The big flood - Kansas City had many businesses covered with water. Argentine, Kans. was one of the worst sufferers of the flood. Out of a population of 6,000, 4,000 were homeless. Loutre Island was completely submerged, the second time since the flood of '44. All the people and live-stock had been taken off the island, but the crops are destroyed. George Clark lost about 250 acres of fine wheat. Best Bottom is overflowed, and the water extends out over the second bottom in many places. Hundreds of acres in the Big Spring neighborhood are covered with water, but so far no loss of life. (5Jun1903)

Topeka, KS, and K.C., MO, have been in the throes of the greatest flood in their history this week. The rivers have risen and inundated both cities, entailing great suffering and serious loss of life and property. Over 20,000 persons are without homes in KC today, driven out by the waters. Property loss is at least \$15 million. Rain storms in Kans., Nebr., Iowa and MO are adding to the flood. The Missouri River is expected to go higher than any past record. From Omaha to the Mississippi River, all lowlands are now under water, and the river is rising rapidly. (5Jun1903)

"Uncle" Peter Bratton, in speaking of the death of the late James Robinson, whose death we chronicled last week, says he built the first house and was the first resident of Montg City. The house was built of logs in 1855, on the 80 acre tract of land he entered from the government, and is still in the neighborhood, now occupied by some negroes. The next house was a grocery store which Mr. Bratton put up himself, and the third building was the "tavern", the house on Railroad street across the railroad from D. Snethen's residence, which has a small porch over the sidewalk. The fourth building was another hotel put up on the corner, now occupied by Cason's drug store.

Mr. Bratton was working on the freight depot, putting on shingles, when the first train arrived in Montg City. Everybody for miles around had come to town to see the cars, and the horses were hitched around wherever anything could be found to tie to, thick as hops. When the train came pretty close, the engine let out one of those unearthly screeches for which the first engines were famous, and in a moment, Mr. Bratton says, the saddle skirts could be seen flying in every direction. He thinks every horse broke loose and they went a-flying. He was on top of the freight house and could see them. Mr. Bratton laughs every time he thinks of the scene, though nearly 50 years have passed. (24Jul1903)

An incident of the War - D.C. Hughes returned to his home in Carroll co, Ark. The visit of Mr. Hughes to Oak Grove after an absence of 27y, recalls the store of his miraculous escape from death during the war between the states. Mr. Hughes, then a beardless boy, clerking in his father's store in Montg City, was, together with 3 other men of Southern sympathies, captured by a company of Federal soldiers. They were taken out on the prairie near the town and told to kneel on the ground, as their time to die had come. Mr. Hughes inquired why they were to be put to death, and the Federal officer jabbed him with a sword and told him to shut his mouth. The prisoners were then given 3 minutes to make their peace with God. The Federal company was drawn up in a line four deep around the men to be slaughtered. Hughes knew it was death anyway, and he and one of the other prisoners made a dash for

liberty. Their unlooked for move was so sudden that they broke through the ranks before the 110 Federals could recover from their surprise. Many shots were fired at Hughes and his companion. One of them took effect and Hughes' right shoulder was badly shattered. His companion escaped without injury. The other two men were shot to pieces and bayonets ran through their bodies. Mr. Hughes hid in a small ravine for several hours, and one time the Federals hunting him walked within ten feet of him. The Federal captain's name was Kirby. When Hughes recovered, he came to Jackson co and joined Quantrell, and it is likely that many a "blue coat" met death at his hands. Mr. Hughes is now a well-to-do farmer of Carroll co, Ark. Oak Grove Banner D.C. Hughes is a brother of the late Judge E.M. Hughes of this city. Hughes' companion in his escape from the Federals was Carson Nunnelly, an uncle to Mrs. Marshall Washington. Of the two men who were shot to death, one was Carson Nunnelly's father, Mrs. Washington's grandfather. (18Sep1903)
