kirschman's handiwork are all around the house on his 160-acre (64-hectare) farm — spinning wheels, a puzzle that he plays with, a fiddle and a chainlink chandelier hanging from a curtain decorate several rooms.

He is an 83-year-old craftsman, who by his own admission no longer has the energy or memory he once did. But his hands still are talented, as the parts of a still uncompleted spinning wheel show.

His is the work of a talented woodworker.

"Well, I wouldn't go that far," he says, "but I've liked to whittle ever since the time I opened a pocket knife."

Kirschman does most of his woodworking in a small, old workshop near his house. Inside the workshop are a planer, drill press, lathe, table saw and forge. Much of the equipment is old like the workshop. Kirschman says the table saw and the planer, which he made himself, are at least 40 or 50 years old.

Other signs of the building's age are the pulleys, now unattached, that were used to power the tools with a gasoline engine before electricity.

"About all that's left here is a lot of junk," Kirschman says. "We used to work here quite a lot, when the farm had a lot of machinery."

Kirschman doesn't use his workshop in the winter any more, because the cold aggravates his rheumatism. He no longer has the patience or firmness of hand that allows him to do some of

his more intricate work.

Kirschman mostly builds spinning wheels that are both full-size, at least three feet in height, and scaled down, maybe only a foot high. Although he has made some more modern alterations to the spinning wheel such as metal flyer rods — "I kinda fudged on that a little" — Kirschman says his wheels are accurate replicas of spinning wheels used 100 years ago. And they work.

"Everything is there. It works like a real one. It's not a dummy," Kirschman says.

"The spinning wheel wood comes from the farm. Probably the biggest part of it comes from the logs of two old log rooms of this house. It must have been pretty old, because this house (made with wood panels) has been here since 1938."

Kirschman, who has lived in Prairie Home his entire life, started making spinning wheels in 1974 after years of repairing spinning wheels belonging to friends. He says his ability to build them comes from his father.

"My dad in his younger days was a pretty good woodworker," Kirschman says. "He made big spinning wheels for the women folk to use. They didn't have stores where you could go buy clothes. They had to make their own."

But spinning wheels are not the only thing that Kirschman carves. He makes wood puzzles, the most difficult of which, he says, is one that has six wood blocks of different shapes that form a cube if put together correctly.

"I've made others," he says, "but this is the hardest one. I've made a number of them and given them away."

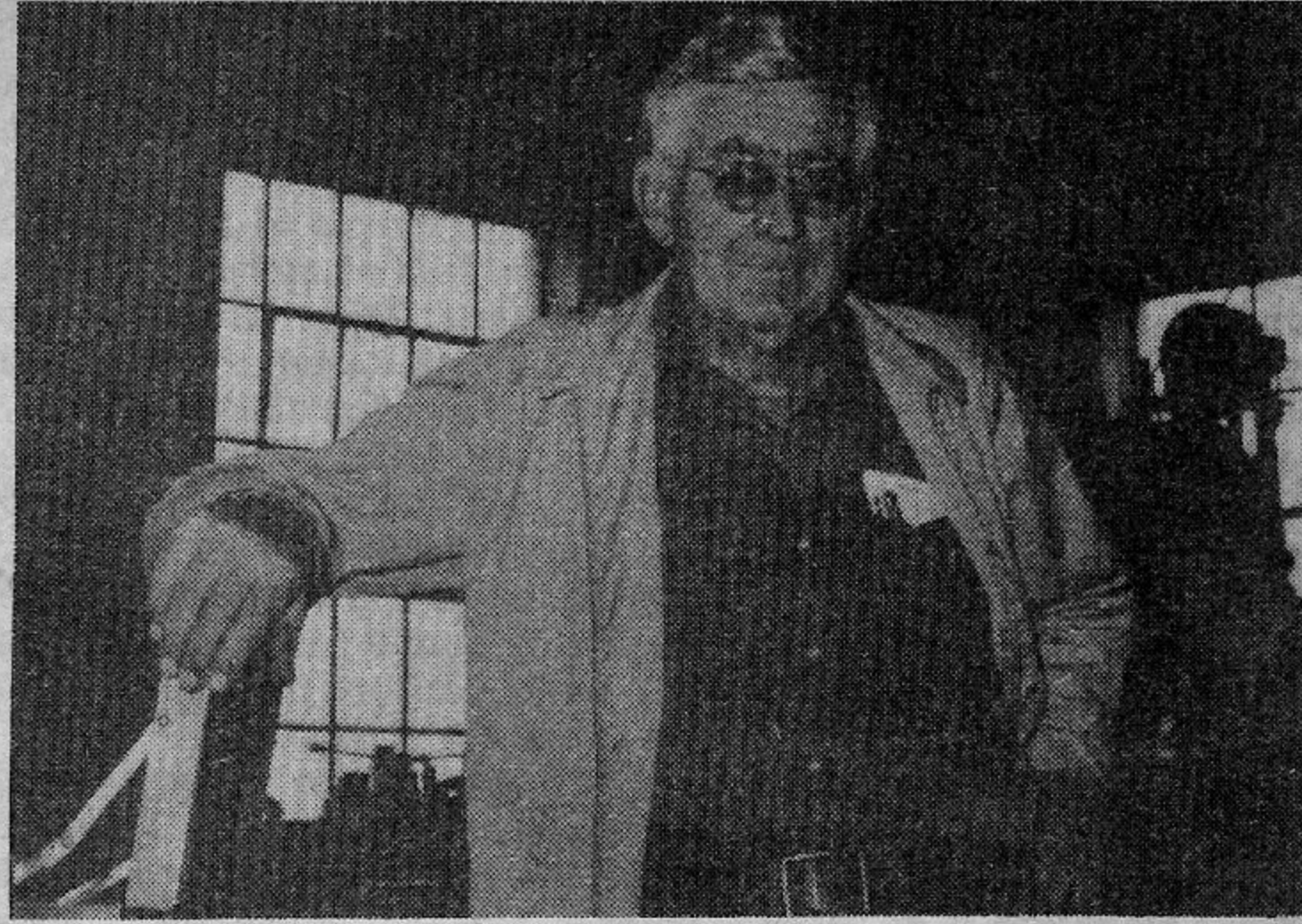

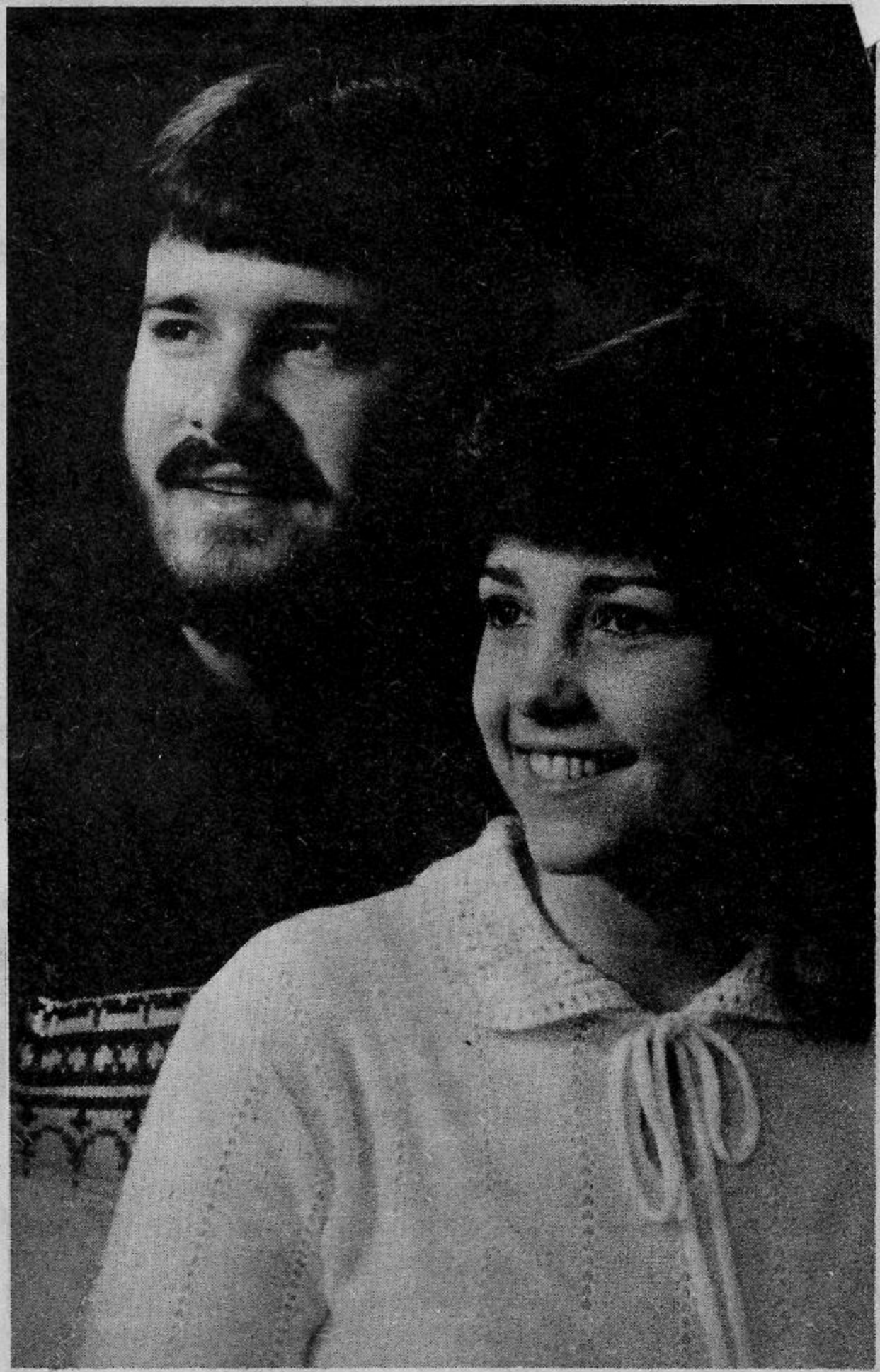

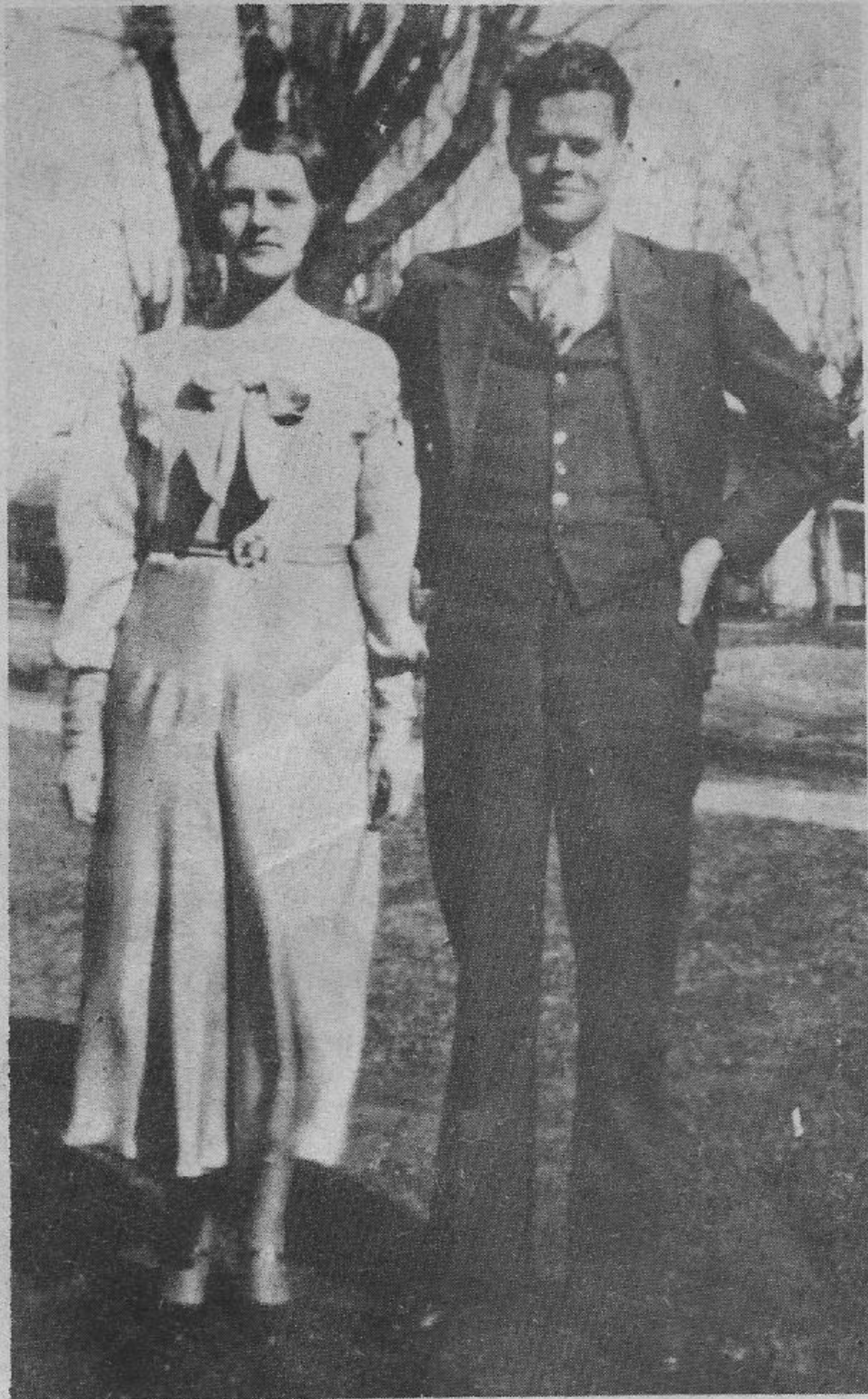

## Roedel found dead

### from gunshot wound

Martin Roedel, an 81-year-old Prairie Home man, was found dead at his home Saturday morning from a gunshot wound that was apparently self-inflicted, according to the Cooper County coroner, Gene Hansett.

Hansett said he and Cooper County Sheriff's Deputy Mel Weed were called to Prairie Home at about 8:30 a.m. Saturday. Authorities were called when Roedel reportedly failed to show up for his regular cup of coffee at the Prairie Home Cafe, causing friends to look for him and discover the body.

The cause of death was a shotgun wound in Roedel's chest, Hansett said. He said neighbors reported they heard a sound like a shot at about 6:30 a.m. Saturday.

Hansett said Roedel may have shot himself by accident. The weapon "was not in good working order," Hansett stated and Roedel

died in an area of his backyard where "he obviously worked on equipment.

"It is possible his intention was to see why the shotgun was not doing what it should. It is also possible that he went out there with the purpose of taking his own life."

There will be no further investigation of the death, Hansett said, as the Cooper County Sheriff's Department has determined there was no foul play involved.

# A man who calls the river home

**BOONVILLE** — He opens a photo album filled with pictures of people working on the Missouri River. Some date back to the 1920s.

His name is Jess L. Wooldridge and he tells his story in the slow self-assured voice that comes from spending 45 years working on rivers. The walls of his den are covered with pictures of many of the boats he worked on through the years.

"The boat I started on would get pretty cold in the winter. The new ones have beds like modern hotel rooms," said Wooldridge, who retired in 1974 and makes his home in Boonville.

Wooldridge's first job on the river was as an engineer on a small work boat that carried four people. He was responsible for keeping the boat's machinery running smoothly at all times. The boat was used to move barges that carried materials for building dikes.

It was hard work and the hours were long. During his first year on the river he worked 13 hours a day seven days a week with only two Sundays off.

Despite the early years of hard work, Wooldridge is pleased with what he managed to accomplish.

"I was only looking for a part time job when I first started," says Wooldridge, who drove a horse and buggy four miles to work from the town of Wooldridge, named after his grandfather.

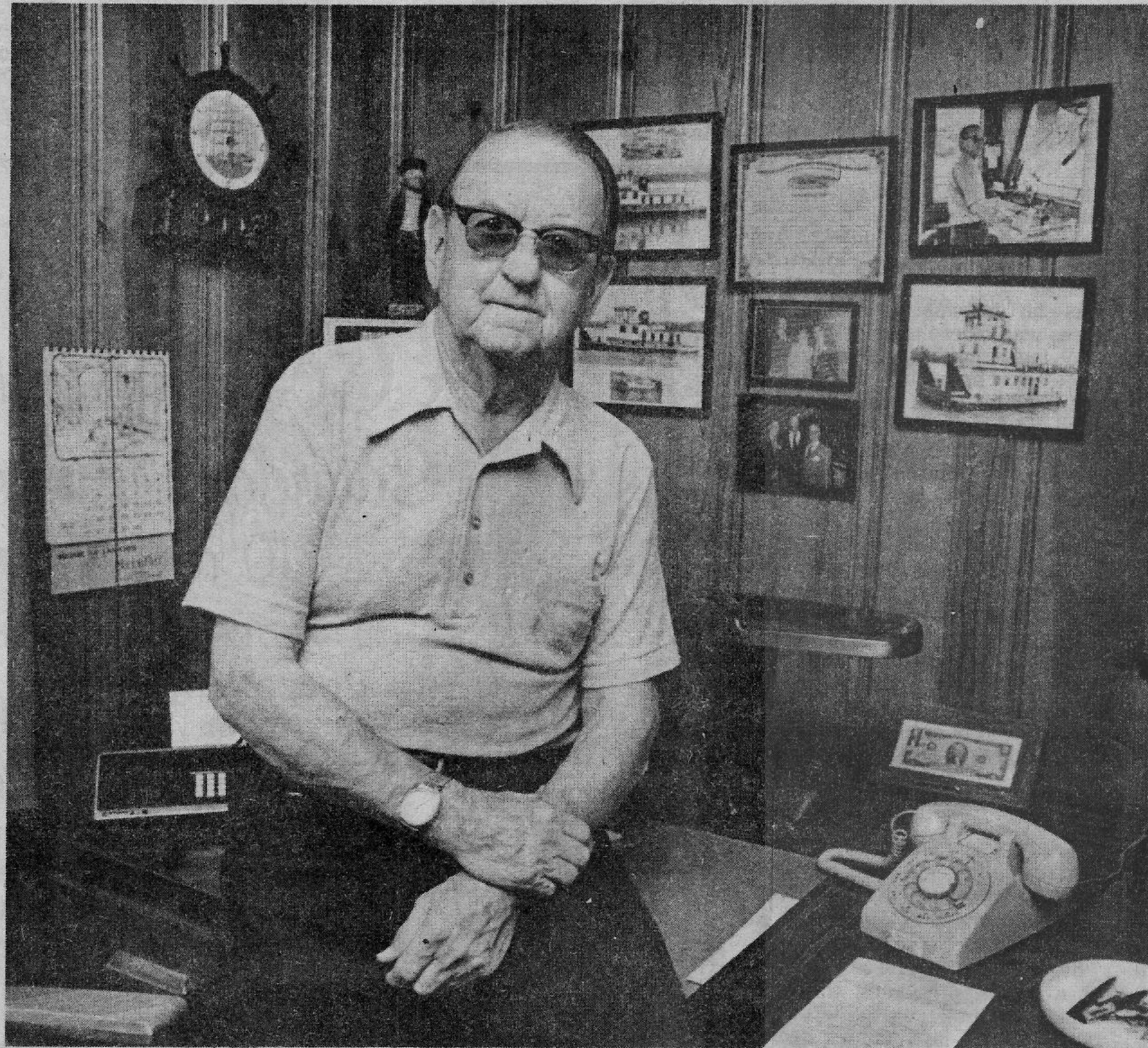
Wages were low during his first years on the river.

"I think the lowest I was ever paid was 33 and 1/2 cents an hour," Wooldridge says.

By the mid-30s, Wooldridge was supervising dike construction projects, some of which involved as much as \$1 million.

The construction company he worked for, almost always promoted men up through the ranks, Wooldridge says, and he still appreciates the opportunities he got to take on increasingly important responsibilities.

He is particularly proud of the fact that the company named a boat after him upon his retirement. He keeps a picture of the boat on the

wall in his den.

From the early 1950s to the end of his career, Wooldridge was in charge of all dike construction and repairs for the Massman construction.

Before dikes were built, most of the river was about four feet deep. Now after years of toil by Wooldridge and others, it runs about feet deep in most spots, allowing for much larger vessels.

Wooldridge also supervised con-

struction projects on the Mississippi and Arkansas Rivers.

"There is not that much river work today," Wooldridge says.

"The only really big job is one near Baton Rouge. Most of the work today is patch work."

Back in the old days a man on the river had to know how to splice rope.

"I bet few know how to do that today.

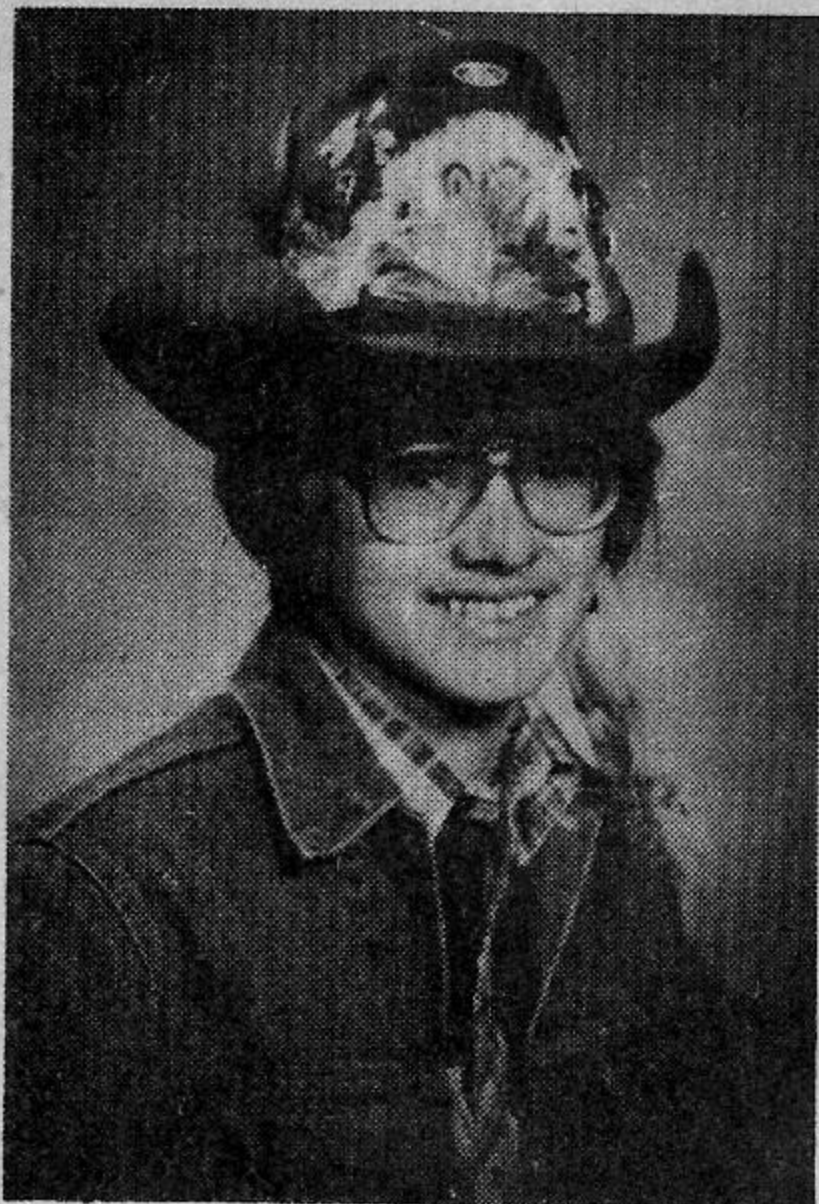
"A skilled man could build a whole barge with what's there," Wool-

drige explains as he points to some old tools on the wall in back of his house.

"When I hear the whistles on the boat from time to time they bring back memories," he says with a nostalgic glint in his eyes.

From time to time, Wooldridge goes back down to the Missouri River to see the boats and reminisce about the days when he was responsible for making it run deeper and faster.

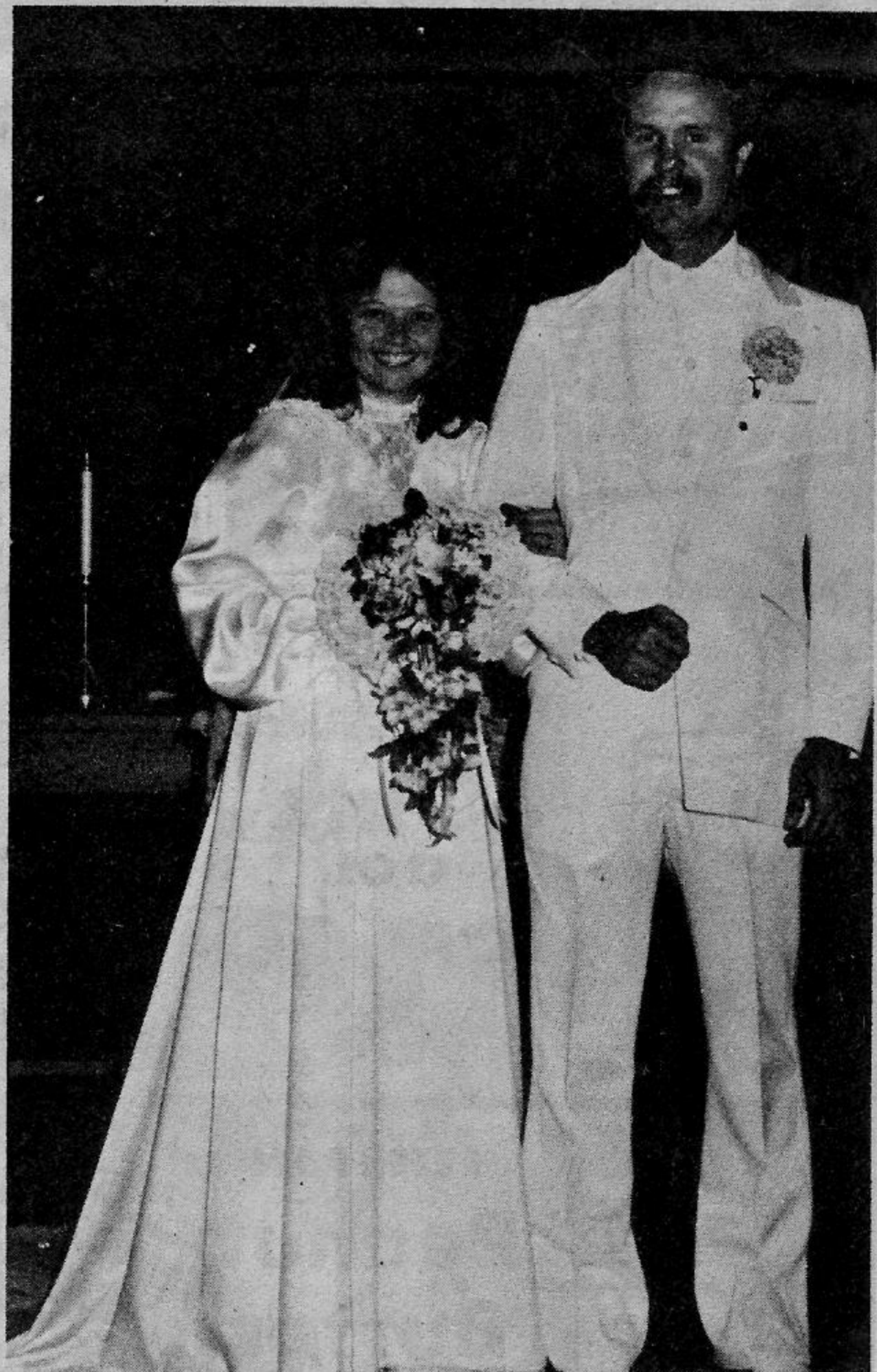

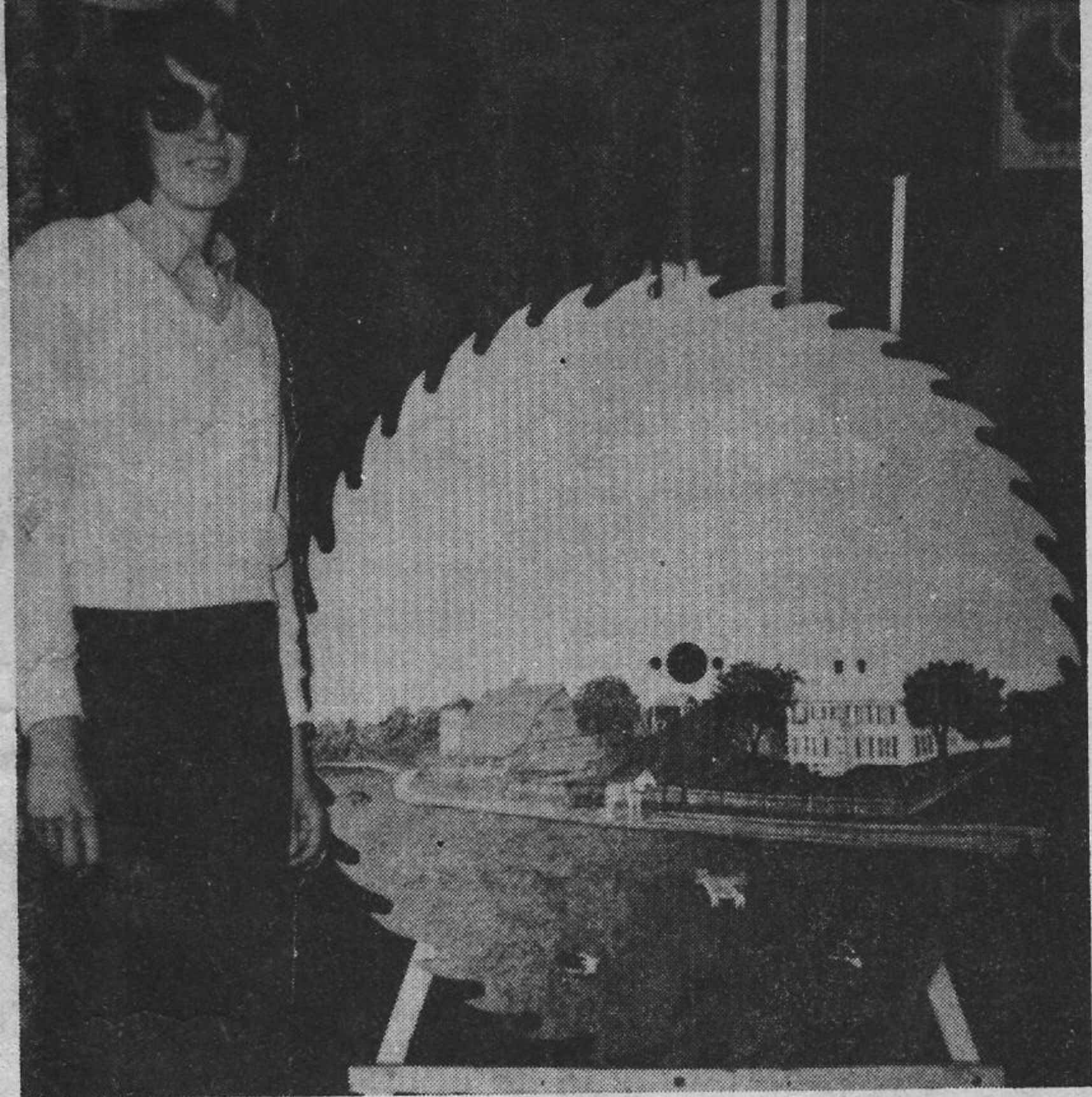

## **Original family farm captured in painting**

With an old circular saw blade, some turn-of-the-century pictures and her artistic talent, Mrs. Betty Fowler, Jamestown, has created an heirloom. She has captured in oil the Hickman farm near Lupus the way it looked around 1900. Mrs. Fowler and her husband, David, are members of the fifth generation of the family that still has the farm.

"I think my father-in-law (Shelby Fowler who is living on the farm now) got the idea I could do this from a picture I painted for my father (Bill Reynolds) when I first started painting," said the self-taught artist. Her first paintings were done after high school graduation. "Painting was just something I always wanted to try," Mrs. Fowler said.

But, since the birth of her three children who range in age from five and a half to 18 months, she said she hadn't done much painting. "I've been doing needle work because it's easier to keep little fingers out of that," she continued, "So, when we got the old saw blade and wanted a picture on it I wasn't sure I could even paint any more."

"I worked from a lot of old pictures but there were still changes and the photographs were all in black and white so I had to ask a lot of questions," Mrs. Fowler said. The

mound next to the house was the old cellar but the door had been changed so she asked Fowler about that. Her grandfather, Floyd Wiser, provided her with the color of the shutters and a description for the old buggy in the foreground. She even found a piece of the decorative upper porch railing in the attic that she used for reference.

The project ended up involving even more people. She had never painted on metal before and didn't realize the preparation it needed. Her father sanded the rusty blade front and back for her and she used a rust-proofer as a base coat. Shelby Fowler built the easel so Mrs. Fowler would have a place to work on the painting. And her mother-in-law, Mrs. Fowler, put in at least two full days of babysitting so the work could be completed. "I worked while the kids took their naps," Mrs. Fowler said, "but, that didn't go very fast. It still took two months to finish."

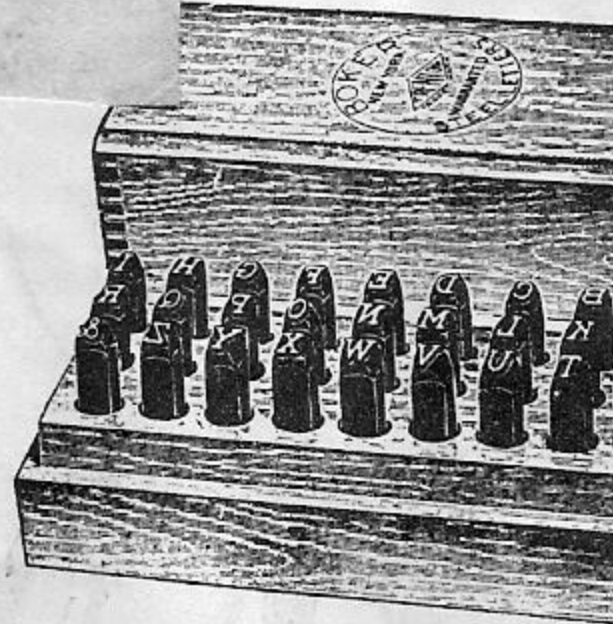

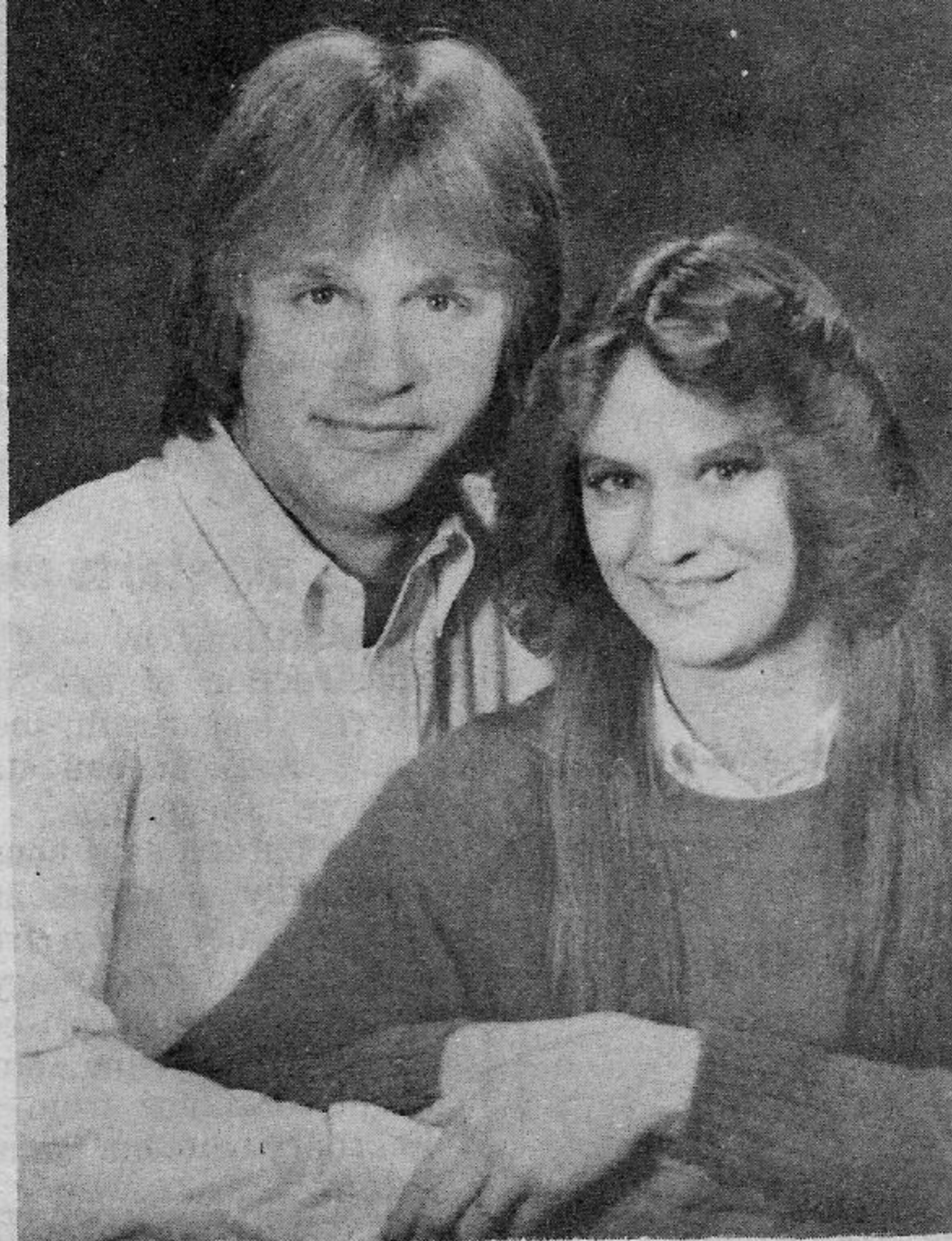

WOOLDRIDGE — Todd Selck displayed the ambivalence of a young man when asked about the future. "It depends on how this goes," he said.

Selck, 19, is the proprietor of the Wooldridge General Store. In January, the store closed for several weeks when Tom and Joyce Adair were unable to find a buyer for the business.

Then came Selck. How did he raise enough money?

"I just went in and asked for a loan," he said with a grin.

In the fall, Selck was a freshman at the University of Missouri. He still plans to go back to college this year, but he's taken a semester off to launch his first retail venture.

"I knew everybody in the community would miss the store," Selck, who lives with his family on a farm near Wooldridge, said. As in the past, the store stocks an eclectic mixture of items — groceries, hardware, gasoline and farm supplies such as feed and chemicals.

"I've added a completed line of nuts and bolts," Selck said. He said he would stock "whatever moves."

As Selck spoke during a quiet Wednesday afternoon, he conducted some business. A child purchased a candy bar for 25 cents. With tax the price would be 26 cents. "Where's your penny?" Selck asked.

The kid searched his pockets in vain. Selck sighed. "Bring it in tomorrow," he said in the tone of one accepting the inevitable.

It can pay to shop at a small store. But Selck concedes it is difficult to compete with Boonville and Columbia stores. "They can buy stuff in such volume," he said. "I try to be as competitive as I can."

With long-time store employee, Ora Lee Adair, back with the store with her third owner, Selck, who graduated in 1983 from Boonville High School, said he hopes to attend the university part-time in the fall.

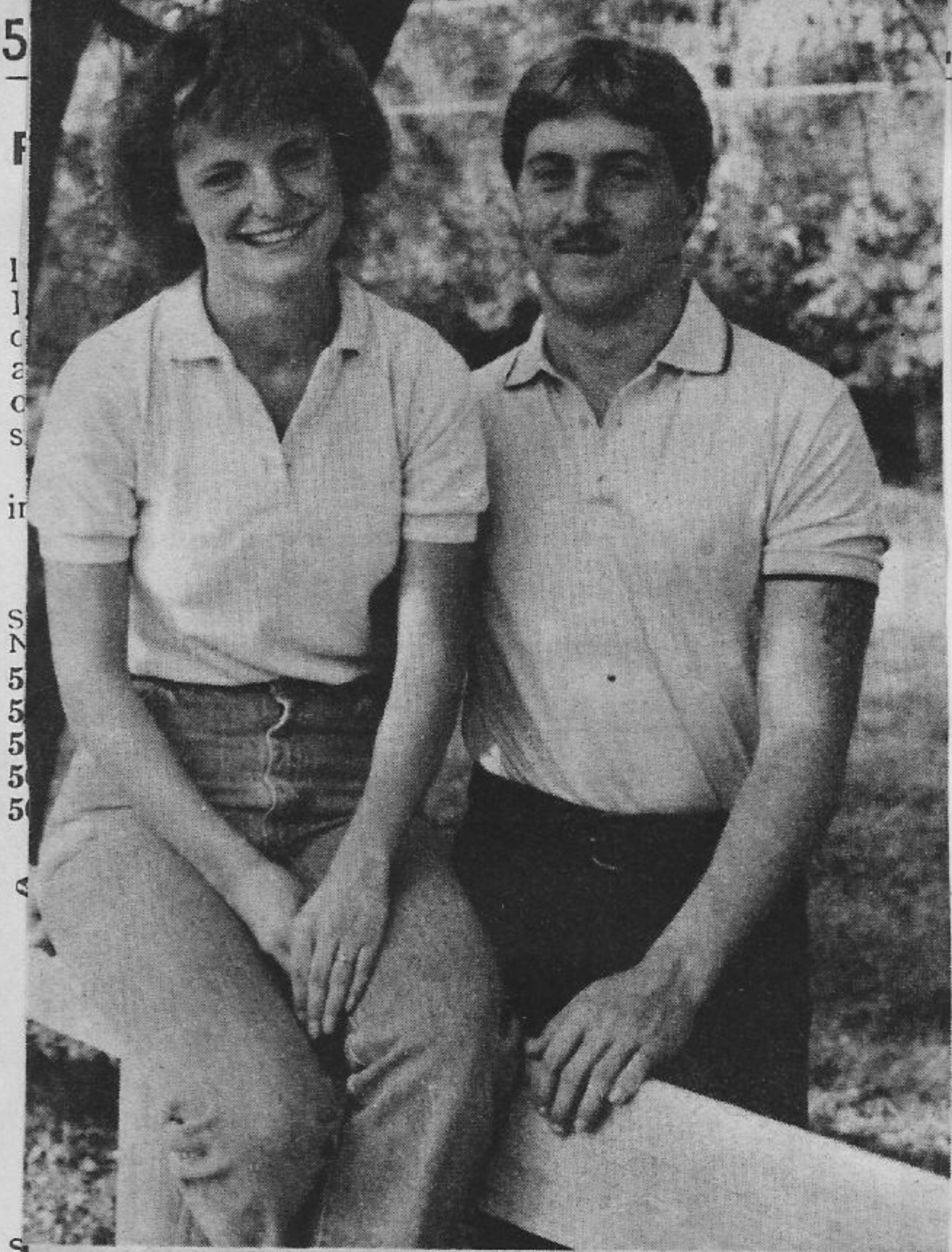

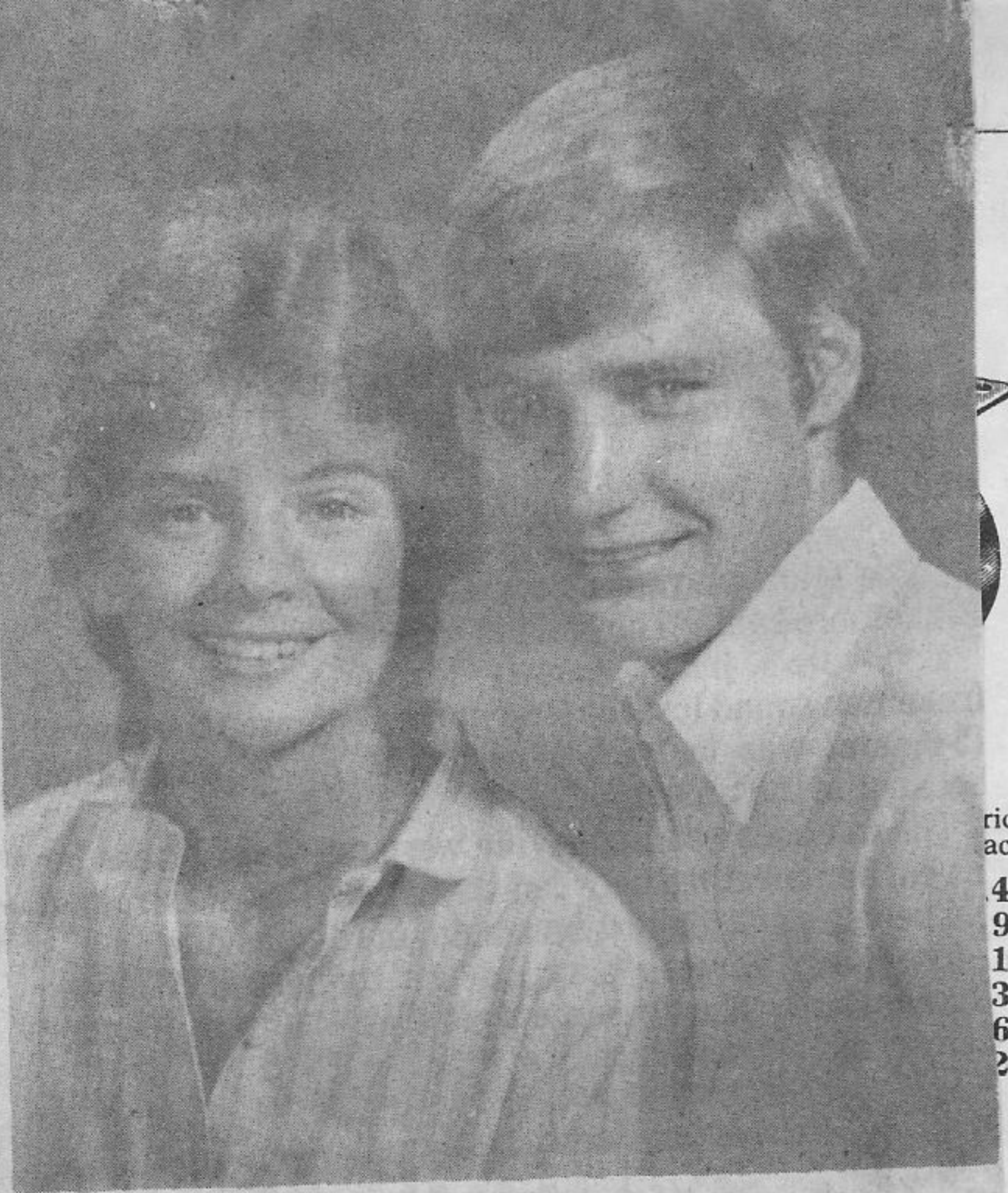

## Sawmill's role

Sawmills played an important role in the development of Boonville and Cooper County. They operated early in the area (circa 1830s) due to the fine standing timber comprised of walnut, hickory, oak of all kinds, ash, cottonwood and redbud. By 1910, Cooper County still had 54,760 acres of woodland. The timber lands were the first areas cleared by the pioneers to be cultivated. They had never farmed the best prairie lands and

thought them to be unsuitable for cultivation. During the Civil War, the mills were hidden and moved frequently to avoid being taken over by either side. The photo, donated to the archives by Mrs. Less Bobbitt, was taken on the Anton Eckerle Farm near Pleasant Green. Operated by brothers, Fred and Anton Eckerle, it was typical of the mills in the area that operated after the turn of the century.

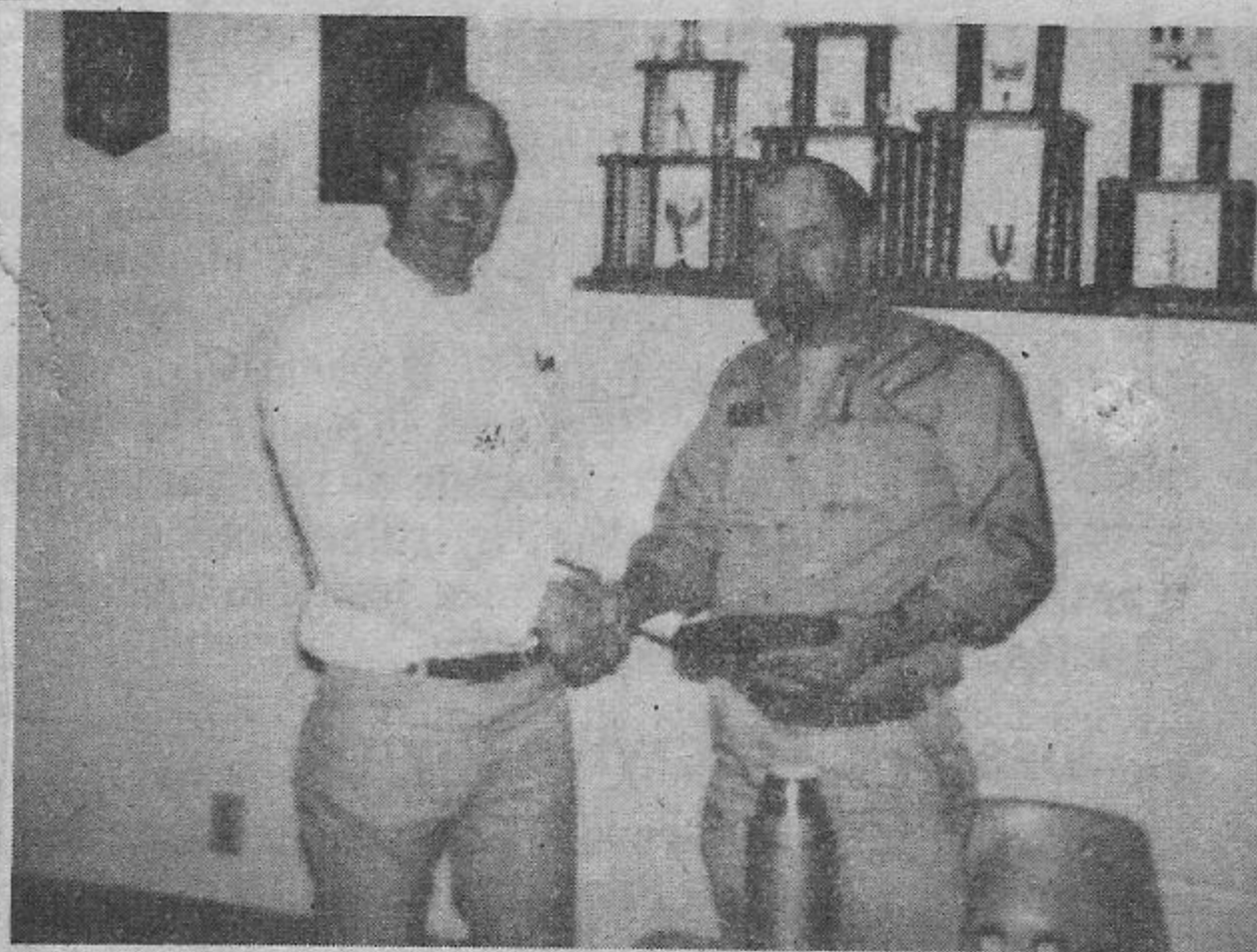

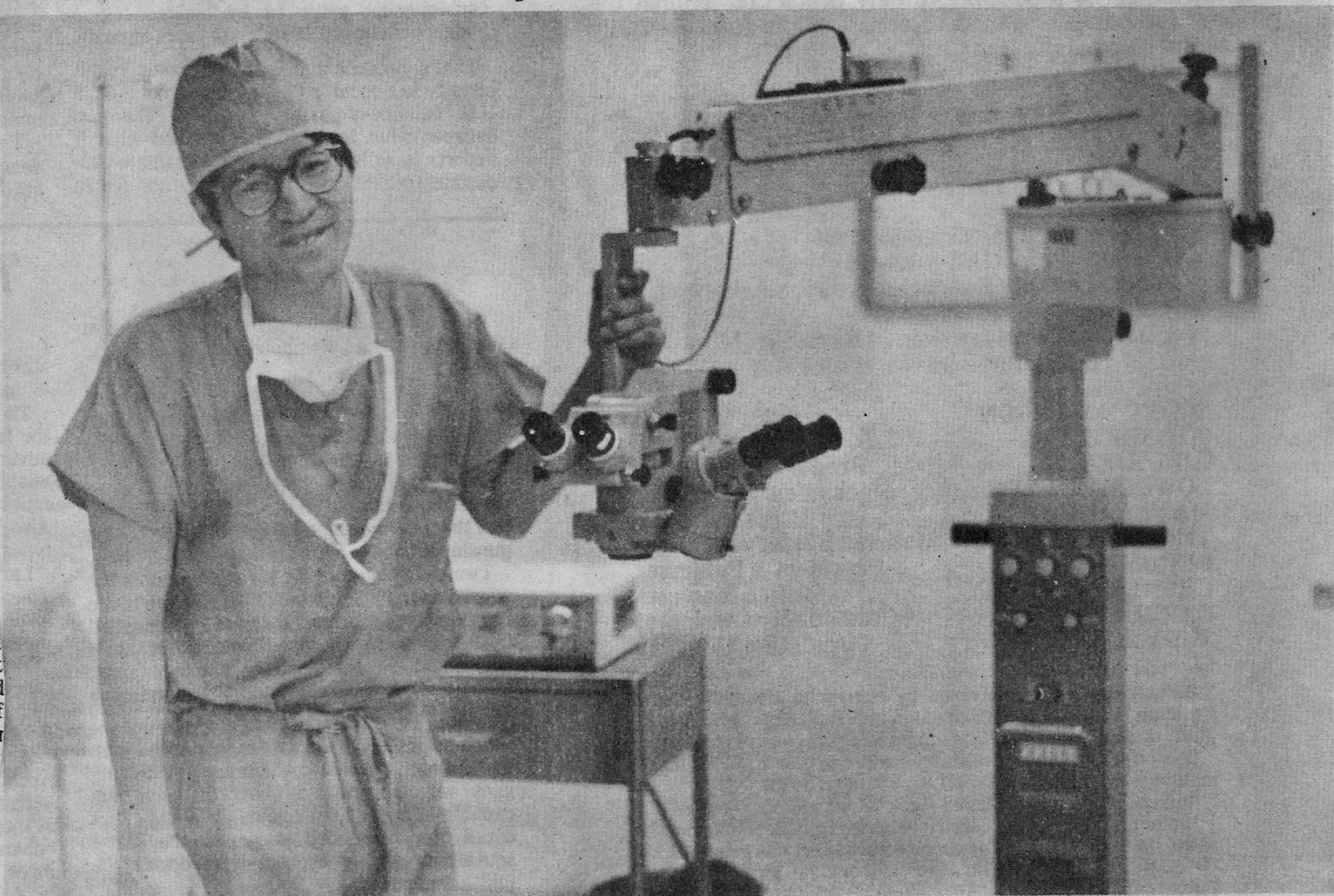

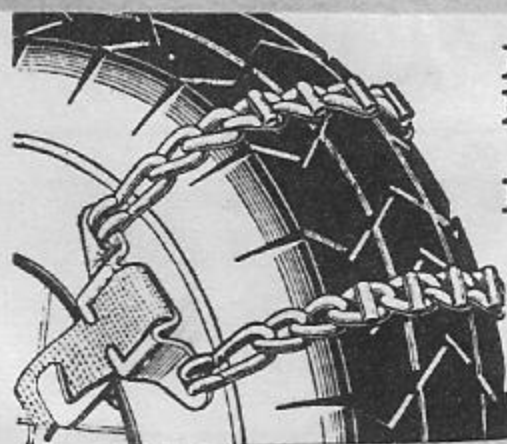
Chris Douglas Offfield, 34, died Friday, Nov. 15, of a heart attack at his Chicago, IL, home.

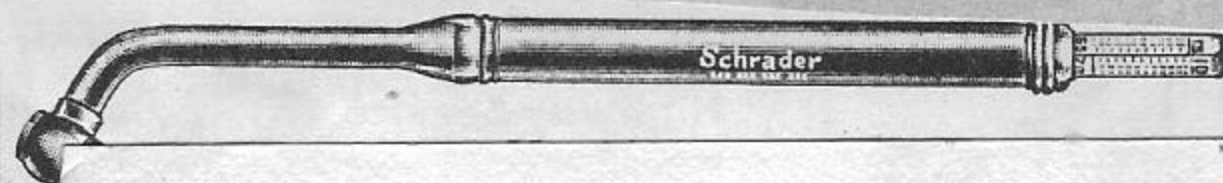

# Gooch's Mill once a place of activity and social life

Boyhood peaceful and fun filled in little town

Certainly we didn't want him to fall through. And the possibility of such an unfortunate incident was indeed small. Thorough plans had been made, and precautions taken to forestall such an occurrence. But the mere fact that it was dangerous was enough to make it an exciting event for the few small boys in Gooch's Mill, a small village about 12 miles south and a bit east of Boonville.

Coley Renfrow was going to drive the steam threshing engine across the bridge. Although the bridge, built of heavy timbers, was a sturdy structure, its strength was challenged by the weight of this ponderous machine, used to power the "separator" in wheat harvest.

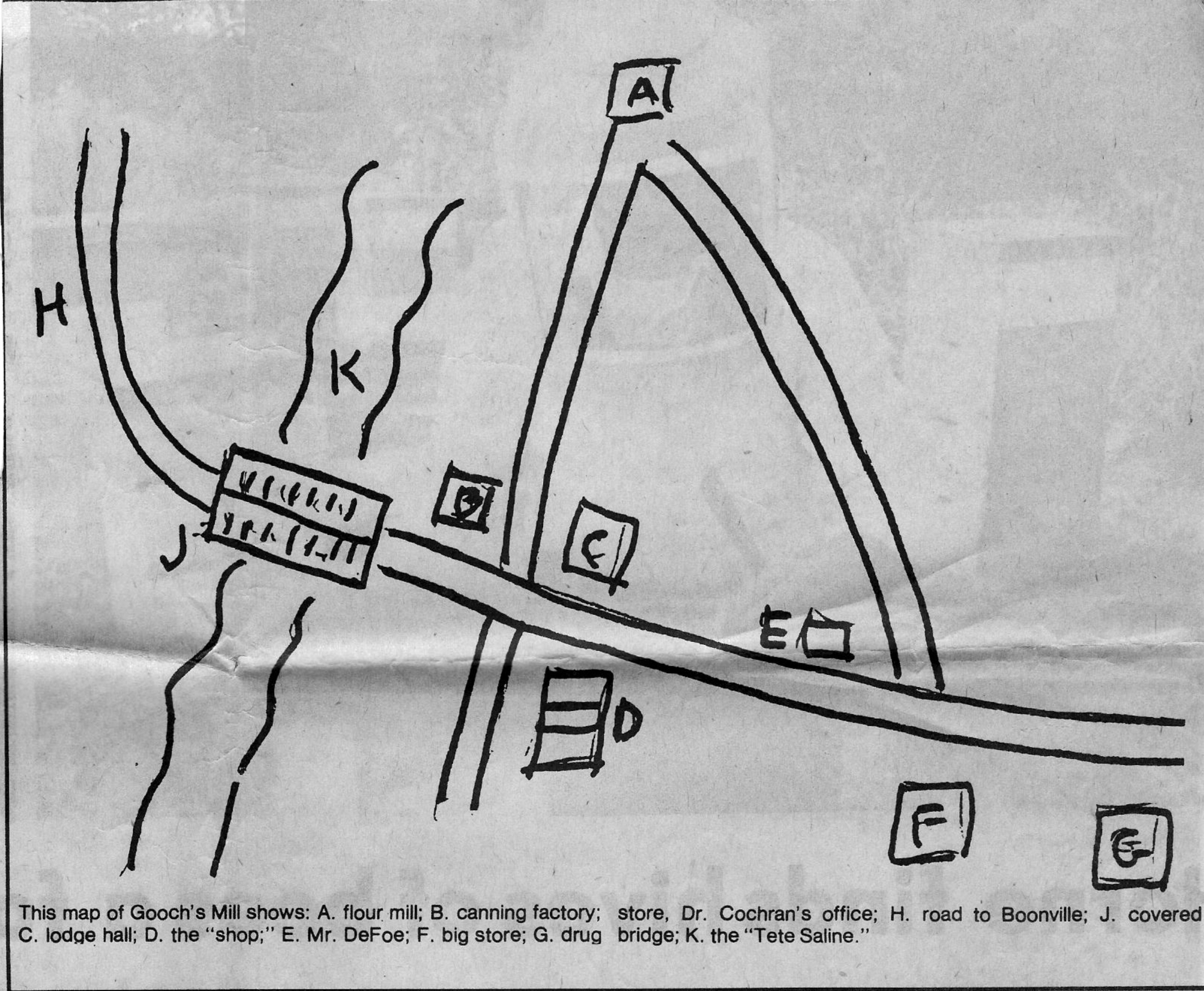
Coley and his father, Andy, served the farmers over much of Cooper County in the days when wheat harvest was a big and complicated job. Instead of the efficient combine method in use today, which gets the job done quite quickly, the old method required the use of a separator and steam engine — far more dramatic than the combine. The rhythmic CHUG chug of the engine with its big spinning "Fly wheel," the swish of the long, wide belt transferring power to the separator, the straw and chaff spewing out of the huge separator rack, were the fascination for small boys.

This structure on which Coley was challenging fate was a covered bridge, its floor protected from the weather by a roof. It led the road from Boonville across the "Tete Saline" into Gooch's Mill. This stream, its name obviously a contraction from the French Petite Saline (Little Salty), was a small creek at the foot of the hill on which the town stood.

In my childhood I had lived a few years in Gooch's Mill. Several years ago, while visiting in Boonville, I had the opportunity to return to this place which I had not seen for over 50 years. Having long since forgotten the route, I asked my cousin, William C. Renfrow of Boonville, to accompany and direct me.

I must confess to a slight feeling of nostalgia on seeing the place. Suffering the fate of many such villages in rural America, what had been a moderately active community in the early part of the century had become little more than a memory. The only building remaining was the house in which I had lived.

In those days, when travel to Boonville was not as easy or convenient as it is now, Gooch's Mill had provided the service of a trading center to the farmers in the surrounding area. One of these services was the "Big Store." While in no sense of the stature of a modern department store, it featured a good selection of "general merchandise," about everything in the way of clothing, shoes, hardware, groceries, stock feed and the like for which there might be an immediate

need.

Cash was not always necessary for purchases. As was customary in those times, eggs, butter, milk, live chickens, hams, etc., were accepted in barter to be later converted to cash at a larger market.

Long before the coming of rural electrification, illumination was provided by carbide lights. A few feet from the store was a tank arrangement wherein water and the appropriate chemical were mixed to generate the carbide gas which was piped into the building. I well remember the goshawful odor which emanated from this contraption. But it served the purpose.

Another such institution was the Drug Store operated by Mr. Mischler, a nice, pleasant, rather short little man with a decided German accent. The stock was of general medical supplies with, of course, a prescription service. Mr. Mischler was a registered pharmacist.

A flour mill, located near the creek, was operated by Walter Niederwimmer. His two sons, Harold and Herbert, were my playmates. The mill ground the wheat and corn brought in by the area farmers.

Walter was a big, good-natured man of German stock. He spoke very good English except for the word, "geography" which always came out "jovaky".

One of the most colorful characters in the community was the town harness maker. Mr. DeFoe worked, and lived, in a small, two-room building.

While he was an excellent craftsman, able to do wonders with leather, he was somewhat less than a paragon of cleanliness and sanitation. That he ever washed, or changed his clothes or bed linens is, to be kind, doubtful. He had one skillet and an aluminum pot in which he did all his cooking — on an upright stove which he kept going winter and summer. These utensils were not overly worn by too much scrubbing!

Nevertheless, Mr. DeFoe was a pleasant, not uneducated man, quite well liked by the adults, and held in especially high esteem by the kids who were always welcome in his shop. He was a flowing fount of stories and a willing supplier of leather scraps for the kids to make sling shots.

One establishment, very important to the agricultural economy of the community, was the combined wood and blacksmith shop — two separate activities housed in one large building.

The services provided were largely for farmers. The blacksmith shop was operated by Mr. Oscar Case and his two sons, Birt and Wirt. It was a rather large business for that day, with three coal fired forges and the attendant anvils and tools for handling the iron. There was usually a heavy demand for the sharpening of plowshares, refitting of iron wagon wheel tires or installation of new ones, repairs of various sorts, and the shoeing of horses and mules.

Mr. Case was a rather sober individual, skinny and a bit stooped, but very strong from hours of pounding iron and wrestling nervous horses. Not given to much humor or idle talk, he was nevertheless highly regarded in the community as an honest, capable, hardworking man — a good neighbor and citizen.

There was also in the family an imbecile son who, in good weather, roamed about in a large, fenced-in yard. He spent his days picking up sticks, weeds, leaves, and pebbles and throwing them out of his yard. He was about 40 years old when I knew him. I don't know how long he lived. But throughout his life he had to be cared for as one would tend a small child.

In the shop were two telephone booths — which leads to the story of the garrulous lady. She loved to talk in the "local" phone booth — which was primarily for business purposes. Her heavy use of the phone began to cause problems.

One day the boys in the shop concocted a scheme to discourage her conversational binges. They cut a small hole in the top of the booth, placed a five-gallon can of water (rigged with a valve to discharge the water) in such a way that, at the pull of a string, the victim would be subjected to a minor deluge. In a few days the lady appeared for her usual gabfest — and suffered the flood! I never did learn whether or not the device served its noble purpose.

Mr. Case had little use for automobiles. However, he did own a Model T Ford for business use. While it was usually driven by Birt or Wirt, Mr. Case had learned, albeit reluctantly, the basics of driving.

One day he had occasion to go over to Overton, a small railroad town about five miles away. The primary function of this place was to provide a stock loading station for the Missouri Pacific railroad. Near the station was a well and the road circled this facility.

Now, so the story goes, Mr. Case managed to start the Ford and drive it successfully to Overton. But lo, on arriving in town he forgot, if he ever knew, how to stop this miserable machine! So — in a calm, sensible handling of the situation, he simply drove the "T" round and round that well until it ran out of gas. Actually, I seriously doubt the authenticity of this tale.

The woodworking shop had been established by my grandfather, but in my childhood my father ran the place. His work consisted mainly of repair, renewal, or complete building of wooden farm equipment such as various parts of farm wagons, plow handles, hay frames, harrows, etc. In some projects, such as repairing a wagon wheel, which required removal of the iron "tire," repairing the wheel, then refitting the tire or replacing it, my father and the blacksmith worked together.

The blacksmith shop faced the road. The wood shop was at the rear of the building. Between these two sections was the "machine shop" which contained equipment required by both shops — lathes, power

drills, saws of various kinds, all powered by a big "make and break" gasoline engine. In the make and break system of ignition, the cylinder was fired only when the engine slowed to below a certain speed. The momentum of the big flywheel carried much of the power.

My father was also a licensed embalmer and undertaker, or mortician as it is now called. Such dual vocations were often necessary in small towns. Over the years he served many of the families in the area. I shall never forget one summer when the community suffered the onslaught of a tornado. My father and other morticians in nearby towns were busy for almost a week in taking care of the victims.

The storm passed within a quarter of a mile of our house. We kids were terrified of dark clouds for a long time afterward.

My grandfather, Asa Manson, was for some years the Justice of the Peace. His responsibilities in this capacity were usually not very demanding since crime in the community was then a negligible problem. However, from time to time minor legal problems which required his attention did arise.

I remember him fondly. He honored me by paying attention to a small grandson. He took me hunting one day and, by sheer chance, I killed a rabbit with his 410 gauge shotgun. My conscience bothered me for weeks.

Gooch's Mill was also served by a barber, my uncle, William C. Renfrow, Sr. That which I most clearly remember about Uncle Bill was the fact that he was crippled and walked with a cane. When both hands were needed in working, he hooked the crooked handle of his cane in his back pocket. Uncle Bill was a quiet, unobtrusive man with a pleasant sense of humor, highly regarded in the community.

One of the leading citizens of the community was Dr. O.W. Cochran. He was your traditional country doctor, ready to go wherever and whenever he was needed. Although he had an office, his services were usually by house calls. For many years he tended the sick, delivered the babies, comforted the distressed, and gave "shots" to the kids.

I remember being quite reluctant to receive this particular ministrations, usually applied to the backsides of the anatomy. But by showing me how bravely it was endured by an older child, and promising me the little bottle the serum came in, he convinced me to "take the plunge," so to speak.

The Lodge Hall stood just about across the road from the "shop." It was the meeting place for the Woodmen of the World and Odd Fellows fraternities and was also used for Sunday School. That was when our sole Sunday School literature was the "Memory Card" on which was a Bible scene, some scripture, and the "Golden Text" which we were expected to memorize.

One of the most pleasant of my childhood memories is the Junk Pile. This kids' treasure-trove was located about 50 feet from the blacksmith shop. It was a collection of thousands of scraps of iron and other discarded materials accumulated over many years. There were all sorts of delightful old wheels, bolts, gears, levers, rods, and the like. Being allowed free

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run of the place, we boys were thus able to build an infinite variety of wonderful contraptions. Of course, the price was an occasional scratch or cut. Yet I remember no serious mishap.

An attempt was once made to create a local industry called the Tomato Canning Factory. A suitable building was erected across the road from the blacksmith shop and near the bridge. However, the project was unsuccessful and the plant closed in a short time. I well remember the powerful stench of tomato peelings and other waste. After its abandonment the empty building became a marvelous place to play.

Although there was still the social barrier of segregation in those years, there were several black families in the community who were much respected and held in friendship by the white folks. Among these were Arthur and Nancy Boles. Nancy was a small, motherly woman who was unquestionably the head of

the family. Arthur was not much larger than Nancy, a bit stooped, and walked with a sort of shuffle. He was honest and hard working, always ready to smile, but completely willing for Nancy to make the decisions — which was probably a good thing. They were a well adjusted couple who would make either black or white welcome in their home. They were among my father's best friends.

Another fine black lady, large and talkative, but thoroughly devoted to children of any color, was Isadore. I don't remember her last name. What I do remember are the times the other youngins and I would visit her — for her interesting company and, if truth be known, to be treated with bread and butter, cookies, or other delicacies. Isadore is surely in Heaven!

Then there was Zach Poole. Zach was BLACK, a rich ebony, undiluted by genetic mutations. And he rode an old mule which was almost as white as Zach was black. And they both were big! Zach's voice was way down there in the lower register. To a 10-year-old, Zach was scary! The first time I saw him was when he came to my dad's shop to see about some work my father had done for him. Well, I kept my distance — until I noted my dad's cordial greeting to Zach, and heard them laughing heartily over some foolishness they shared.

So I came to know this big kindly giant as a gentle, honest, hard-working man.

I am inclined to feel that something very valuable was lost to our nation by the passing of the small towns such as Gooch's Mill. There are vestiges all over the country where once people lived — for the most part in a peaceful, tranquil and rather uncomplicated way. Naturally, problems and conflicts sometimes arose. But as a rule, neighborliness and helpfulness often made for a caring community. They are a significant part of Americana.

Well, that was Gooch's Mill in the early years and 'teens of the century. Long gone, it is nevertheless much a part of Cooper County history. There can't be many left who remember it. Before too long there will be none. So perhaps these lines will help to make a little niche for it in that history.
