Oliver F. Dammon, 82, and Opal R. Dammon, 79, of 108 S. 28th St., died Wednesday, Sept. 23, 1986, in their home. Her death was ruled a murder; his a suicide.

He was born March 19, 1904, in Lansing, Iowa, to Joseph and Olga (Anderson) Dammon. She was born Dec. 30, 1906, in Wooleridge, Mo., to John and Leona (Johnson) Mills.

They were married in Boonville, Mo., Sept. 6, 1924. They both had been employed by the Northern Engraving Co.

Survivors are two daughters, Maxine F. Nelson of La Crosse and Shelba McBride of Ettrick; two sons, John of Genoa, and Robert of La Crosse; 17 grandchildren; and 17 great-grandchildren.

Oliver Dammon also is survived by two sisters, Lillian Strub and Josephine Whalen, both of Lansing. He was preceded in death by a brother and a sister.

Opal Dammon also is survived by two sisters, Florence McGuire of Lubbock, Texas, and Lucy Polanec of San Luis Obispo, Calif.; and a brother, Richard Mills of San Jose, Calif. She was preceded in death by four sisters and four brothers.

The Dammons also were preceded in death by a grandson and a great-grandson.

Joint services will be 11 a.m. Friday in Wesley United Methodist Church. The Rev. Marvin L. Rowe will officiate. Burial will be in Mormon Coulee Memorial Park Cemetery.

Elderly pair's suffering finally over

When Rhonda Beeskau arrived at 108 S. 28th St. Tuesday morning to pick up her grandfather, he waved her away.

Oliver Dammon, an 82-year-old man who was suffering from lung cancer, told her he did not want to keep his daily doctor appointment because he didn't feel well.

"I said, 'Can I come in for a while? Is there anything I can do?' And he said, 'No honey, just go home.'"

Sometime after that — police aren't exactly sure when — Dammon walked into the southwest bedroom of his home and twice shot his ailing 79-year-old wife, Opal, with a .22-caliber revolver.

Then he placed the gun on a dresser and went into the basement. It was there he pointed a 12-gauge shotgun at his chest and killed himself with one pull of the trigger.

Police found the bodies shortly after 2:30 p.m. when a woman who came calling failed to get an answer at the front door.

Dammon's pain — the pain of his cancer and the pain of watching his wife slowly deteriorate from Alzheimer's Disease — was finally over.

The couple had been married for 62 years. They met when they were teenagers, according to Beeskau.

"I feel that this is how he feels they would be together for the rest of their lives. Because he didn't want to see Grandma put in a nurs-

ing home, and that's what we had been talking about lately," she said in a trembling, tearful telephone conversation today.

"He loved my Grandma more than anything in the world. He did it just out of love and compassion. I know that's why he did it. He loved her more than he loved himself."

Beeskau said she knew her grandfather had been depressed lately. But she never dreamed he would react in such an extreme way.

Police today said the case reminded them of a similar murder-suicide in a West Avenue high-rise unit in July 1983 when an elderly man shot and killed his wife and then turned the gun on himself. Both were close companions and had been sick for some time.

No matter how many similar cases police handle over the years, Police Chief Fred Asp said he never gets used to them.

Jim Schleifer, head of the police detective bureau, today said a message from Dammon was scrawled in lipstick on a bedroom mirror. He declined, however, to reveal what the message said.

There was no sign of forced entry to the house and no indication of a struggle, according to a police report.

The deaths came as a shock in this South Side neighborhood that was recovering from the suicide last month of the ailing 55-year-old Karl Schams, 120 S. 28th St.

Schams, who had been despondent.

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ent because of his illness, was killed instantly when he stepped in front of a Burlington Northern freight train Aug. 18.

LeRoy Justinger, who has lived 26 years at 111 S. 28th St., knew all the victims.

He remembered Dammon talking briefly about the death of Schams, though there was no outward indication that it gave Dammon ideas about doing the same thing.

"He said at the time, 'It's a shame.' But that's about all he said," Justinger said.

Justinger remembered Dammon as a friendly man, a good neighbor who borrowed tools and sometimes helped fix things, like Justinger's lawnmower.

Dammon occasionally talked about his illness and his wife's problems, though not in great detail, according to Justinger.

"He said she was having a hard

time," he said. "Sometimes he told me that he didn't know enough to help her."

"I wouldn't have said that he was the type of person to do it," Justinger added. "But when you're under duress, I guess you can see why he would."

Justinger said the best the neighborhood can do now is to go on and try to accept the tragedy like it did the death of Schams.

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Harlans mark 300 years with reunion in Delaware

Morris and Delores Burger and B.M. Harlan, all of California, attended an unusual family reunion Aug. 14-16 in New Castle, DE, to celebrate the 300-year reunion of the Harlan family in America.

"Come Back to Where it all Began" was the theme for the tricentennial event, so Harlans, some 800 strong, from all across America gathered at the site of the original landing for what may be one of the biggest family reunions ever.

They came to celebrate the 300th anniversary of the arrival of George Harland, his wife Elizabeth, their four children, and Michael who left Belfast for the New World. The brother, originally from England, fled Northern Ireland due to religious persecution and arrived in Delaware in August, 1687, purchasing land along the Brandywine River from William Penn.

Quakers by faith, George and Michael Harlan (they dropped the "d" after arriving in America) must have taken the Biblical advice "be fruitful and multiply" very seriously. Most of the estimated 12,000 people across the U.S. bearing the Harlan name, in addition to hundreds of women who have changed their name in marriage, are believed to be the descendants of George and Michael Harlan's 17 children.

The reunion began Friday evening with a reception at the Brandywine River Museum in Chadds

Ford, PA, and ended Sunday afternoon following a genealogical workshop at an inn in Wilmington, DE, the official reunion headquarters for the weekend.

At a four-hour picnic in New Castle Battery Park Saturday the clan met by regions to become acquainted with Harlans "closer to home."

"Although most of the people were strangers to us," commented Dolores, "we seemed to feel the bond of kinship and became acquainted rather quickly."

During a banquet held Saturday evening, the Harlan Family of America formed a permanent association that will be involved in several major, long-lasting family projects. It was decided to mark the graves of George and Elizabeth and Michael and his wife Dinah Dixon with permanent markers and also to contribute to a fund to restore St. Peter's Monkwearmouth Church in County Druham, England, which is over 1,300 years old. This church, where George Harlan was baptized, was heavily damaged by arson in 1984.

Harlan and Delores Harlan Burger are ninth and tenth generation descendants of George and Elizabeth Harland.

"After I get all the pieces cut out I work on them each evening," Slatts said. "I usually sit down in front of the television early in the evening and work on blocks while I watch some shows."

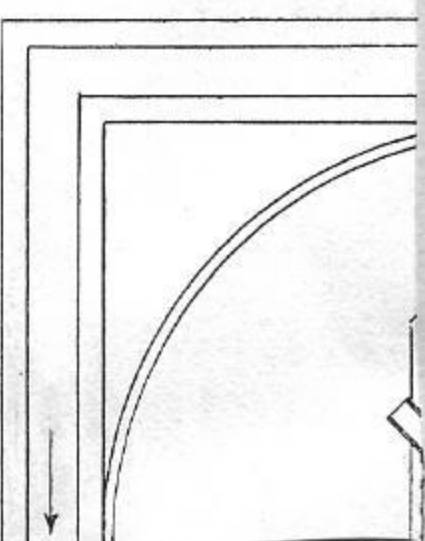
He said he spends two to four hours an evening, almost every evening, working on his quilts.

Jeanne Lacy, who is retiring after 27 years teaching high school English in Prairie Home, didn't really intend to go into teaching.

She trained for journalism in college but there weren't any jobs with sufficient salaries available at the time she graduated.

"And I didn't want to work nights in Sedalia," where a job was offered but which was a rather wild town at that time, she said.

"Teaching was not really my choice, but I got into it and I liked it."

It would have been surprising if she had avoided teaching because so many members of her family have taught and do teach.

"At our family dinner at Christmas, we have nine teachers at the table," she said.

Lacy's mother and father both taught, her father for 48 years and her mother for 45. Her sister, her only sibling, has taught for 25 years and both of her daughters teach.

Lacy said the profession is a good one for someone with a family because it offers the same hours as the children have and the summers are free.

Besides offering an opportunity to be home with the children, free summers give another advantage.

"Teachers don't find it as hard to retire as other people, because they always have the summers....I'm just going to let my summer slide into winter (this year)," she said.

But Lacy isn't in teaching just because of the conveniences. She has had goals, attitudes she wants to instill in her students.

As an English teacher, she has tried to teach them the appreciation of reading, "so the rest of their lives, they'll turn to books," she said.

"And I try to get them to use their imagination, which seems to be getting more and more difficult. So much is spelled out on television.

"I try to teach them to not be too critical of others and be honest and respect their friends and teachers," she said.

She seems to be a little sorry to be retiring without actually saying it. With her quick wit, referring to the school's decision to end the graduating class's traditional eight days in Florida after this year, she said, "I just decided I'd end with the senior trip."

She said she made the decision the first of this school year, writing on the chalkboard, "I am retiring this year," to avoid the questions she often got last year.

"It gave me a year to decide I really wanted to retire. I've been moving things all year."

Looking back over her 31½ years in teaching, Lacy said some things are different now from when she began. She first taught high school English in Eugene, Mo., then spent two years in Boonville teaching the sixth grade.

One of the differences is the students' reaction to homework.

"On any given day, 30 percent of them haven't done their homework. And their parents don't seem to get on to them."

And language.

"They don't use bad language around me but I hear other teachers say the language they use and what they talk about is one of the biggest changes," she said.

One of the differences that is humorous is the change in how they raise money for the senior trips, for which Lacy was the sponsor.

The money they obtain now by selling magazines, gift items and candy, they used to drum up a while back by picking apples, collecting walnuts and catching chickens—pulling them out of cages and putting them into coops to be sent to market.

"That paid well, but some of the girls were scared of chickens," Lacy said.

"I'm just going to go on doing what I always do," she said.

This includes a very large amount of community activity, enough to make the head swim.

She has been on the regional library board for 25 years, she is active in the Prairie Home United Methodist Church where she teaches Sunday School, she is the Prairie Home committeewoman for the Democratic party, she is on the Cooper County Mental Health Council, she is a member of the Prairie Home Civic Club and the garden club, she has been lay delegate from her church to the West Missouri Annual Conference in Fayette "for the past 15 or 20 years" and hopes to go on a trip with a church commission to Russia soon if it pans out.

Besides that she works in her garden of perennials at the two-story white frame home she and her husband, a retired farmer, have lived in for 25 years. She reads, does a little needlepoint and goes with her family every summer to the Y camp in Estes Park, Colo.

The activity she is most looking forward to in her retirement is spending more time with her two pre-school-age granddaughters, Lacy Clark, who lives in Bolivar, and Katy Lacy, who lives in Eldon.

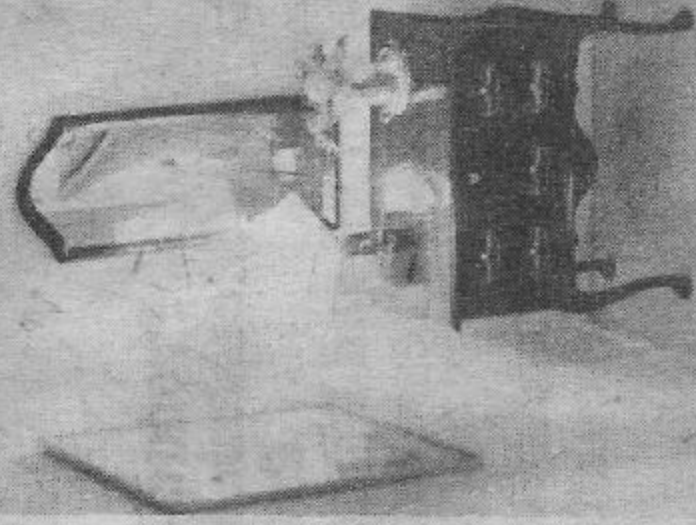
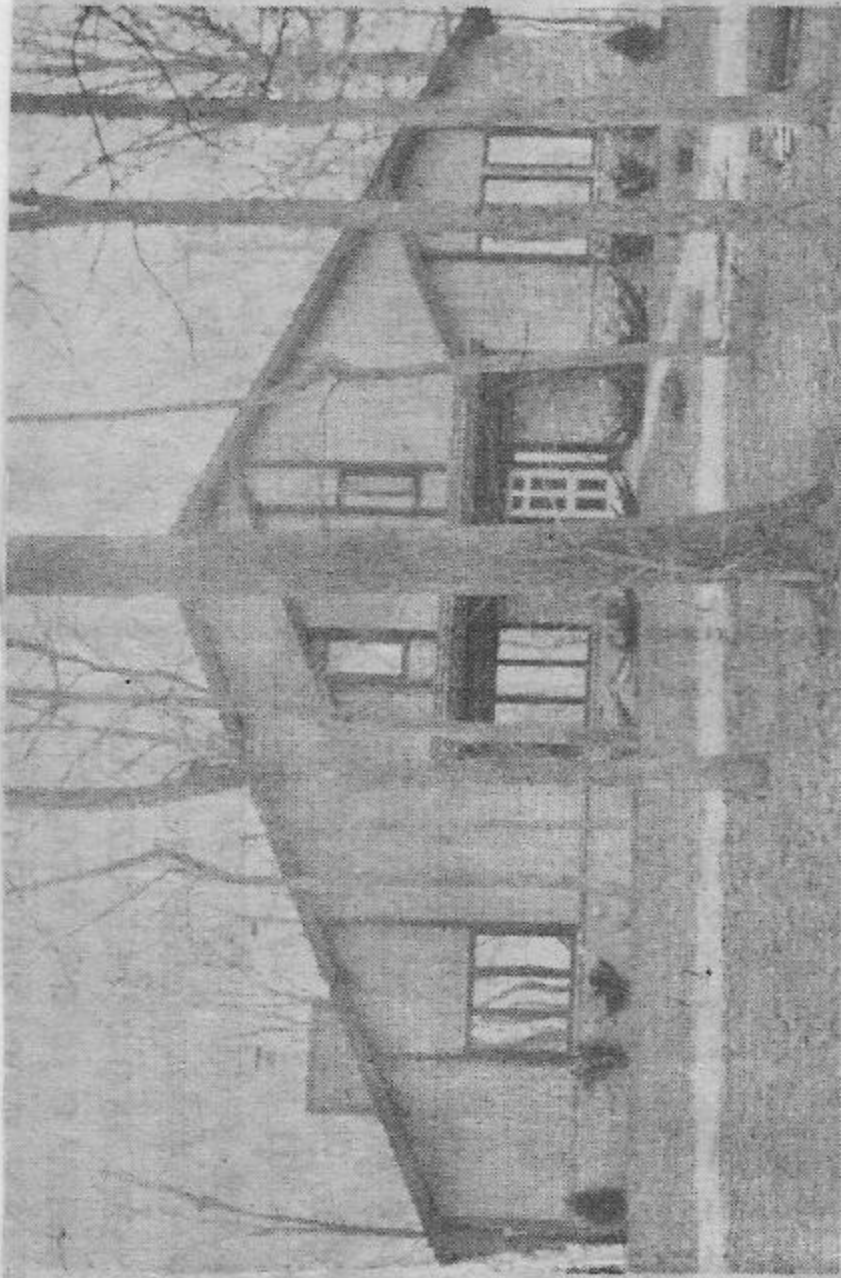


Featured at the home, one of four on the tour, will be a tall, natural Christmas tree decorated with 21 year's worth of children's ornaments.

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Generations Overlooking The River

Jake Neef is proud of a view of the Missouri River from a high hill on his farm, Rivercrest—it is as good or better than that from the lookout at Harley Park in Boonville.

"I wouldn't want to live anywhere else," he said of the farm. It's a good thing because he's been there for 92 years come June 13, his 92nd birthday.

He's the third generation to run the farm after his great-great grandfather Jonathan G. Neef founded the farm when he came to Missouri from Germany in 1847. And he is the third Jacob.

His great-grandfather, Jacob H. Neef, took over the farm when Jonathan died. Jacob H. was killed by Confederate guerillas in 1864 and his son, Jacob C., became the owner.

Jacob C. died young of blood poisoning and the present Jake assumed management along with his mother, Anna Neef, at the tender age of 15.

The hill high above the Missouri River offered more than a beautiful view for the young farmer. Besides farmer, he became dairy owner soon after his marriage to Viola Wallje in 1923. The hill offered good pasturage for the cows.

Neef said he would come to collect his Jerseys when it was still dark and steamboats coming down the river would shine their lights on the cows so he could see them.

There were a lot of dairies at that time, about ten, Neef said, serving Boonville, just four miles down the road from the farm.

"There used to be a light on every hill, everybody milking cows," he said.

Neef's daughters, Georgeanna Rau and Jane Stevens, remember the milking and the home delivery of the milk.

"We would take that milk before we went to Sunday school on Sundays," Stevens said.

Neef went through several versions of the dairy business, going from raw milk to pasteurized milk to homogenized milk, Rau said. He was proud of the richness of his product.

"Jerseys give real rich milk, good cream. You don't see too many Jerseys any more," he said.

Rau said many dairies use Hosteins now because they give more milk.

The Neefs finally went out of the dairy business in the '60s and concentrated on beef cattle. Neef had done a little showing of cattle earlier. One year in the '40s one of his animals received Grand Champion bull at the American Royal cattle show in Kansas City.

"Daddy just swelled way out on that one," Rau said.

In the past year Neef has switched over exclusively to crops and caring for his land.

"This is the first year there hasn't been any livestock on the farm," Rau said.

In this latest endeavor, Neef has the help of a family that has been working with his family for three generations.

The Renfrow men, from Blackwater, have helped the Neef men and women since George Washington Refrow was employed by a sawmill which processed lumber for the Neef farm.

Last week the latest two generations of Renfrows—Robert Everett (Pache) Renfrow and his father, Bobbie—were helping the present generation of Neefs', represented by Jake E., dig a pond.

"They're good dozin' people," Neef said.

The Renfrows had cleared about three acres of brush and moved dirt around to form a dam. This would hold back the water and prevent the soil from "going into the river on to New Orleans," Bobbie Renfrow said.

Other bulldozing work the Renfrows have done for the Neefs include preparing terraces and waterways.

There is a great deal of respect between the two families. Neef respects the ability of the father and son—and the grandfather, Everett, who bought the first bulldozer and still does some work. And the Renfrows admire how active Neef is in spite of his age.

"He doesn't need any help." Bobbie Renfrow said as Neef climbed up on the huge bulldozer aided only by his cane.

Neef regrets that he's not able to keep up the farm as he used to. But his family is happy he has it.

"He always has to keep busy," Rau said.

And one of his daughters wants to build a house on the hill overlooking the river someday, he said.

Ivan Dameron

45 years serving Mt. Pleasant Church

If a man told you his occupation took him 18,000 plus miles yearly, you might think he was a traveling salesman or professional athlete. In this case, 18,000 miles represents the estimated mileage of Rev. Ivan Dameron.

Rev. Dameron, who is 73, and his wife Faye, make numerous trips from their home near Bunceton to Jefferson City, Columbia, Sedalia, Boonville, Versailles, Tipton and California to visit people who are sick or in rest homes.

"People know me and they expect me to visit," Dameron said. Neither he nor his wife could estimate the number of people visited in an average week. However, they both agree slowing down is not in their plans.

Dameron came to Moniteau County in 1935 from Randolph County. It was in this county that he married his first wife, Helen Schlup of Jamestown. The two had met while both were students at Kansas City Theological Seminary.

Dameron's first wife died in 1970, and he married Faye Kimsey in 1973. Between them, there are eight children, 12 grandchildren and three great-grandchildren. They live on the Kimsey farm west of Pisgah where they help with the farm work and raise a garden.

After graduating from seminary, Dameron attended Southwest Baptist College in Bolivar, graduating in 1941 with an Associate's degree. The following year he was called as pastor of Mt. Pleasant Baptist Church, northwest of California.

He was licensed to preach by Mt. Salem Church in 1933, later being ordained by Union Baptist Church,

west of Jamestown. November will mark his 45th anniversary at Mt. Pleasant.

When he began at Mt. Pleasant, the church held services once monthly. In addition to preaching there, Dameron served other county Baptist Churches. Among the churches he served were Union, Elston, Enon, Mt. Zion, Sandy Hook and Clarksburg. Rev.

Dameron has served on the nominating committee of the Concord Baptist Association as well as two terms as moderator.

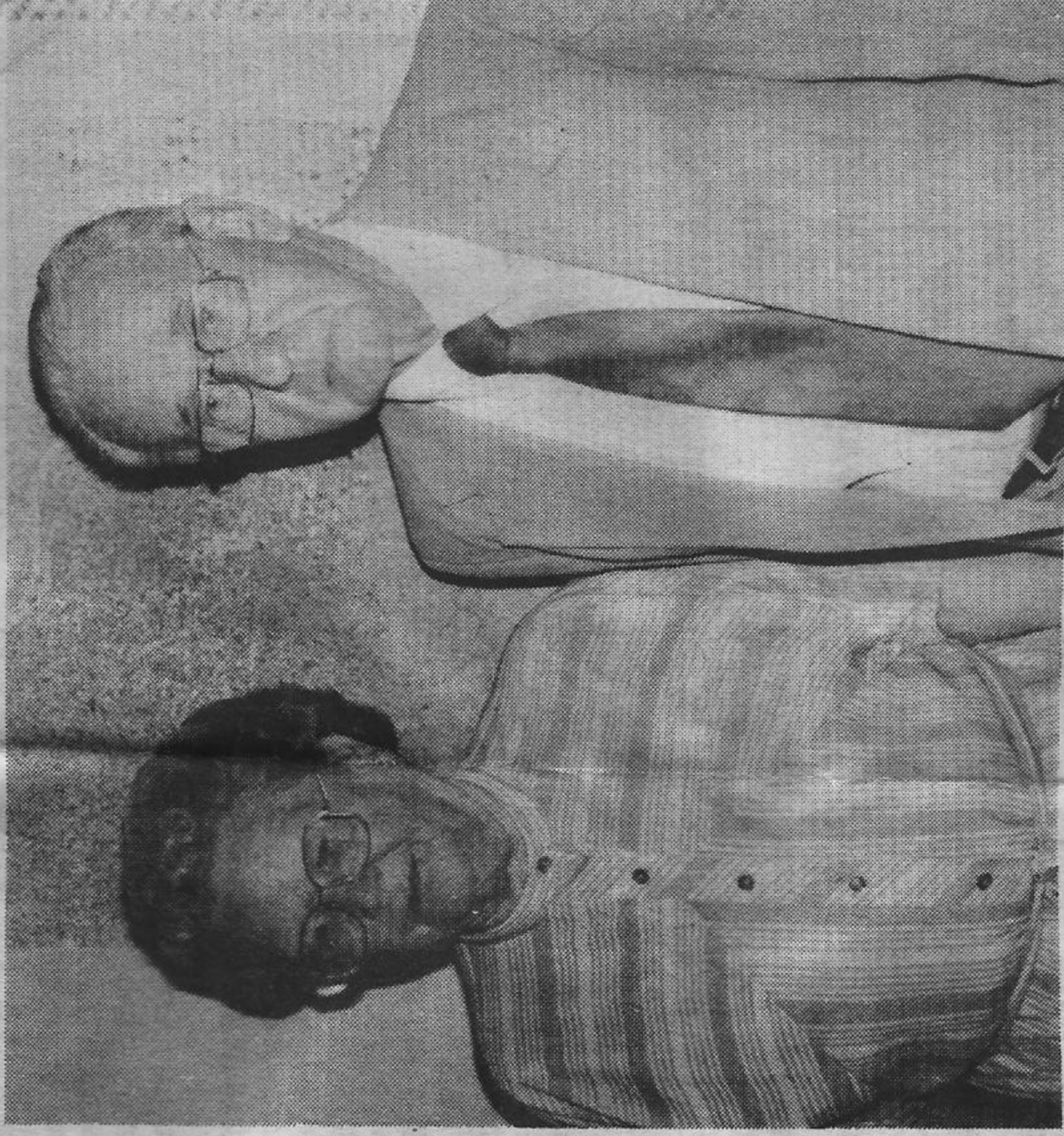
There was never any doubt in Rev. Dameron's mind that he would be a preacher. "I felt the call to preach before I was 12 years old," he said.

In addition to his ministerial duties, Dameron taught elementary school for 27 years, receiving his Bachelor of Science from Lincoln University in 1968. Of the years teaching, 11 were spent at Centertown, 10 at Clarksburg and three each at Latham and Bethel.

Being with the same church 45 years, Dameron has seen many changes and knows many people. "I have married couples, married their children and baptized their children," he recalls. Dameron said he has officiated at over 700 funerals and about half that many weddings.

Perhaps the most dramatic change noted by Dameron is the paving of area roads. "Only Highway 50 was paved, and all the roads at Mt. Pleasant were impassable during the winter." In the early days of his ministry, the churches had no electricity or bathrooms - in fact there was no electricity for many rural families.

Dameron remembers gas at Jamestown in the 40s was 17 cents

a gallon and recalls there was "very little pay." His wife chipped in with "It's unbelievable what he lived on." During World War II he recalled rationing and also corresponding with many county boys fighting overseas. "Once in a while, a boy would go off (to war) and not come back," he remembered.

Back in the present, though, Dameron has no desire to go anywhere else. He feels the economy and community have improved, and the church member-

ship of just over 100 has grown older but more stable.

Different from other Baptist churches which call a pastor in- definitely, Mt. Pleasant calls a pastor every year. Dameron said he will remain there "as long as they keep calling" him. He likes the smaller churches. "Town churches are always there to help in time of need, and the money always comes in when needed." "We wouldn't want to be anywhere else," he said.

No joke

Quarry foreman installs solar-assisted outhouse

Carl Buerky is used to taking what he wants from nature — in his longtime hobby, trapping, and in his job as foreman at the Hall and Riley rock quarry where he oversees the noisy, dusty work of extracting rock from the earth.

When he noticed that cool breezes blow out of an abandoned cave on the quarry property, Buerky quite sensibly parked his small house-trailer at the mouth of the cave. "It's like air-conditioning in summer," he said. "I stay in the trailer when I've worked late and don't feel like driving home."

But Buerky also gives nature something in return — the flowers he plants in large, well-tended beds around the entrance to the quarry. The flower beds, he admits, don't fit into the stereotype of a dust-covered quarry. "People think of a quarry and they think, 'They're just a bunch of rough people working there.' But that's not true," he said.

His give-and-take attitude toward nature may now have made him a fool in some folks' eyes. It all started with a warning by a Mine Safety and Health Agency inspector that the outhouse near the quarry headquarters would have to be removed. Buerky didn't agree with the warning, but figured he had to comply with the inspector's wishes. So he had the outhouse torn down.

In its place, he decided to build a story and a half tall outhouse based on a design by Doug Elley, Lupus han-

dyman and inventor. In 1979, Elley received a \$1,200 Department of Energy grant to develop an "above ground aerobic and solar-assisted composting toilet." To the chagrin of many, Elley named his outhouse the "Skycrapper," in honor of Thomas Crapper, the inventor of the flush toilet.

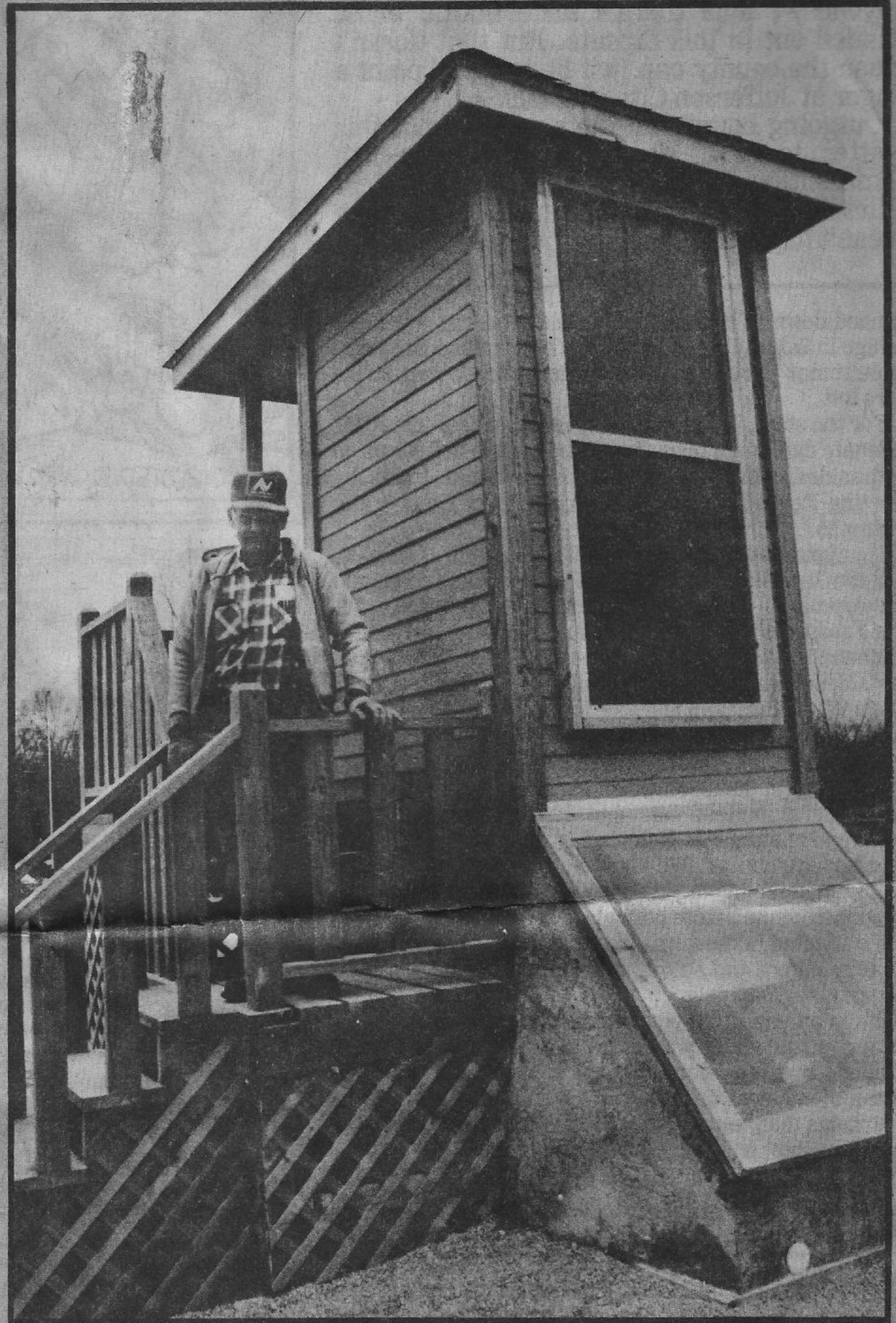
Like Elley before him, Buerky found the outhouse made a perfect target for ridicule.

Some pundits said the tall, narrow structure — which Buerky stationed prominently near the entrance to the quarry — looked like a guardhouse. "So I told them that's what it was ... that we'd had some stealing around here, so had hired some Pinkerton guards to stand watch in the guardhouse."

He even made up a story about the lattice-work which hides the outhouse's sawdust bin and waste collector. "I told them that's where we keep the guard dogs."

Dealing with the guffaws of fellow workers, salesmen and passersby has quickly become old hat to Buerky, but he admits "if I had known what I was getting into, I might not have done it."

But Buerky is serious about the ideas incorporated in the outhouse design. "I've been interested in solar energy for a while, and I knew we would have to go to considerable expense to build a regular plumbing system out here," he said. "So I mentioned the (Skycrapper) idea to my bosses (Jim Hall and Jerry and Jon Riley)."

Buerky is convinced it is an idea whose time has come. "Out west in wildlife areas, they're using these. It's a simple design. It doesn't use any water. And solar energy is free — that's what I like about it. If I ever build a house, I'll put as much solar technology into it as possible," he said.

But he admits some people may never accept the Skycrapper as a step forward in waste technology —

"especially people under 30. They've never seen an outhouse."

And he said even those who secretly agree it is a good idea may never stop kidding him. "I doubt you'll get very many of them to admit they like it," he said.

The Skycrapper has another practical use Buerky likes. In about six months, when the straw-waste compost has decomposed sufficiently, he will have fertilizer for his flower beds.

Retired officer in Army dies at age 95

Carl F. Scheibner, 95, of Little Rock, a retired Army lieutenant colonel and retired federal employee, died Tuesday.



Mr. Scheibner, born at Booneville, Mo., was educated at Kemper Military School in Booneville and

Central College in Fayette, Mo. He came to Little Rock with his military unit in 1920 and attended the Arkansas Law School in 1921-23 and 1927-28. He passed the Arkansas bar examination but never practiced law.

His military career began in 1912 with the Missouri National Guard. He was on active duty from 1917 to 1922, serving on the Mexican border and in France in World War I. During that period he mustered Harry S. Truman, later to become president, into active military service in Liberty, Mo., near Kansas City.

Mr. Scheibner joined Battery H of the 141st Machine Gun Battalion of the Arkansas National Guard and later became commander of Battery A of the 206th Coast Artillery, a searchlight battery. He returned to active duty in 1941, serving in the Aleutian Islands campaign and as a military aide to the governor of Alaska. He retired from active military service in 1946 and from the military in 1953.

For two or three years after his release from the military in the early 1920s, Mr. Scheibner was a chief deputy United States marshal. Later he became an adjudicator with the Veterans Bureau, a predecessor of the Veterans Administration.

He left the bureau to join the Internal Revenue Service, transferring in 1933 to the Procurement Division of the U.S. Treasury Department. He joined the Veterans Administration in 1946.

A lifelong Republican, Mr. Scheibner was appointed to the Board of the Arkansas Boys Industrial School in 1967 by then-Gov. Winthrop Rockefeller, and he was a Republican presidential elector in 1980. Gov. Bill Clinton appointed him an honorary brigadier general in the Arkansas National Guard last year.

Mr. Scheibner was a member of First United Methodist Church, the M.M. Eberts American Legion Post 1, the Veterans of Foreign Wars, the National Association for Retired Federal Employees, Masonic Blue Lodge of Magnolia, the Benevolent and Protective Order of Elks, and of the 35th Infantry Division Association. He was a past grand chef of Voiture 182 of the Society of 40 and 8.

Survivors are a son, Carl F. Scheibner Jr. of Little Rock; a daughter, Carol S. Wharton of Little Rock; three grandchildren; and three great-grandchildren.

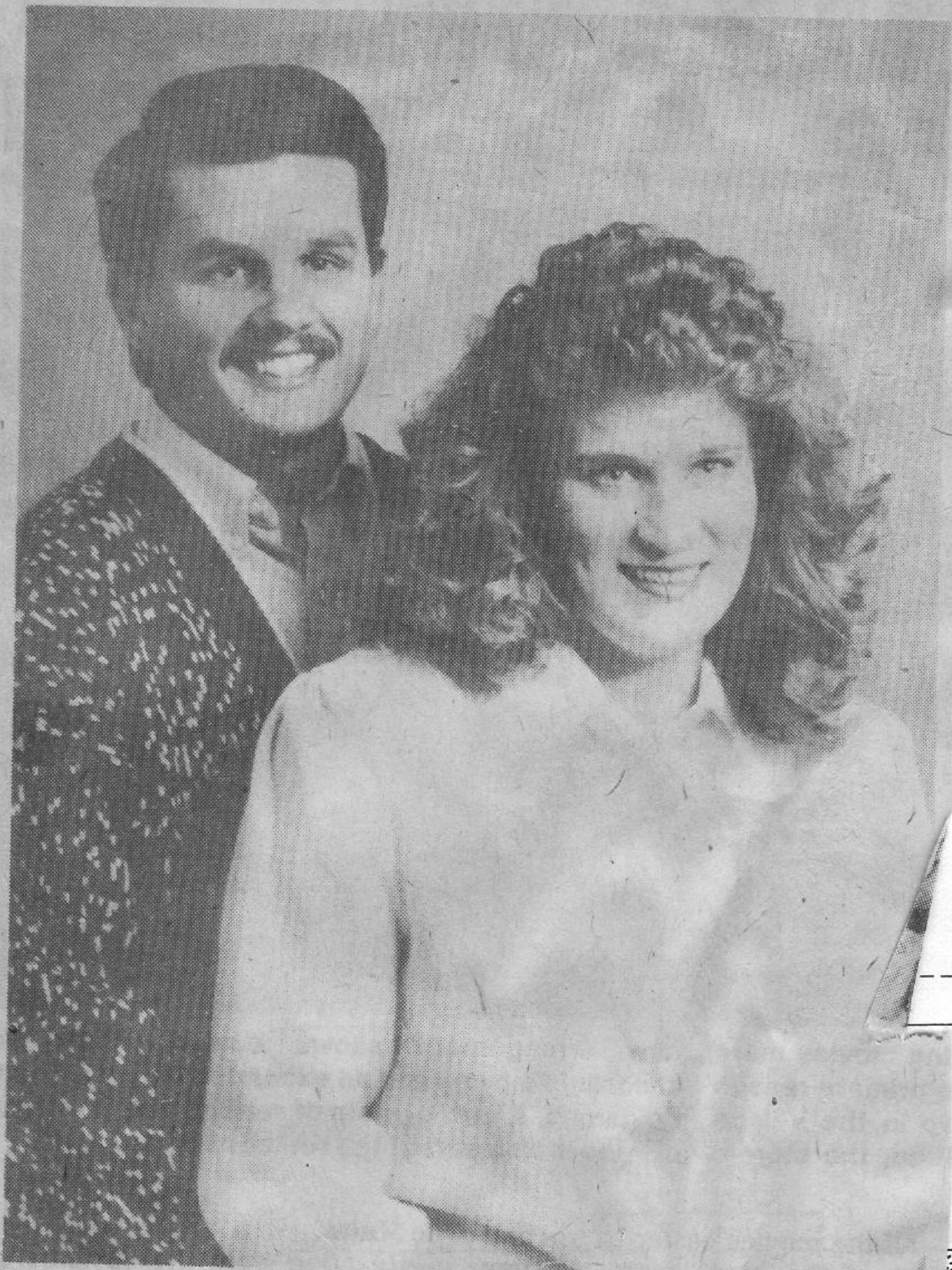
Following his retirement he

The body of a 64-year-old Jamestown man was pulled from a pond on his farm property in Moniteau County Friday night.

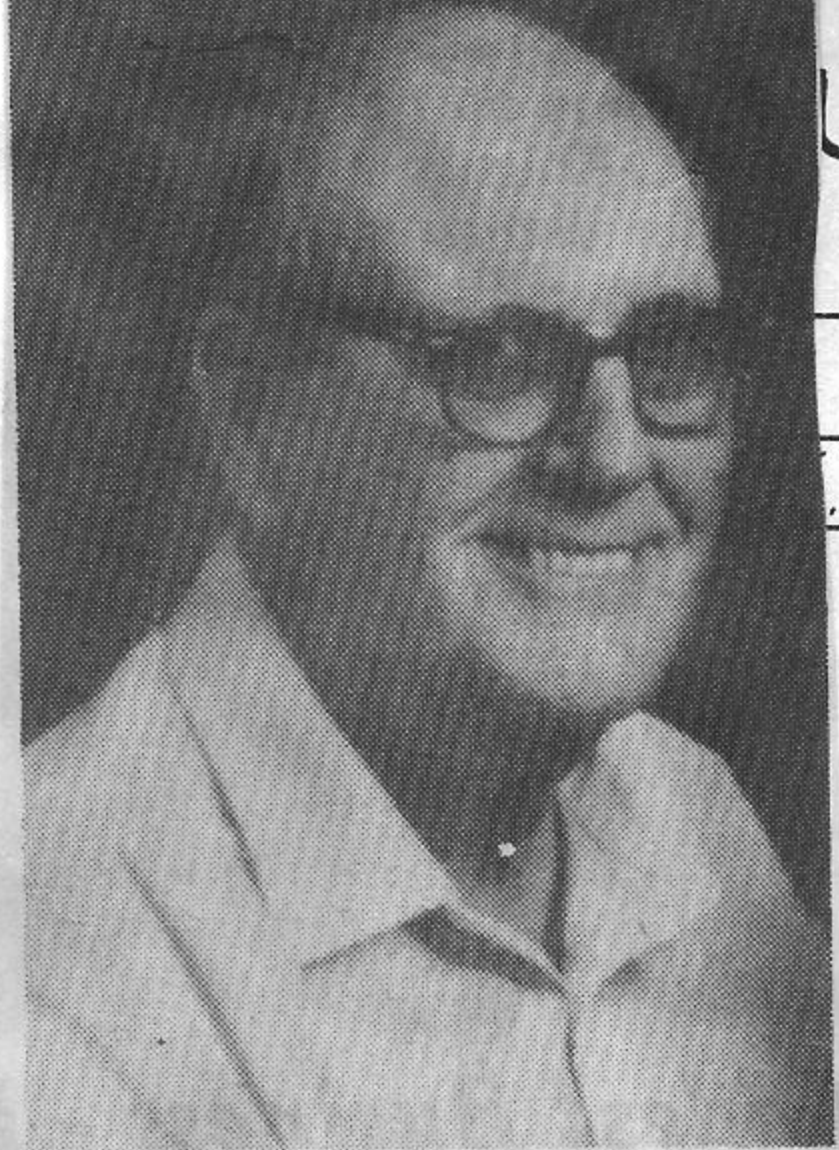
Clarence Schoeneberg's death is being ruled an accidental drowning, according to Hans Huenink of the Missouri Water Patrol, who conducted the search for the victim.

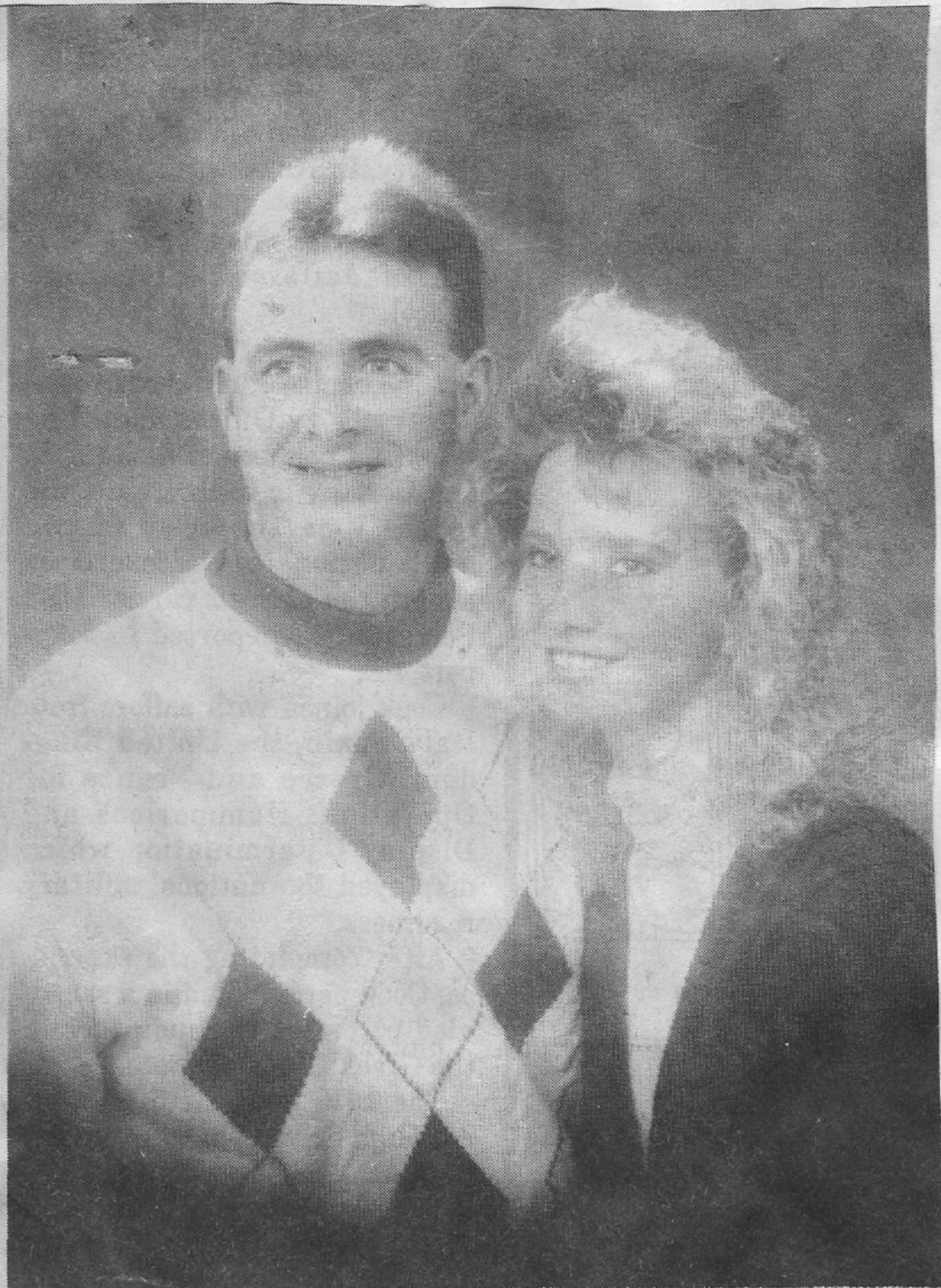

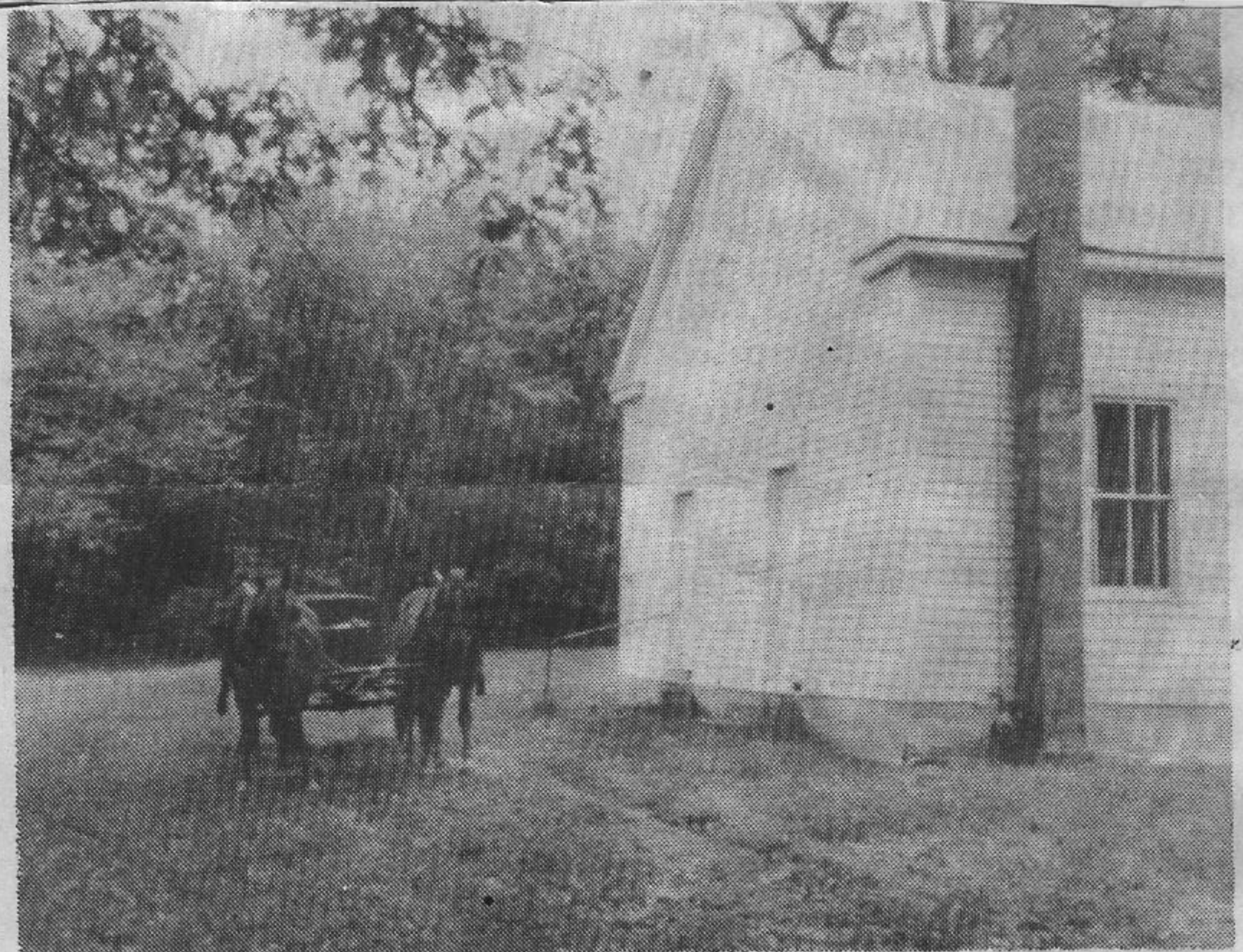

Patchwork pastime

WOOLDRIDGE — Slatts

McDaniel was a high school senior in Clarksburg the first time he saw Amanda Marion Falks. She was in eighth grade, and Slatts spotted her from a second-story window in the school.

"I got lookin' through the top window, and there she was," Slatts, 80, recalls. "I pointed my finger at her and said, 'I'm gonna marry that girl.'"

Four years later, he did.

In 1986, Marion died at the couple's home in Wooldridge. The mother of one son and a daughter, she was 69. As she had done almost every day of her married life, Marion was sewing the afternoon that Slatts left to run an errand and returned to find her dead. She was stitching a sunsuit.

Slatts has been stitching quilts — in Marion's memory — ever since. To date, he's made 61 quilts and more than 300 pillows. That's more than one quilt and 5 pillows a month — pretty good for an ol' railroad man.

Quiltmaker's ware is prize.

A rifle, ham and a quilt will be raffled off tomorrow during the third annual Wooldridge Festival. The bedcover — a red, yellow and white pinwheel design — was, of course, sewn by Slatts.

This is the second year that a quilt stitched by Slatts has been raffled off during the daylong festival. Last year, John Clay of Lupus won the prize blanket.

Lynn Guice of rural Wooldridge wouldn't mind winning Slatt's quilt this year. She already has two of his pillows. Lynn works part time at the Wooldridge General Store, where Slatt's prize quilt is on display next to a full-size stuffed deer in the storefront window.

"He gave the pillows to me a couple of years ago — no reason. He just gave them to me," Lynn says. "Slatts is just like that. He likes to give things away."

Lynn says Slatts started making

quilts with his wife.

"That's right," the old man says. "I would cut the squares and sew 'em together on the machine. She would quilt them by hand."

A tall, thin man, Slatts has pale blue eyes and a full head of gray hair. His small, almost pug, nose and quick smile gives Slatts a boyish look that still turns the ladies' heads.

"There's several girls down here that are after Slatts," Lynn teases.

From across the general store, Slatts shoots back: "I'm not catchable. I ain't interested in gettin' married again."

Born Lyndon McDaniel, Slatts acquired his nickname while working on the railroad in 1936.

"I was workin' for an ol' man, a real ol' man, about 15, 20 guys and me. The ol' man — he could never remember my name," Slatts says. "One day, he said to me, 'You look just like a slat in a fence — I look

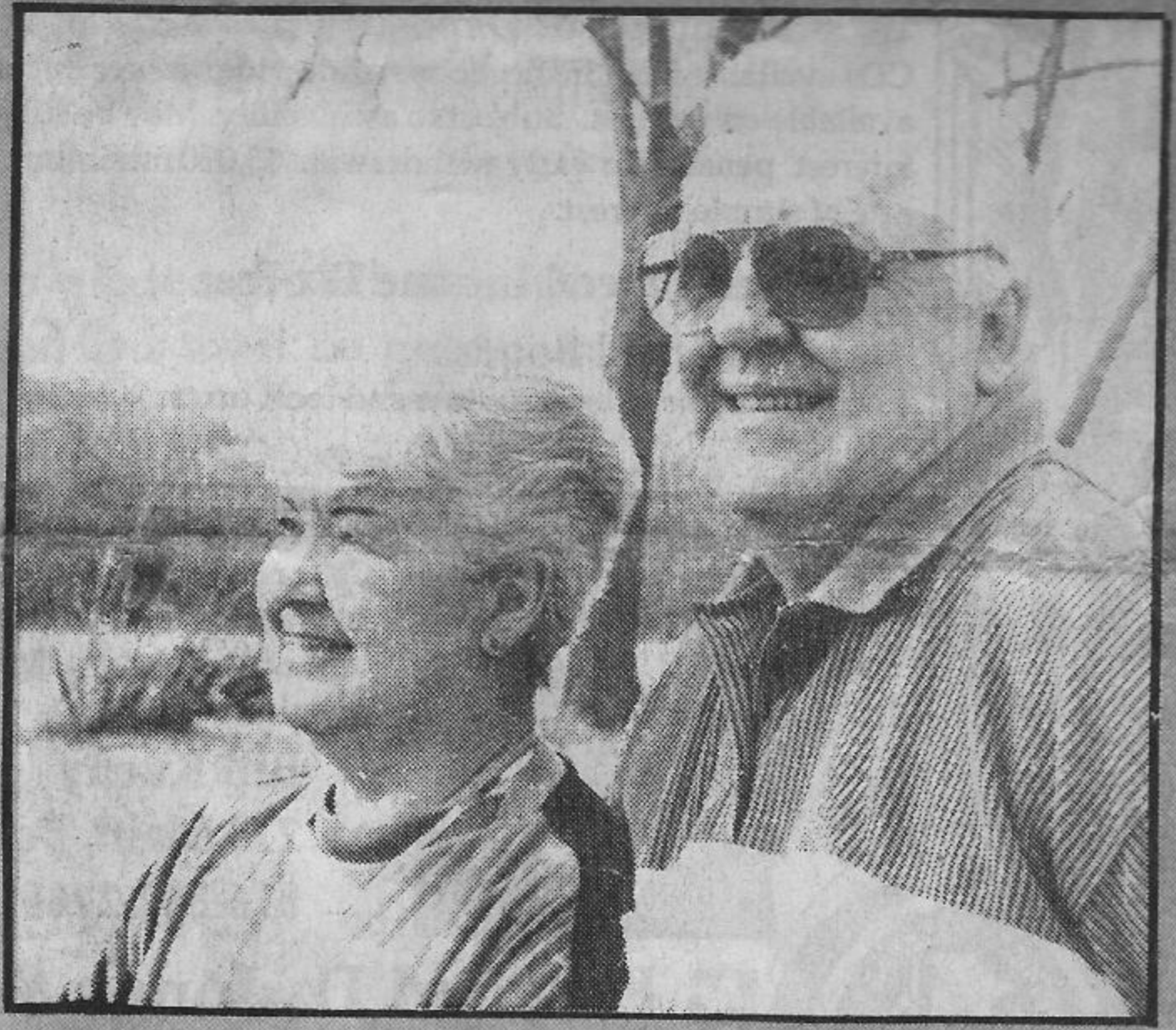
once, and you're there. I look again, and you're not.' I was wiry as a firecracker back then," Slatts says with a chuckle. "Guess I still am."

Though the festival doesn't officially begin until noon tomorrow, a fishing contest is slated for today from 7:30 a.m. to 2:30 p.m. Slatts will help kick off activities tomorrow and play his harmonica along with a local country and western band. Kids can bob for apples, play volleyball and search for money in a pan of sawdust while the older folks listen to music, throw horseshoes and watch a garden-tractor pull at 1 p.m. Slatts will raffle off his quilt in late afternoon.

That's how he prefers finding homes for his quilts. In fact, Slatts has never sold a quilt, nor does he own one.

"I like givin' 'em away. I don't want to sell 'em because I don't want to get in trouble with the IRS. But besides," Slatts says, "sellin' 'em — that's not me. I guess I'm one of those odd fellows."

Pat & Earl Gent New Journey

They are willful and wonderful, graceful and down-to-earth, two people with complementary personalities that make them a unique treasure of the Boonville community. After 20 years spent operating a downtown business that has become a landmark, Pat and Earl Gent will close Long's Drug Store for the last time this Thursday and begin their retirement.

Earl Gent is the pharmacist who has handled prescriptions at Long's for many area residents during the past two decades. Pat, his wife, has worked behind the counter, dealing with customers and taking care of many of the other duties in the store. Side by side, they have served area residents with a mixture of efficiency and good cheer that has won them many friends throughout the community.

"They have been a true asset to Boonville," Leron Hill, executive director of the Boonville Area Chamber of Commerce said. "They're both always so cheerful and that's going to be missed. Also, they're good business people. It's a loss for the community for the last pharmaceutical store in central downtown to close. We hate to see Long's disappear."

The Gents have operated Long's Drug Store on Main Street since 1972. However, they are not the first proprietors. Long's is the oldest still-operating business in Boonville. The store opened for business in 1840. The significance of the business' longevity was not lost on the couple, who thought long and hard before deciding to begin their retirement.

One of their Main Street neighbors and friends is Steve Kammerich. He owns the Stein House restaurant, located a few doors away from Long's. He said the Gents gave careful consideration to all aspects of their decision to retire.

"They have showed a real concern for the community," Kammerich said. "They are a big asset that Main Street can hardly afford to lose."

In a recent interview, Pat and Earl explained they had mixed feelings about closing the store. They spoke while relaxing at their home after feeding a hungry reporter a big country-style breakfast of biscuits, gravy and sausage.

The Gents are an attractive couple. Earl is over six feet tall, heavy set and still powerful-looking for a man in his sixties. He enjoys a cigar, insightful discussion and laughs easily. Pat is attractive, her hair always looking flawless and her outfits stylish. When she is amused, her mouth shifts from a knowing grin to a full smile and a boisterous laugh. The couple radiate vitality, humor and a personal sense of style.

Closing down the store and starting retirement was not an easy decision for them.

"It's sad we have to close, but we're happy to retire," Earl said. "A lot of people don't make it that far."

Earl worked as a pharmacist in the St. Louis area prior to moving to Boonville. Pat left a job with the telephone company to move to mid-Missouri to live with Earl. She had been with the utility for 23 years when she made her decision.

"It took a a lot of of guts," Earl said. He still takes obvious pride in his wife's choice to offer her support and work with him.

When he moved to Boonville, Earl found a different kind of lifestyle than what he had been accustomed to in St. Louis.

"What I liked about Boonville was walking down the street my first morning here and somebody said to me, 'Good morning.' I was impressed," Earl said.

The Gents have seen a lot of contemporary history made in downtown Boonville. Both say the biggest change they've seen is the redoing of the Main Street area, bringing in new lights, sidewalks, swellings, signs and plantings.

"I think it looks nice," Pat said.

"It's a shame we have to leave it," Earl added.

Their success at Long's has been no accident. The Gents have been there day in and day out, offering their customers quality service.

"If you work and keep your nose to the grindstone, people will appreciate it," Earl said. "You have to love what you're doing. If you're unhappy in your job, people know it and it shows."

Now that the Gents will be leaving their business routine, they have been talking about how they will spend their time.

"We're doing to do a lot of things around the house that have been put off," Pat said. They have no plans to travel extensively. Both love to fish "and we like fishing in Missouri," Earl said. One particular aspect of retirement has captured Earl's curiosity.

"I want to see what it's like not to report every day. But we'll miss our customers. We have a nice clientele," Earl said. "We're going to try to keep in touch with some of them."

Both of them speak fondly of their friends and their community.

"I've never been more happy than the 20 years I've been here," Earl said.

"I'm relaxed, relaxed and happy. People are so friendly. They've kind of touched me inside," Pat said.

Such affection goes both ways. Pat and Earl Gent - with their kindness, grace and humor - have touched the hearts of many people in this community. They are a living monument to how good all of us can be.

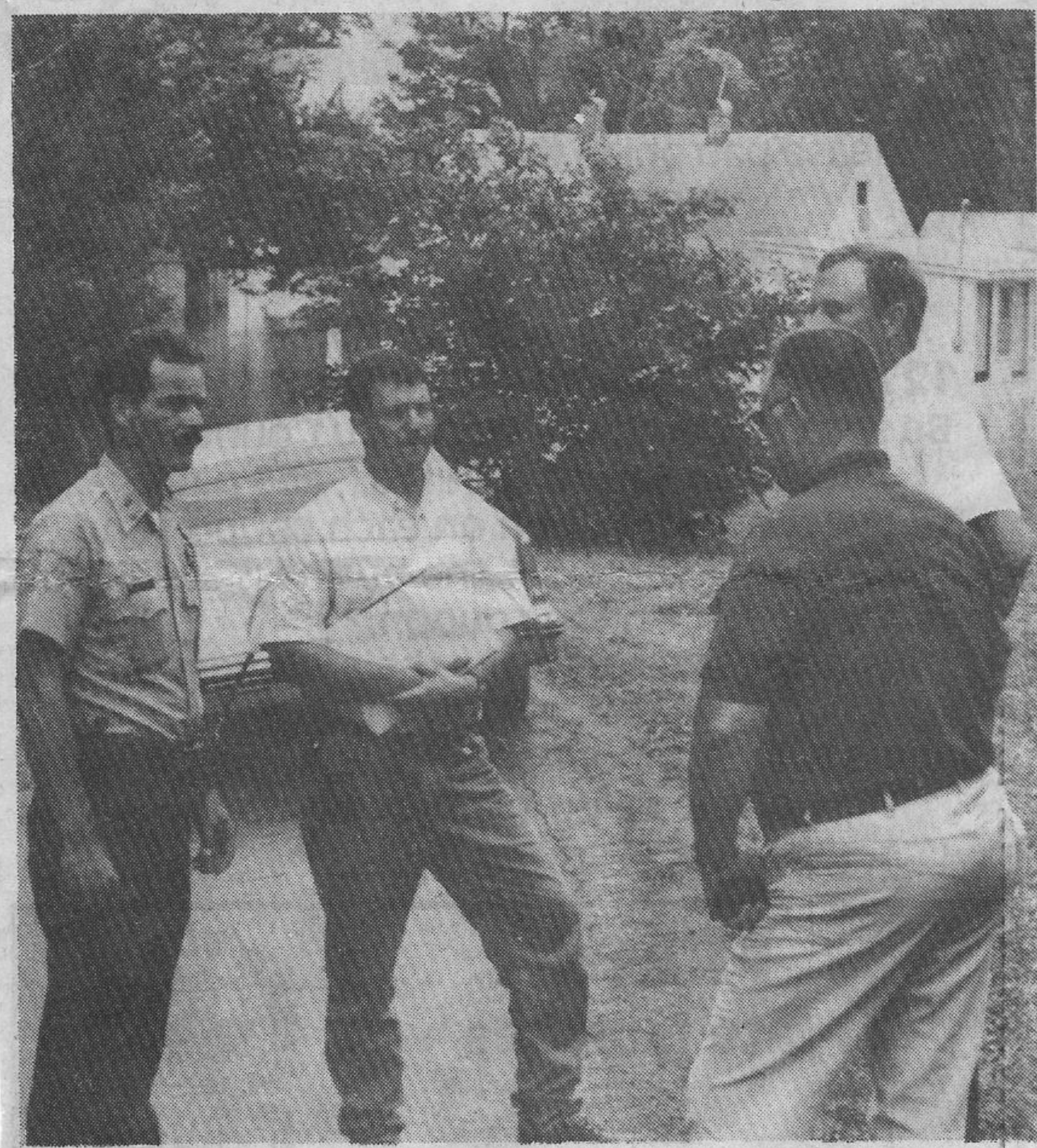

Appeal for a small-town postmaster

WOOLDRIDGE — When a postmaster job comes open, the U.S. Postal Service usually has no trouble filling the vacancy. Postal employees are given first crack, and most of the time they apply in droves.

Not so with the postmaster vacancy in Wooldridge.

No one in the postal service applied for the job after longtime Wooldridge postmaster Jackie Nixon retired last year. Nancy Wiswall, assistant postmaster in Rocheport, is overseeing the Wooldridge mail — there are about 100 homes in the delivery area — until a permanent replacement is found.

Gloria Bennifield with the postal service in St. Louis speculated that some postal employees might have been turned off by the Wooldridge office hours — six hours a day six

days a week, including Saturday.

"Some people want a 40-hour week," Bennifield said.

Maybe it's the pay, she offered. The job starts at \$20,981 a year and can reach a maximum annual salary of \$24,215. The job brings with it all the benefits and holidays of other federal employees.

"Some people want to make more money than that," she added.

Finally, Bennifield said flatly: "It's the area."

Located about 10 miles south of Interstate 70 on Highway 179, Wooldridge is a whisper of a Missouri River town. The 1990 census registered 54 citizens.

Once a vibrant community on a rail line that included a bank and general store, Wooldridge has

dwindled to a cluster of homes, a church and a community center.

Much of the town was ravaged by the Flood of '93, including an old bank building that housed the post office. Many Wooldridge residents have since been picking their mail up at the Rocheport post office, where it is sorted and distributed into boxes.

Dave Failor, another spokesman for the postal service in St. Louis, said the agency will park a \$25,000 "modular unit" in Wooldridge to take the place of the old post office. The unit should be in place by late January or early February.

The postal service has opened the job for postmaster to any eligible individual who lives within the Wooldridge delivery area. The new

postmaster must be at least 18 and pass a physical examination and drug screening.

Nixon said the postmaster in a small town does "practically everything" required of a postmaster in a larger town, just not as much. In the morning, there's mail to sort. Stamps and money orders are sold, and packages are handled.

"There's Express Mail and priority mail, and practically anything you'd find in a big post office, except there aren't the long lines," she said.

Nixon said there were lulls in her workday, but "most of the time I stayed busy."

Beginning Monday, applications for the postmaster job can be picked up at the post office in Rocheport. Deadline for application is Dec. 23.

Hooper Days is fast approaching and about a year ago I started reporting on the history of J.N. Hooper, so I started digging again. I have made telephone and mail contacts with Mrs. Lilly Freeman Walker, who lives in Marble Falls, TX. She is the great-granddaughter of J.N. Hooper. She informed me Joseph Harry Norris Hooper and wife Georgia Ann Amos had three children, Lilly Lee, who was born in Russellville, MO, July 8, 1872; William Edgar, born in Clarksburg on Dec. 7, 1876; and Dorsey Earl, born in Clarksburg on July 26, 1889.

Lilly married William Jesse Wooldridge Sr., July 8, 1891. They had eight children. Lilly was a devoted housewife and mother. She died April 27, 1915 at the age of 43 years old. Her husband was a businessman and at one time president of the Bank of Wooldridge. He died Oct. 5, 1941, age 71.

William Edgar married Ida Hopkins Anderson on 28, 1904 and they had two children. William opened the first store in Wooldridge and served a postmaster for 54 year. He retired Jan. 31, 1947. He died at his daughter's home in Kansas City Sept. 14,

1960. Mrs. Hooper died in a Kansas City hospital Aug. 28, 1962.

Dorsey Earl married Willie Louise Teel, Oct. 22, 1913. They had no children. Dorsey graduated from Kansas City University with a degree in dental surgery in 1909 and established a practice in Warsaw. After their marriage, the couple moved to Boonville where he again started his practice. Hooper died May 15, 1976. Mrs. Hooper died Oct. 6, 1978 following a short illness.

Settee History

The iron settee was presented to Hooper Institute by the junior class on Arbor Day 1893. When the school closed in 1908, the settee was moved to Wooldridge in the possession of W.J. Wooldridge Sr., where it remained until his death in 1941.

His oldest son purchased the

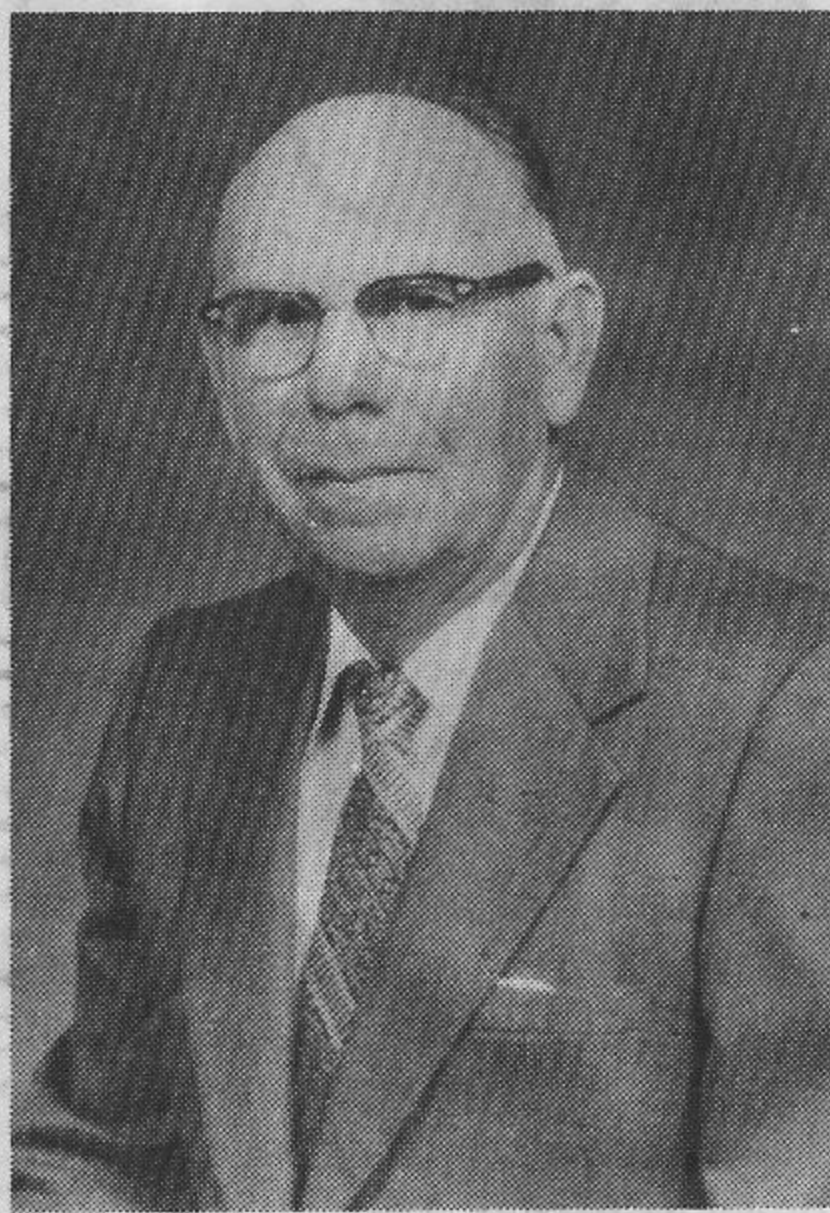
home and the settee remained in front of the home until his death in 1962. It was then moved to the home of Robert Wooldridge and later to the home of his second oldest son, Jesse, in Boonville.

After the death of Jesse, W.J. Wooldridge Jr. lost track of it for a while, but later found it in the possession of James Wooldridge.

As a child, W.J. Wooldridge Jr. remembers sitting on the settee with his father and looking out over the bottom land and crops near the Missouri River at Wooldridge. W.J. Wooldridge Jr. says during the first 24 years of his life the settee was in the same spot in Wooldridge.

On the day of their 65th anniversary, they woke up and it

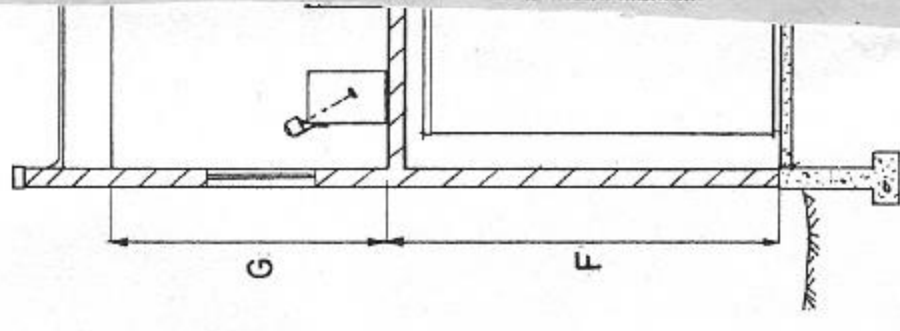
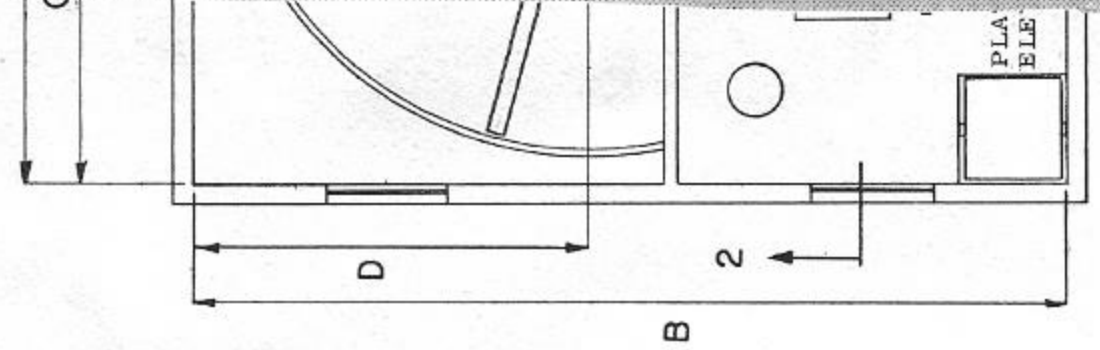
was snowing. They started their day as usual.

Community To Honor Retired Blacksmith

Carl Otto Scheibner, who has operated a blacksmith shop at Wooldridge for more than 38 years, is retiring from business, and will be honored by the community with a covered dish supper at the Wooldridge school house Friday, Feb. 26.

Mr. Scheibner will be 79 years old Oct. 1. He was born in Frankfurt, Germany, son of Moritz and Mary Marie Scheibner, and came to America with his parents when he was two years old. The crossing required six weeks, and baby Carl arrived with only one shoe, having kicked the other off into the Atlantic Ocean, one day when near the boat railing.

The family first settled in Miller County where they lived two years, next moving to California, Mo., and from there to Boonville in 1883.

When Carl was 9 years old the Scheibners lived west of Boonville about five miles, near a coal mine, and also near the McDonald Blacksmith shop. The shop attracted the boy, and it was there he picked up knowledge of, and a liking for, the trade which later became his life work.

There were two girls and two boys in the home. The brother was named Carl Alfred. The mother died when Carl Otto was about seven, and later his father remarried and had a daughter, Minnie, and a son, who was also named Carl, making three Carl Scheibners, all sons of Moritz Scheibner. The three Carls are living.

In 1903 Carl Otto moved to Wooldridge, and two years later, on Dec. 24, 1905 he was married to Miss Sophie Mills daughter of Mr. and Mrs. John Mills of the community.

Young Carl after farming about Wooldridge for several years, opened his blacksmith shop in the village in October of 1915. Though the smith was not "a mighty man," lacking six inches of being five feet tall, he was efficient, and his shop soon became the kind of

community center that a smithy did, in the days when horses were used for farm work, and for means of traveling.

His strong, square hands shod horses — as many as 12 in a day sometimes — beat plow shares into shape, made wagons and buggies, fitted tire rims, and kept the forge fires burning. As a sideline he did wood work, making cabinets, tables, chests, and other such furniture. But the horse drawn threshing machines, which he first knew, gave way to power threshers, and buggies were replaced by automobiles, and horses on the farms by tractors. In the last few years he has had few calls for shoeing horses, though he has made a number of wagon beds.

Recently Mr. Scheibner decided to retire. His wife died six years ago, and a son, Arnold Carl, died in infancy. He has two daughters, Miss Marguerite Scheibner of the home, and Mrs. Ewing (Josephine) Coffman of near Wooldridge.

The blacksmith, aided by his daughters, built a three room house, with bath this winter, on his son-in-law's place, and he and Miss Marguerite moved in. He plans to erect a small shop where he can continue his carpenter work and do some blacksmithing.

The Coffmans, who have two sons, Thomas and Gene, live a short distance away.

Mr. Scheibner's round face crinkles readily into smiles, and his blue eyes, behind their goldrimmed glasses, peer out, from under heavy eyebrows, warm and friendly. His hair and mustache are gray. He inspires instant liking and confidence.

His popularity is attested by the community wide plans to honor him next week. When one of the women helping to plan the observance was asked who was chairman of the project, and who thought of it first, she said: "There isn't any chairman. We just all decided to do it and everyone is helping." Which seems a tribute in itself!

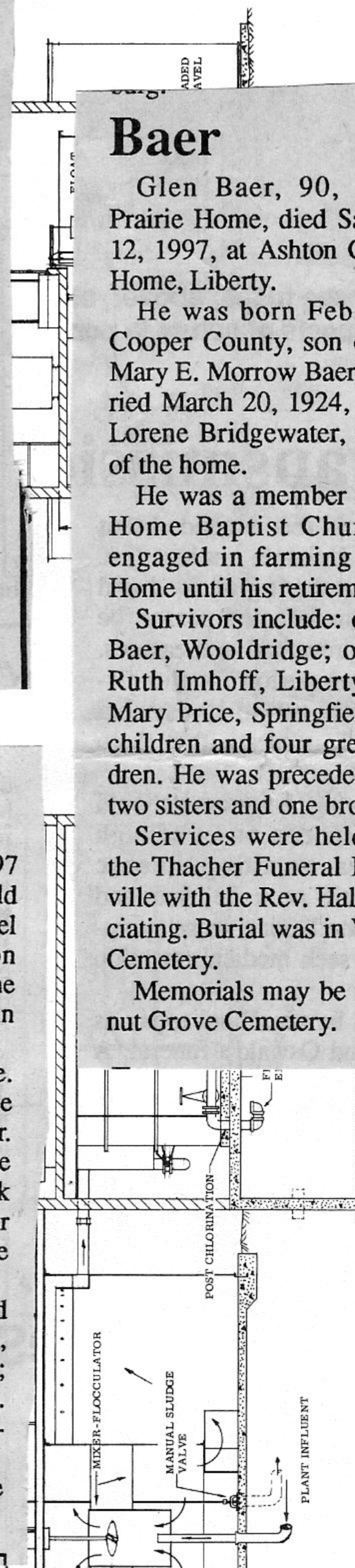

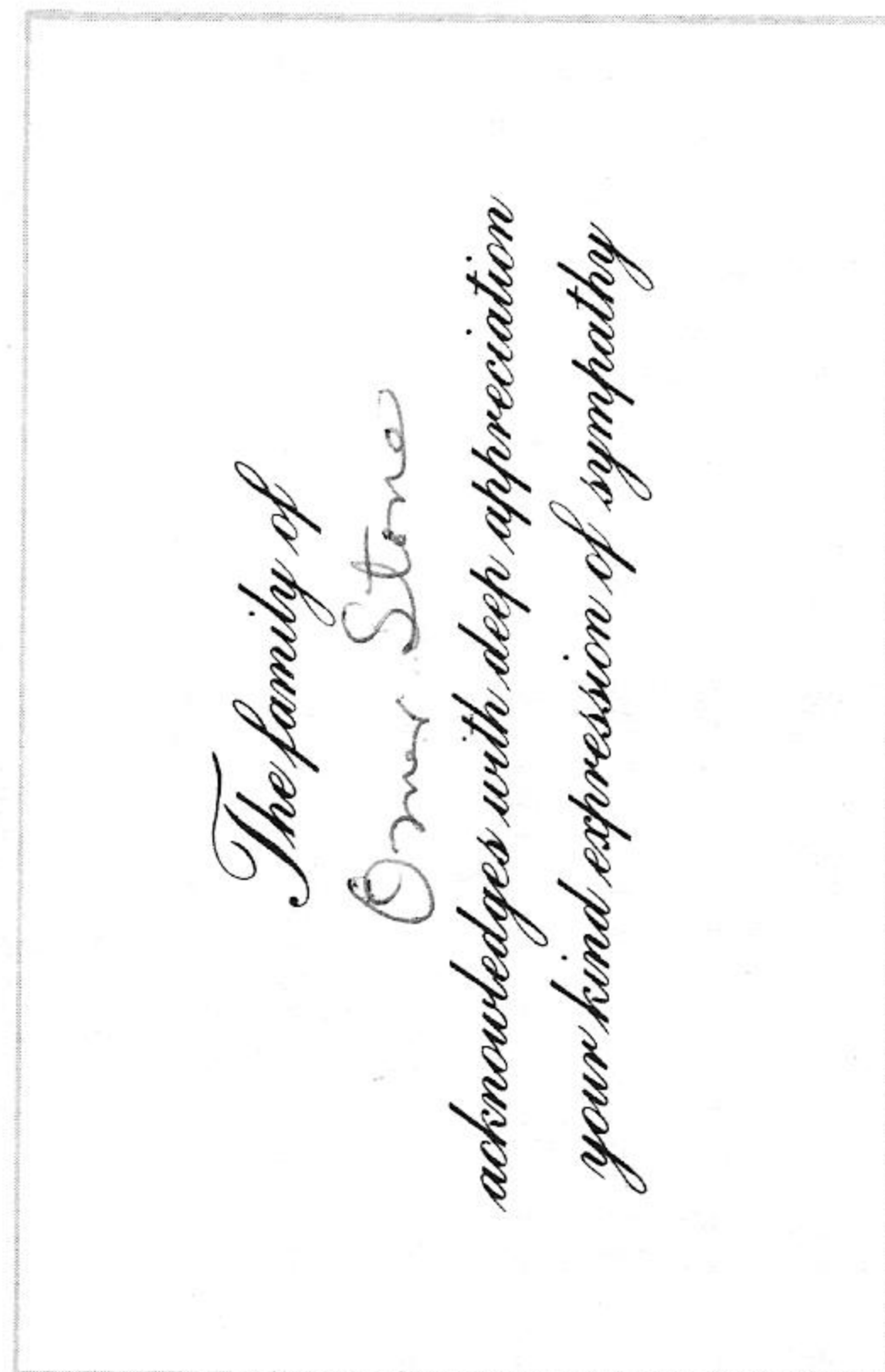
